### SOUTHWICK IS HELD

### YOUNG KIDNAPER IS CHARGED WITH EXTORTION.

### HAS PRELIMINARY HEARING

Young Defendant Is Represented by Attorney Stanton—Motion for Dismissal Denied—Bail Fixed at One Hundred Dollars.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Great Falls, Nov. 8.—Young James Southwick, the budding rival of Mr. Crowe, had a preliminary hearing yesterday, and as a result was held to the district court on a charge of extortion. Attorney J. H. Stanton looked after the boy's interest in the justice's court. A motion to dismiss the case was denied and the young man's liberty was made contingent on the furnishing of a bail bond in the sum of \$100.

### CHARGED WITH ASSAULT.

### Henry Hauert and Billie McMillan Indicted for Vreeland Attack.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Kallispell, Mont., Nov. 8.—In the district court this week County Attorney Oliver filed informations charging Henry Hauert and "Billie" McMillan with assault in the first degree. The defendants are in jail and their victim, a man named Vreeland, is in the local hospital in a dangerous condition as the result of a gunshot wound in the neck. It is expected that he will recover, but in the event that he does not Hauert and McMillan will have to face a more serious charge than is now lodged against them. Hauert himself was hurt in the fracas, but Vreeland was an innocent bystander.

The fracas took place at Columbia Falls last week. Hauert is an old-timer in Columbia Falls and has lived there on a ranch for 10 years past, and has borne a good reputation until recently. He was a bachelor until a few months ago when he married a young woman of doubtful reputation and moved to the falls, where he opened a saloon and restaurant.

### Contracts for Street Lamps.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Kallispell, Nov. 8.—At the regular meeting of the city council last Monday night, a contract was entered into with the electric light company for 70 street lamps at a cost of \$350 a month. This will be fully four times as many street lamps as the city has at present and will result in the streets being brilliantly lighted all over town. Since the electric power plant at Big Fork, 17 miles distant, has been in operation, the current for the city lights has been procured from that source and they are a great improvement over those furnished by the old system.

### Calls Court Calendar.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Kallispell, Nov. 8.—Judge Smith has called the petit jury for the fall term of the district court for the 18th inst. There are about 13 original cases and 100 civil cases on the docket. All of the former, except perhaps the Ekright case, the policeman charged with manslaughter in shooting a Chinaman, will probably be tried. The Ekright case has not yet been set, being before the court on a motion for continuance by the defense. Of the civil cases but 23 are at issue.

### Wheeler Is Discharged.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Kallispell, Nov. 8.—William Wheeler was up before Police Judge McArthur, charged with receiving stolen goods. Wheeler is a second-hand dealer and sold a watch which was proved to have been stolen from Mrs. Alex LeBeau, who resides two miles west of town. The watch was sold to a young man who is now on the east side of the range. The state was unable to show that Wheeler knew the watch had been stolen and, having agreed to procure the return of the watch, he was discharged.

### Rancher Injured.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Missoula, Nov. 8.—J. O. Fulton, a Grant creek rancher, was brought to town with a badly lacerated hand, caused by an explosion of a cartridge he was endeavoring to put in a Winchester rifle. He may possibly lose his hand.

### BUYS AMERICAN MACHINERY.

Porto Rico Sugar Company Spends \$1,000,000 With Uncle Sam. (By Associated Press.) New York, Nov. 8.—Nearly \$1,000,000 worth of American equipment, machinery, etc., has just been ordered by the South Porto Rico Sugar company of this city, for installation in its Porto Rico plantations. The company is capitalized at \$3,000,000.
