MEN FOR THE ARMY

ODD SCENES AT THE CITY HALL RECRUITING STATION.

PATHOS, HUMOR AND TRAGEDY.

Young Woman Prevents Her Sweetheart From Enlisting—Banchman Desires to Go In as a Major or Captain.

"Say, general, you're not going to take my sweetheart away from me, are you? Look at me, and then say you will not let him enlist."

A young woman pleaded to her utmost to prevent the recruiting officers at the city hall from taking the man of her choice away from her.

Lieut. J. F. Janda of the Eighth Infantry, stationed at Fort Harrison, had not so far forgot those flirtations on the veranda of a certain hotel outside of the guard lines at "The Point" that he could say "no" to the little woman pleading for her future happiness.

So the would-be "rookie" wasn't taken. Pathos, Humor and Tragedy.

There is pathos, humor and the stern tragedy of a wasted life taken in by the men who enlist soldiers to serve for Uncle Sam.

Sometimes it's funny—sometimes it's sad. But then, men are sworn to do their duty, and it doesn't make much difference either way the scale of judgment stands.

There's always heart-breaks—always stories of misspent lives and stories of how a man could seek refuge in the army of the United States because he hasn't the convents of the olden days.

"Recruiting, in a way, is an escape of the routine of duty to the young officer," said an army officer today. "In one of those 'afterwhites' of the Hoosier poet, it's misery to face a discipline far beyond the usual care-free routine of a barracks or a camp."

"A recruiting officer becomes one of two things—a callous martinet, insensible to the feelings of humanity as the average county constable—or an officer human-bred enough to recognize the sufferings of others, and he is consequently a better commander in every respect because he has come in contact with the sufferings of the outer world, which he doesn't know beyond his top sergeant in the barracks life."

No Advantage Taken.

There are men recruiting now who wouldn't take advantage of the misfortunes of the men who apply.

Four times yesterday and today men who were in every way qualified physically were refused admission to the army because there were others who would suffer by their enlistment.

One woman who applied at the city hall was an aged mother, who insisted that her son should enlist. She admitted during the close questioning that her boy had been incorrigible, and that while her sole support, she wanted him in the army for fear he would get into the reform school or the penitentiary.

Kindly, but firmly, she was told that there was no place for incorrigibles in the army.

Surgeon E. T. Gibson was approached this morning by a lank individual who hailed from the Daly ranches.

"Is this where you take men for the army?" he inquired.

"This is the right place," answered the surgeon.

Visitor Grows Confidential.

"Well, now I'll tell you," said the visitor's voice took on a confidential tone, "I'm tired of working on the farm, and I saw in the papers that men were wanted to fight the natives in the Philippines."

"I am willing to enlist as colonel, or if the places of that kind are filled I will even take a place as captain, or possibly as major."

"I have been getting \$40 a month and my board where I was, but I don't like the long hours—from before sunrise until long after sunset, so I've decided to join."

CREST FROM SPAIN

ROYAL EMBLEM NOW IN POSSESSION OF CAPT. L. P. SANDERS.

CAPTURED IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Relic, of Pleasing Design and Gaudy With Color, Hangs On a Wall in An Office in the Hennessy Building.

Captain L. P. Sanders has recently received from Manila a royal crest of Spain, probably the only emblem of that country now in this country outside of the Spanish embassy at Washington.

The crest is one that was taken in the Philippine campaign, and the associations connected with it renders the curio of no small value.

It is gaudy with color and the artist's design is pleasing, doubtless the work of a royal designer who fashioned it in the Spanish capital years ago.

Surmounting the crest is the crown of Spain and displayed upon the disk which swells out shield-like below, are the emblems of Spain's four provinces.

The orange and the laurel are twined in a wreath about the base of the shield and hanging pendant is the emblem of the Golden Fleece. A pomegranate, chains and other insignia of the royal house complete the design.

"That is the last of my collection," said Mr. Sanders this afternoon as he hung the royal bauble on the wall of his law office in the Hennessy building.

"I have made a complete collection of Filipino curios and as relics of the Spanish occupants of the Philippines I have this crest and a couple of the ancient halberds brought to the islands in the early days of the Spanish explorations."

"I have compared my collection with others I have seen, and I think I have nearly everything that is of interest that can be picked up in the islands."

"I am going to call this crest the cap sheaf of the harvest of curios, and say the collection is complete."
