Cheapest Pay in Government Employ.

Charley Burton, who handles the mail on his stage coaches from Burnside to Monticello, is one of the best known mountain characters in eastern Kentucky. He possesses the unique distinction of receiving less from the government for his services than any of his many thousand mail carriers. Prior to McKinley's second election Burton made \$1800 a year out of the contract, which he had held for a number of years. It occurred to other citizens of Monticello that Burton had too good a thing of it to continue in undisturbed possession. So they determined to underbid him at the next thing. When the newspapers containing advertisements for bids on the contract reached Monticello Burton was approached by a committee of citizens.

"Look here, Charley," said the spokesman, "you have been carrying these mails long enough, and we are going to underbid you for the next four years' contract. We can run the coach cheaper than you can, and by George, you might as well quit right now."

"I am not out of the business yet," was all that Burton would reply.

When the bids were opened at Washington Burton was the easiest kind of a winner. Instead of bidding \$7,200 for the four years' contract he bid one cent. He had underbid his rivals by nearly \$7000, and when the contract came from Washington he and his friends fittingly celebrated the victory. He is now carrying the mails for one-fourth of a cent a year. The postoffice department has notified him that it cannot make any part payments on this contract, but will settle the full account at the expiration of the four years. Carrying the mail has always been only an incident to Burton's business. He does the bulk of the hauling from Burnside, the only railroad station, for a number of small towns in that section.—Cincinnati Enquirer.

A Gambler's Legacy.

The strong box in the Fifth Avenue Safe Deposit company's vaults at 190 Fifth avenue, in which Alfred Hallenbeck, known as the "honest gambler," and who died last February, deposited his superfluous wealth, was opened. Instead of being filled with worthless paper, as was expected, the box contained \$1000 in bank notes, numerous jewels, bonds and securities said to be worth at least \$150,000. Besides, there was a quantity of I. O. U.'s.

Hallenbeck kept a gambling house at 207 West Forty-fifth street for many years. Before his death he had given the keys of his strong box to his wife and, according to her story, told her that there was a considerable fortune for her in the box.

Upon opening the box everybody present gasped for breath. At one corner of the box was a deep package of \$1000 bills, surrounded by a heap of loose diamonds, rubies and emeralds.

There was at least a full handful of diamonds, besides many other pieces and assortments of valuable jewelry. There were brooches studded with all manner of gems, necklaces, bracelets, aligrettes, stars, crescents and stars of diamonds, rings and pins. Under all these jewels, heaped up indiscriminately, were the bonds and securities.

The contents of the box represented at least \$150,000, if not more. The stories of the necklaces, bracelets and stars collected in a man's gambling house would make most interesting reading if all the details could be known.—New York Times.
