HONOR THE COLONIES

CORNWALL'S RECEPTION AN IMPERIAL FUNCTION.

ROYAL PAIR AT PORTSMOUTH

England's Tribute to Colonies for Their Loyal Reception of the Crown Prince Begun by Ophir's Arrival.

(By Associated Press.) New York, Nov. 1.—Commenting upon the arrangements in connection with the arrival of the duke and duchess of Cornwall and York, the London correspondent says: The arrival of the Ophir and the departure of the king and queen for Portsmouth was the opening scene of an imperial function designed as a stately tribute of respect to the colonies.

The loyalty of the colonies demonstrated in Australia, South Africa and Canada by their unexampled reception of the heir to the throne has imposed an obligation on the mother country to welcome him on his return with unique honors.

King and Queen Meet Ophir.

The king and queen will lead the way and meet the Ophir, and the channel fleet with five battleships and eight cruisers will guard the anchorage of their ship and the royal yacht at Portsmouth and provide, by illuminations, a splendid circle.

NEWS STORIES BRIEFLY TOLD

GLASGOW—The bubonic plague has re-appeared here during the week. CONSTANTINOPLE—It is again rumored that Mme. Tsiska and her child are dead.

LONDON—The Bank of England increased its rate of discount from 3 to 4 per cent. DENVER—J. J. Fry, president of the Colorado Springs and Cripple Creek railroad, has resigned.

MANILA—General Hughes reports the complete surrender of the insurgents in the island of Cebu. SAN FRANCISCO—The California Jockey club has decided to adopt the "No recall flag" system.

WHEELING, W. Va.—The Will Colvig building was entirely destroyed by fire together with its contents. MADISON, Wis.—A. P. Dutton, prominent pioneer and business man of Wisconsin, lies dead in this city.

MATLOCK, Iowa—The bank of Matlock was burglarized by six men who secured about \$2000 and escaped. PORT TOWNSEND, Wash.—The steamship Roanoke arrived at this port with 600 passengers from Nome.

DOVER—A fierce easterly gale has been blowing over the whole channel, seriously interfering with all shipping. PORT TOWNSEND, Wash.—Kewalik, a new town at the mouth of Candle creek, promises to become a rival to Nome.

LONDON—Mrs. Elizabeth Hanbury, who was born June 9, 1783, is dead. She could see to read and write up to her hundredth year. WASHINGTON—The president denied six applications for pardon, granted one pardon and restored three applicants to citizenship.

ORISPE, Iowa—The safe in the bank of Orispe was blown open and \$30 in cash and a large amount of negotiable paper taken. CHICAGO—The grand jury voted an indictment against Dr. Orville Burnet, as an accessory before the fact, charging him with murder.

DEADWOOD—W. H. Ward was found guilty of the murder of Lee and Kirk Shepard of Pluma, and was sentenced to life imprisonment. BUFFALO, N. Y.—Official documents recording the death of the assassin Czolgosz were placed on record in the county clerk's office.

ST. JOHNS, N. F.—Three schooners were driven ashore on the Labrador coast last week during a gale, but all on board were rescued. WASHINGTON—Archbishops Ireland and Riordan of St. Paul and San Francisco, respectively, called on President Roosevelt.

MUNCIE, Ind.—A head-on collision is reported on the Vandalla road at Judson, Ind. Several persons are said to have been killed. SAN PEDRO, Cal.—Alexander Alexander, a white man, shot a negro named Lottle McKnight and then killed himself in a saloon here.

NEW YORK—Dr. Doty, health officer of the port of New York, is not alarmed over the fact that Liverpool has been declared a plague infected port.

NEW YORK—Andrew D. White, ambassador to Germany, sailed on the Deutschland, after a fortnight spent in this country on private business.

WASHINGTON—President Roosevelt and Private Secretary Cortelyou will leave Washington for New York on Monday in order to vote on Tuesday.

EUGENE, Ore.—Word was received from Mapleton of the drowning in the Siuslaw river last Monday of M. Voltaire Gurney and his son Robert.

FALL RIVER, Mass.—There will be no strike for higher wages in the print cloth mills next Monday, and for the present the wage question here is settled.

CONSTANTINOPLE—A mutinous demonstration was made in front of the admiralty offices by 600 officers and Bashi-Basouks whose pay is in arrears.

LIVERPOOL—The steamer Oceanic, which sailed from this port yesterday, has on board 45 lady postulantes of the order of St. Joseph, and St. Paul, Minn.

CHICAGO—Robert E. Burke, formerly city oil inspector, and Max Prager, Burke's former assistant, were named in indictments voted by the grand jury.

WASHINGTON—E. H. Roberts, treasurer of the United States, says that the treasury was never stronger than at the close of the fiscal year June 30, 1901.

DENVER—A special from Cheyenne reports the burning at Newcastle, Wyo., of an entire block of buildings, including the postoffice. The loss is given at \$100,000.

CHICAGO—Lieutenant Joyce of the detective bureau was acquitted of the charge of conspiracy to defraud the state by means of an alleged padded expense account.

YARMOUTH, Isle of Wight—The king and queen left London by special train for Portsmouth to meet the duke and duchess of Cornwall and York who are on the royal yacht Ophir now anchored off Yarmouth.

NEWMARKET—Ten of William C. Whitney's racers were sold yesterday at the Heath house stables. The Mount Vernon filly went for £200 and Watershed brought £200.

BARNSTABLE, Mass.—Miss Jane Toppam, charged with the murder of Miss Mary Gibbs at Calumet in August last, was held without bail for further hearing on November 8.

LARNED, Kas.—During the excitement of the burning of Shell's barn, the safe in the depot of the Santa Fe company was blown open with dynamite and the building badly wrecked.

NEW YORK—The three-story building at North and High street, occupied by White & Co., Joshua L. Bailey & Co., Henry Clews & Co., bankers, was burned. Loss \$60,000.

HARTFORD CITY, Ind.—All the factories included in the American Window Glass Co., and the independent glass companies, have resumed giving employment to 15,000 men, who have been idle since last May.

LOGANSPORT, Ind.—Two men were instantly killed and two probably fatally injured in a head-on collision between two freight trains of the Michigan division of the Vandalla, at Judson, Ind.

DES MOINES—A. B. Cummins, republican candidate for governor, has so far recovered from his recent illness as to be able to resume his campaign tour of the principal towns of the state.

WASHINGTON—General Miles has recommended that the Eleventh and Twenty-eighth infantry be sent to the Philippines to relieve the Fourth, Seventeenth, Twentieth and Twenty-second.

PATIENCE IS EXHAUSTED.

Sultan Likely to Change Procrastinating Tactics. (By Associated Press.) New York, Nov. 1.—A Paris correspondent declares that the patience of France with Turkey has finally been exhausted. He says it is the general belief that Turkey will now abandon her procrastinating tactics and fulfill her engagements. Her only difficulty will be in finding the necessary money.

The correspondent adds that things cannot go on as they have done. The government is face to face with a debate on the foreign estimates in the chamber of deputies and it is imperative that a situation both embarrassing and ridiculous shall be ended.

When the trouble with Turkey began, the dispatch goes on to say, it seemed difficult for France to undertake a coercive naval demonstration in regard to the three matters at stake.

The question of the Constantinople quays concerned a private enterprise, involving divergent interpretations of a concession. The Lorando and Tubini debts were even less of the sort for which a power mobilizes a fleet.

The porte, however, has acted toward France in a way calculated to wound and offend, and a demonstration is needed, or the dignity of France will be compromised.

DISCUSS ENGLISH POLICY.

German Editors Roast the Great Thunderer. (By Associated Press.) New York, Nov. 1.—A Berlin correspondent quotes an article in the National Zeitung on the discussion of the question of Great Britain's foreign policy which has been going on in the London Times and the National Review.

The National Zeitung treats with disdain the suggestion of an anti-Russian entente and accuses the London Times of sowing the seeds of disension between Great Britain and Germany.

The correspondent urges on the contrary that a good understanding between Great Britain and Russia would be the best thing for Anglo-German relations, as it would remove the grounds for the allegations that Great Britain tries to use Germany as a catspaw.

Germany and Russia, says the correspondent, have more objects in common than have Great Britain and Germany. Englishmen desiring the friendship of Russia have no wish to quarrel with Germany, but only wish a second string to their bow as Germany herself does.

It is true, remarks the correspondent, that the German government deprecates the excesses of the press in its invectives against Great Britain. But, if similar attacks were made in the British press on the German emperor and German institutions, a protest would forthwith be made by the German embassy in London.

As an indication of German national feeling these attacks deserve to be taken into consideration. Officers Sall for Manila. (By Associated Press.) San Francisco, Nov. 1.—Col. W. H. Leuer and Maj. W. E. Birkheimer of the United Engineer corps have sailed for the Philippines to inspect recent improvements in the harbor of Manila.
