## REWARD IS LARGE

**BIG MONEY OFFERED FOR CAPTURE OF H. J. FLEISHMAN.**

## BUTTE POLICE GET CIRCULAR

**Los Angeles Officials Trying Hard to Get Their Hands Upon Man Wanted on Charge of Embezzlement.**

According to a circular received by Chief of Police Reynolds Tuesday from Chief of Police Charles Elton of Los Angeles, Cal., there is a large reward awaiting the person or persons who can capture H. J. Fleishman, wanted in Los Angeles on a charge of embezzlement, and whose name has been broadcast in press dispatches.

Fleishman, it is alleged, swindled the Farmers and Mechanics' bank of Los Angeles. The amount of his alleged embezzlement is given as \$100,000.

## Well and Favorably Known.

He was well and favorably known in his home city, and was considered highly respectable and eminently trustworthy. Fleishman, it is said, fled from the city of Los Angeles December 7, and the police believe he took with him the greater portion of the money he is accused of embezzling. Where he went is of course not known, but it is supposed he came in the direction of Butte.

Immediately after it was discovered that the Farmers & Mechanics' bank had been swindled a descriptive circular asking for the arrest of Fleishman was sent out to the police of various cities. It is one of these circulars which has been received by Chief Reynolds.

## Two Pictures Shown.

The circular is a elaborate affair, and contains two pictures in different poses of the man wanted, and a facsimile of his handwriting and signature.

It describes Fleishman as about 5 feet 7 or 8 inches in height; weight about 145 pounds; brown eyes, brown mustache and hair, the latter thin on top; well dressed and wearing an iron ring of peculiar design.

It is further stated in the circular that \$5000 will be paid for the arrest of Fleishman and his return with the money al-

leged to have been embezzled to Los Angeles.

In the event that Fleishman is captured without the money in question a reward of \$2500 will be paid to the persons effecting his capture.

## UNPLEASANT FANCIES

TWO PEOPLE WHO HAVE THEM GO TO ASYLUM.

### M. MORTIMER ONE OF THEM

Thomas Keveitte, Boy From Kalspell, Another—Removed Today—McCabe Has Bad Case of Tremens.

Two patients for the state insane asylum at Warm Springs were taken away from the county jail this morning.

One was Morton Mortimer, the man yesterday adjudged to be insane by Judge McLernan, and the other a boy named Thomas Keveitte from Kalspell. Mortimer was taken to the asylum by Deputy Sheriff Dobson. He was quiet when he was shackled in order to avoid unpleasant difficulties providing he should become violent on the way to Warm Springs. Last night he was again visited by his brothers in the form of birds—in his mind—and he talked to the latter.

Keveitte is weak-minded naturally. He set fire to some places at Kalspell and engaged in other performances of a similar character, showing his irresponsibility. He did not resist going to the asylum, and went while the officer was taking him away this morning.

The county jail has another case within its walls which borders on insanity. It is the case of Ed McCabe, who was brought to the jail yesterday morning by his friends. McCabe is suffering with delirium tremens, and he has a bad attack of them.

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### Troubled With Visions.

He gave his name as Mike O'Farrell when he was put behind the bars. All night last night and this morning McCabe was troubled with visions that made him jump in and out of his bunk very rapidly and throw tin cups and cans around his cell in a lively way.

He was put in the "boxcar" finally, and he then began to kill insects on the walls—in his mind. He varied this with the labor of loading logs on a wagon and running a freight train.

He would grip the bars of the "boxcar" door and strain and heave as he lifted the logs, and he would give directions to the other trainmen on the train.

## PLEADINGS FILED

DONE BY STIPULATION IN A MACGINNISS SUIT.

## ACTION WAS ENJOINED LATELY

**Motion to Strike in Latest MacGinniss-Boston & Montana Case Filed by Agreement Between the Parties.**

Two pleadings were filed yesterday in the suit recently brought by John MacGinniss against the Boston & Montana Mining company and A. S. Bigelow, J. J. Ladd, E. C. Perkins, Edwin S. Grew, Joseph S. Bigelow, Leonard Lewisohn, Frank Klepetchko and Charles W. Goodale. The pleadings were filed by the plaintiff, although this is the suit in which the United States court issued an order to the plaintiff to cease prosecuting the suit.

The pleadings were filed by stipulation between the parties, agreeing that the plaintiff might plead to the defendant's answer and that such act should never be construed or alleged to be a violation of the injunction order or a contempt of the court.

### Stipulation and Motion.

The pleadings filed were the stipulation and a motion to strike from the defendant's answer. The stipulation was signed by Attorneys Forbis & Evans for the defendants and McHutton & Cotter for the plaintiff.

The motion to strike asks that certain portions of the defendant's answer be stricken out "on the ground and for the reasons that the same are sham and irrelevant, and constitute no defense to the plaintiff's complaint or cause of action, and that the same are insufficient on their face to state or in any wise state this action, or to constitute any defense to the plaintiff's case of action."

This is the latest case brought by MacGinniss to have a receiver appointed for the Boston & Montana company's property, and to enjoin it from permitting the Amalgamated company to assume control of it, and from paying the latter dividends.

### To Be Heard January 2.

The order requiring MacGinniss to show cause why it should not be stayed till the suit of similar character pending in the federal court is determined will come up before Judge Knowles on January 2, 1902.

## SYSTEM OF BLOCKS

IT IS TO BE INSTALLED ON THE OREGON SHORT LINE.

## EJECTION OF PASSENGERS

**New Rule Governing Their Removal From Trains for Failure to Pay Fare—Their Safety Must Not Be Jeopardized.**

The block system for governing the running of trains is being installed by the Oregon Short Line between this city and Salt Lake, and as soon as the California extension south of Salt Lake is completed it will be adopted on that end.

The work of establishing it on this end is now in progress between Pocatello and Idaho Falls. The system will not be ready before spring, by which time the employees will be quite familiar with it.

Under the new arrangement the entire line is divided into blocks, the division points being marked by semaphore.

Not more than one train is allowed within a block at a time.

The position of the arm of the semaphore during the day and the color of the lights in the tower at night indicate whether the block is clear or contains another train.

Green indicates safety, green and red caution and red alone means stop.

The Short Line has also adopted a new rule relative to train orders. On nearly all roads, including the Union Pacific, the conductor of a train receipts for two orders and gives one to the engineer, but the Short Line has decided to have the orders receipted for by both the engineer and conductor, so that responsibility may be fixed.

The Union Pacific and Oregon Railway & Navigation officials intend to adopt this plan.

The wreck on the Wabash road a short time ago is partly responsible for the change.

In that case the engineer claimed he had not received the order naming the point at which his train should meet one bound in the opposite direction, and the conductor asserted he had turned it over to him.

The matter therefore narrowed to a question of veracity between the two.

Another new rule governing the ejection of persons from trains has also been adopted by the Short Line and other Western roads.

It is as follows: "Should anyone be found upon a train without proper transportation such person must be required to pay fare; and in case of refusal, should be requested to leave the train. If he refuses to leave peacefully he should be ejected by the conductor, only such force being used as is necessary for his removal, and in no case with unnecessary violence, harsh language or display of ill-temper."

The action must be made by the conductor, as an act of legal duty, only

in a reasonable manner and at a proper place within station limits.

"It should not be at a place, in such weather or at such unreasonable hours of the night as might ordinarily endanger the health or safety of the person ejected; and the person ejected must not be a child of tender years, a person of unsound mind or a person in such feeble or helpless condition as to be unable to take care of himself at the point of ejection."
