Anaconda, Oct. 18.—The home of Ed Devine, one of Anaconda's well-known business men, was saddened this morning by the death of his beloved wife, Julia A. Devine, after an illness of scarcely twenty-four hours.

Yester-day morning one of Mrs. Devine's daughters who slept with her, on awakening found her mother in an unconscious condition, the result of a sinking spell to which trouble she was subject periodically. The alarm was given at once. Medical aid was summoned but, notwithstanding, her condition grew worse and shortly after 5 o'clock this morning passed away.

SHOT IN THE SHOULDER.

George Tyler Is the Victim of a Dangerous Practice. Anaconda, Oct. 18.—George Tyler, a 13-year-old lad who lives with his parents at 415 Oak street, was the victim of a distressing accident yesterday, the result of which was that he sustained a wound inflicted by a 22-caliber bullet.

During the afternoon young Tyler, in company with a number of other boys, went out over the flume to the new works. The boys took a box of cartridges along with them and found great sport in placing them upon a rock and exploding them by means of another rock or a long rod of some sort. The youngsters did not realize that this was a dangerous practice, but made a further display of evident thoughtlessness by not always using blank cartridges. Some of them were loaded, and that is how the Tyler boy happened to get hurt. One of his companions exploded one of the cartridges, and the bullet struck Tyler in the right shoulder. The injured boy was brought home and City Physician Evans was called to attend to his wants. An effort was made to find the bullet by probing, but without success. Fortunately the wound is not considered at all serious.

THEY IMITATED COINS. Makers of School Books Who Ran Afoul of the Law.

In order to prevent possible counterfeiting there is a musty law on the books which prohibits the reproduction of national currency, says the New York Telegraph. Few people know about this law. A New York publishing house has fallen foul of the statute and is in sackcloth and mourning. The concern printed an arithmetic for the little Filipinos, all of whom it is asserted are crazy for vulgar fractions and square roots. To make the book practical and of value to the merchant, the publishers devoted two pages to pictures of pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters, halves, silver dollars and various kinds of bills. They shipped hundreds of cases of arithmetics and then sat down to figure up the profits which would flow into their coffers. But alas for publishers and alas for dreams! The Secret Service ruse and said: "Aha! Chapter 2004 of the laws of the year 603 has been clearly violated. Seize the offending volumes." The news was flashed to the publishers, who are now interceding with the treasury department in regard to their venture. It is to be hoped that the

books will be allowed to disseminate arithmetical nightmares among the Malays, even if the two offending pages have to be removed by the punitive scissors of the deadly blue pencil. But the next batch of arithmetics that goes to the Philippine archipelago will not contain graven images of the vulgar currency of the United States.

Better Guns For English. According to the Broad Arrow, an organ of the British military and naval service, the German field guns bought by the British government recently "score wonderfully in artillery practice," having an effective range of seven miles, or nearly a mile more than the British gun. The British guns most in use are "converted guns," no uniform pattern having yet been adopted by the war office. The British naval guns, however, compare favorably with any other. More German field guns are being purchased to supplement the British supply. In the general preparation for war all the muzzle loading guns at the forts at the mouth of the Thames, says Broad Arrow, have been replaced by modern breechloaders. This has been done also all along the south coast, as many as 200 new guns having been placed abroad at important points the same substitution has been going on for some time.
