DIED LAST NIGHT

ROY LIDDELL MEETS WITH A SAD ACCIDENT.

SHOT THROUGH THE HEART

His Own Gun Falls From His Pocket and Explodes—Wonderful Nerve Displayed by the Young Man.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Anaconda, Dec. 19.—Coroner Hughes will conduct an inquest at 7 o'clock this evening over the remains of Roy Liddell, the 19-year-old lad who met a tragic death in Lost Creek canyon early yesterday morning.

The body of the unfortunate boy was brought to the city last evening by a team sent out from Ehret's undertaking parlors.

John Foster, a neighbor of the Liddell family, which resides at 1102 East Sixth street, related to a party of inquirers yesterday afternoon how the tragedy occurred.

The young man left town on Tuesday in company with a prospector, who wanted to go out to a mining property in upper Lost Creek. Young Liddell drove him out in a sleigh.

Dropped One of the Lines. He was well started on his way back when he dropped one of his lines. In reaching forward to pick it up, a .45-caliber pistol, which he had borrowed from Mr. Foster before starting on the trip, fell out of his cartridge belt.

It is supposed that it struck against the dashboard of the sled—any way it exploded—the bullet taking effect in the

vicinity of the heart, piercing the lung, passing entirely through the body and coming out just below the shoulder blade.

The wounded boy, although suffering intense pain and weakened by the loss of blood, displayed wonderful courage and drove some distance further to the Des Lauriers' ranch, where he sought assistance.

In turning the corner near the house the sleigh upset and he walked the balance of the distance.

Parents Are Notified. Mr. and Mrs. D. P. Liddell, parents of the young man, were promptly notified. The accident occurred about 5:30 o'clock and a few hours later they were at the bedside of their son, accompanied by Dr. F. L. St. Jean.

The latter saw at once that his services would not be needed, that the boy was mortally wounded and that it would be only a short while until the end would come.

The boy maintained his courage up to the last and conversed freely with his father and mother and told them how the accident occurred, but all the while he realized that he was about to die.

"I am dying by inches," he said once to those about him, "and I know the end will come soon."

Roy Liddell was formerly employed at the foundry department of the Anaconda Copper Mining company as a helper. His father was a moulder and also worked there.

The young man was popular with his associates.

Being the only son in the family the bereavement falls heavily upon the parents and two surviving sisters.

The funeral will be held some time tomorrow.

TREASURER TWOHY'S REPORT

Mailed for the State Treasurer Last Night.

Anaconda, Dec. 19.—County Treasurer Twohy completed the compilation of his annual report yesterday afternoon and mailed a copy of it to the state treasurer last evening.

The statement shows that on December 1, 1900, there was a balance to the credit of all the funds of \$202,284.16. During the year \$516,775.35 was collected, making a total of credits and revenue of \$719,059.51. Against this credit there was paid out \$523,907.63. The balance remaining on the right side of the ledger was \$195,151.88.

The following table shows the various sources whence came the money: Penalty interest and cost, \$455.09; Received from taxes, \$155,389.95; Delinquent taxes, \$6,613.10; Delinquent licenses, \$42,733.16; Delinquent county officers' fees, \$6,000.83; Inheritance tax, \$83,637.15; Other sources, \$85,895.88.

About 8 o'clock last evening Donahoe went to his room taking O'Brien and Hugh McElroy with him.

Donahoe says that McElroy was sent out to get a bottle of whisky and while he was gone Donahoe laid upon the bed with some money in his hand. O'Brien snatched this, then went through the others' pockets, he being in such a position that he could not defend himself.

Owens was called to attend the injured man and dressed his wounds which are painful but not at all serious. O'Brien was captured shortly after the robbery by Night Chief of Police O'Brien and Officer Marchion.

The matter will be investigated today.

CANDIDATES FOR THE REFORM SCHOOL

Boys in the Smelter City Who Desire to Go to the State Reform School.

Anaconda, Dec. 19.—Harold Cooley and James Sullivan, two Anaconda boys, aged respectively 14 and 13 years, want to be sent to the reform school at Miles City, charge of incorrigibility was filed by Constable Jake Rentz on information and belief.

The boys pleaded guilty to the charge and further surprised Justice of the Peace Quane by telling him that they wanted to be sent to the reform school.

The boys said they were tough, they knew it, and could not help it.

"Well," said Judge Quane to young Cooley, "why can't you get it?" "Because I cannot get along with my father," replied the lad.

"It's no use talking, I can't behave myself when he is around."

"It comes natural for me to be tough, I guess."

"It's because I can't get along at home that I want to go to the reform school." The Sullivan boy expressed himself in very much the same way. Both boys told tales of ill-treatment, which were not credited.

The case will be investigated, however, in the district court. The boys are about the same age, but one is considerably larger than the other.

STATE TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.
