## LOVERS QUARREL

CAUSES MISS HANDLEY TO SUICIDE AT CHANCE.

## JUST AS SOON BE DEAD

Fearing That She Had Wrecked a Young Man's Life a Beautiful Woman Takes Poison.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)  
Red Lodge, Dec. 9.—A telephone message from Chance, 20 miles south of Red Lodge, states that Miss Fanny Hundley, daughter of Joseph Hundley, original locator of the Rocky Fork coal mines, committed suicide at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, because of an affair of the heart.  
The young lady, who is 17 years old, had been keeping company with a prominent young rancher, and the two had a lovers' quarrel yesterday morning. Shortly before 4 in the afternoon, Miss Hundley told her mother that she had wrecked the young man's life and would just as soon be dead as not. No particular attention was paid to the remark, and the young lady went to her room and swallowed a dose of poison. A few minutes later she was discovered in a semi-conscious condition, and died before medical assistance could be summoned.  
Miss Hundley was a beautiful young lady, greatly beloved, and the sad affair has cast a gloom over the community.  
She leaves besides her father and mother, two sisters, who are married to the sons of Former County Commissioner John Mulherin of Absarokee.

## GAMBLING CASES DISMISSED.

Impossible to Secure a Conviction on the Evidence.

Kalspell, Dec. 9.—The case of the state against Jerry Phillips and Tom Kerwin, charged with conducting gambling games, came up for hearing Friday before Justice Sullivan. The state was represented by the county attorney and the defense by Attorney Sidney M. Logan. The only witness for the state was the complainant, J. M. Murphy, a notorious gambler.  
The defense sought to show that Murphy had approached the defendants with an offer to compound the offense and the answers of the witness to the questions of the defendants' attorney were so shifty and evasive that at the end of his testimony the county attorney moved to dismiss the cases upon the ground that it would be impossible to secure a conviction upon such testimony in the district court. This was accordingly done.  
Constable Beckman of Jennings arrived in Kalspell last night having in custody one Williams, who is wanted in Crookston, N. D., for obtaining money under false pretenses. A North Dakota sheriff will come to Kalspell for the purpose of taking Williams back with him.

## EVENING OF MUSIC.

### Pleasing Program Given by St. Cecilia's Musical Club.

## SWEETGRASS FINANCES.

The Collection of Taxes Progressing Favorably.

Big Timber, Dec. 9.—The tax levy in Sweetgrass county for the fiscal year closing was \$62,392.21 and the total collections were \$59,733.52, the balance of uncollected taxes being \$2,658.69. The collection of taxes was concluded at the treasurer's office Thursday night.  
The taxes collected during the last two days exceeded over one-third of the total amount collected. The major portion of the delinquency of \$2,658.69 will yet be collected and the total tax will be very closely paid up when the last dollar is taken in.  
The tax levy of this year exceeds that of 1900 by \$7,644.27 and the per cent of delinquency is considerable smaller.



Yellowstone County the First to Secure It.

A special agent visited the county recently and went over the proposed route, which covers an area of 10 miles west of Billings and made a report favoring the establishment of the route. Now comes word of the appointment of S. J. Hopple, the well-known ranchman, as carrier for the new route, with his son, Harry Hopple, as substitute.  
Mr. Hopple has filed his bond with the local postmaster and the same has been forwarded East.  
Over 500 families are to be served by the system.
