TREASURER IS BUSY

DELINQUENT TAX EXPIRATIONS INCREASE WORK.

UNUSUAL PROMPTNESS SHOWN

Prosperous Condition of Laboring Men in the Smelter City Indicated by Large Percentage of Taxes Already Paid.

(Special to Inter Mountain.) Anaconda, Nov. 14.—The office of County Treasurer Twoby has been a busy place this week and probably will be until the close of the present month, when all unpaid taxes will become delinquent. Monday and Tuesday of this week were paydays, and many of the employees of the smelters who own their own homes have paid up their taxes for this year.

Treasurer Twoby stated to an Inter Mountain representative that taxpayers have shown a disposition to be very prompt in making their payments, and the indications are that the delinquent list this year will be much smaller than usual.

This speaks well for the condition of the town, particularly for the laboring classes, who have had lucrative employment during the year and who have managed to lay aside a good part of their earnings in preparation to meet their taxes when they became due.

The merchants also report a favorable increase in business this month over last, and everyone anticipates a large Christmas trade in December.

RUNAWAYS ARE NUMEROUS.

Caused Mostly by Leaving Teams Untied on the Street.

Anaconda, Nov. 14.—Almost every day in Anaconda there is a runaway of some sort, caused in most instances by the simple fact that people neglect to tie their horses. No one has been hurt late, but it is only a matter of time when some serious injury will result.

It is no uncommon sight to see a horse attached to a delivery wagon running down some side street with the driver giving chase two or three blocks in the rear.

Occasionally groceries are scattered for a short distance, but just the same that driver will be repeating the performance inside a week at the most. He may make a vow to throw out his weight every time he stops, but it is a cinch that he will not do it more than two or three times.

Ranchers also have a habit of leaving their horses untied on the street. Only a few days ago a team left in this manner ran away down Park avenue and crowded another horse through a large plate glass window. There were several persons just inside the glass, but as it happened none of them were injured. Had any one of them been struck with a flying fragment of glass, however, the incident might have resulted differently.

CAIRNS CLOSING TONIGHT.

Evangelist Will Close a Successful Campaign.

ONE FINAL SEARCH.

Two Hundred Men From New Works Are Scouring the Hills for Glynn.

Anaconda, Nov. 14.—Under the leadership of E. B. Powell, about 200 men employed at the new works took a day off today to make one final search for young Glynn, the boy who has been missing for several weeks. The party will scour the hillsides instead of going through the valleys.

All hope of finding the young man alive has long since been abandoned, but the searching parties believe they will in time find the dead body. There is but little territory that has not been looked over thoroughly, and the chances of finding the remains are daily diminishing.

Will Be Present at Initiatory Ceremonies There Tonight.

Jorgenson Case Dismissed.

Anaconda, Nov. 14.—The case of Mary Crosswhite and Lena Johnson against Mary and Chris Jorgenson, has been dismissed in the district court at the costs of the plaintiffs. The suit was brought several months ago to have the will of the mother of the plaintiffs and Mr. Jorgenson broken.

In the will Mrs. Jorgenson left her ranch in the valley to her son, which seemed objectionable to her daughters, who were each given \$1000 at the time of their marriage. This being the case it was concluded to drop the suit without prejudice.

Ejectment Suit Started.

Anaconda, Nov. 14.—Adolph Pincus is the plaintiff in a suit for ejectment against B. Giancoli, Louis Blommert and Americo Giancoli, filed in the district court this morning. The defendants are in possession of the premises known as lot 16, block 23, of the Eastern addition to Anaconda, which they are alleged to have refused to do. Judgment is asked for by the plaintiff for the possession of the property in question, \$100 damages and \$300, the value placed upon rentals, the plaintiff alleges he has been deprived of, together with the costs of suit.

COPINUS WEARS BRACELETS.

Louis' Laudable Desire for Information Causes Him Some Embarrassment.

Anaconda, Nov. 14.—It will be many a day before Louis Copinus plays with handcuffs again.

This forenoon Mr. Copinus walked into the office of Justice James Quane to make a friendly call. After conversing with Justice Quane and Attorney Jno W. James for a few moments he espied a pair of handcuffs lying on the desk used by Constable Jake Rentz.

He picked them up to examine the mechanism of the "bracelet" and in doing so placed the clasp over his wrist. Attorney James saw the opportunity to play a joke on the young man and when an opportunity presented itself and his victim caught unawares, he suddenly grasped the handcuff and instantly the automatic lock fastened it securely.

Constable Rentz, of course, had the keys and he was up at the courthouse where he had gone with a prisoner.

Mr. Copinus was in a serious dilemma for a time and could not get relieved of his "jewelry" until he started out on his bicycle, to find the constable with the hand cuff dangling from his arm.

IN POLICE CIRCLES.

Two Cases of Disturbance of the Peace the Only Offenses Yesterday.

Anaconda, Nov. 14.—In the police court this morning came one John Doe charged with having created a disturbance at the masquerade ball last night, and refusing to keep order after being forcibly ejected from the hall two different times. He pleaded drunkenness as his excuse, and was fined \$15 by acting Police Judge Quane with sentence suspended during his future good behavior.

John O'Brien, who says he has been working at Gregson Springs for several months past, was arrested yesterday by Constable Rentz for using loud and abusive language on the street and making a general nuisance of himself. He was arraigned in Justice Quane's court this morning and pleaded drunkenness as an excuse.

Judge Quane sentenced him to 60 days in the county jail and then suspended sentence for 15 minutes. O'Brien made elegant use of the short time given him and when search was made had disappeared from view.

DAMAGE CASE ON TODAY.

Father Wants Damages for Injuries Received by His Child.

Anaconda, Nov. 14.—No criminal cases came up for trial in the district court this morning, the entire time of the court being taken up with matters of a civil nature.

The first case taken up was the suit for damages brought by P. J. Taverina against McCallum & Cloutier, in which the plaintiff seeks to recover \$5000 damages for injuries sustained by his child several months ago by being run over by a delivery wagon owned by the defendants.

The plaintiff alleges that while his child was playing out upon the street near his home, the driver of the wagon was not giving attention to his duties and through gross recklessness drove the vehicle over the youngster, breaking the bone of one of his limbs. Damages to the amount of \$5000 is asked for.

The case was not concluded at a late hour this afternoon.
