TO TAP THE VEIN

DEVELOPMENT WORK ON THE NEW COAL MINE

MAKING SPLENDID HEADWAY

Anaconda's New Mine Is Being Systematically Worked by Both Shaft and Tunnel—New Hoisting Plant Installed.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Anaconda, Dec. 9.—Much interest is being manifested in the progress of development work at the new coal mine recently discovered just across the north limits of Anaconda. I. Rosenstein, one of the principal owners of the property, states that very good headway has been made with the shaft since it was started some time ago. A depth of over 30 feet has been attained, and it is thought an additional 30 feet will take the bottom out of the shaft into the vein disclosed in the tunnel run into the mountain from Newcomb's gulch. The shaft is being secured and permanently timbered as it goes down.

The timbers for the galloways frame to be used with the new hoisting plant are on the ground and will be sent in place over the shaft in a few days. Before the close of the present week all the machinery will be on the ground and possibly installed.

Whenever the new hoist is put in running order much better headway can be made in the pushing of the shaft to the deep.

The owners of the Black Diamond mine, as it is called, expect to tap the main vein by the close of the year, at least they are looking forward to such an event about that time.
