TELEPHONE MEN COMPLAIN.

Rocky Mountain Hello Company Has Troubles at Red Lodge.

Red Lodge, Oct. 31.—The Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company has filed an amended complaint in the district court asking an injunction against the city of Red Lodge interfering with them in the erection of poles and stringing of wires in the streets of said city.

In their amended petition the company states that they operate telephones in Montana, Wyoming, Idaho and Utah, and that in order to connect their lines between Cheyenne, Wyoming, and Montana points they must pass through Red Lodge.

The case is set for hearing before Judge Henry in chambers at Livingston next Tuesday at 10 a. m.

SMALLPOX IS REPORTED. Four New Cases of Dread Disease Develop.

Red Lodge, Oct. 31.—Four new cases of smallpox developed during the past week.

Marvin Barlow, a coal miner employed in the Rocky Fork mines, was taken to the pest house Monday.

The other two cases are in the family of John Hathaway, near Geba. Mr. Hathaway died from smallpox at the pest house in this city ten days ago.

Cash Bond for Blomberg.

Mr. Padley has turned the matter over to the Madison county authorities, and indications are favorable for the early release of Blomberg on a cash bond.

GOT "FRENCH PETE"

CHARGED IN IDAHO WITH HORSE STEALING.

PETE'S REPUTATION AT STAKE

Publication of the Various Brands on Stolen Stock Indicate That They Were Taken From Lemhi County.

Dillon, Oct. 31.—Word was received at the sheriff's office a few days ago that "French Pete," a well-known character of the Horse Prairie country was under arrest at Boise, Idaho, charged with horse stealing.

It is understood in town that a number of the cattlemen of Redrock and vicinity think that some of the cattle belong to them, but it is generally supposed that the cattle were stolen from the vicinity of Lemhi Junction in which locality Pete claims to have bought them.

It is stated that a number of the cattlemen of that locality have been missing cattle of late.

A Boise dispatch has the following to say about the matter: A strange case of cattle stealing is being unraveled here.

Ten days ago a man calling himself N. F. Foubert brought two cars of stock here—four horses and fifty-four steers. The stock was from Lima, Mont.

The horses were recognized, as the train came through Mountainhome as belonging to a man by the name of Walters, living at Three Creek, in Owyhee county, and Foubert's arrest followed. He was taken over to Silver, where he is awaiting trial.

The owners of the cattle have not yet been discovered, but publication of the seventeen brands has brought information that the cattle were undoubtedly stolen in Lemhi county.

Killed by Fall.

Great Falls, Oct. 31.—Coroner Sweeney yesterday held an inquest over the dead body of Julius August Meyer, a laborer on the Portage cut-off, who was killed near Floweree late yesterday afternoon, and whose body was brought to the city. Meyer was at work with five other laborers in loading ties upon a flat car in the Floweree yards for transportation over the line of the new cut-off. While so engaged he fell from the car a short distance to the ground and in the fall broke his neck.

The dead man was about 52 years of age, a Mormon, and had a wife and two daughters living in Minnesota.

The coroner is awaiting instructions as to the final disposition of the body.

Desperate Saloon Fight.

Missoula, Oct. 31.—Early this morning John Ringuette, a Frenchman, and Louis Larose a half-breed, made a slaughter house out of a front street saloon in a rough and tumble fight. The half-breed had his face cut with a beer glass and his thumb half chewed off. Ringuette's face was battered out of recognition. Both men had to repair to a hospital to get their wounds dressed.

Boy Accidentally Shot.

Belt, Oct. 31.—While Gus Kessner was loading a .38-caliber revolver the gun fell from his hand, and striking on the hammer discharged a shot which hit him in the breast, perforating a lung. The bullet remained in the boy's body. Doubts are expressed as to his recovery.
