SOLD FOR TAXES.

Birthplace of Abraham Lincoln in Kentucky Gone to Wreck. (By Associated Press.) Hodgenville, Ky., March 1.—The birthplace of Abraham Lincoln, near Hodgenville, is advertised as sheriff sale for taxes. A few years ago the place promised to be a property upon which the government would spend thousands of dollars, but it was bought by a company of Eastern capitalists with the intention of making it a public park.

Released on Turkish Territory.

London, March 1.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Daily Chronicle believes it to be practically certain that the Bulgarian government instructed the brigands not to release Miss Stone on Bulgarian soil and this accounts for the delay in the liberation of the captives, as the brigands had no alternative until the released Turkish cordon allowed the brigands to smuggle Miss Stone and Mme. Tsilka through.

MINNIE HEALEY MATTER AGAIN BEFORE JUDGE CLANCY.

HEINZE SEEKING INJUNCTION

Wants Temporary Restraining Order Continued During Pendency of Suit—Injunction Which Was Modified by Supreme Court.

The Minnie Healey injunction matter in which F. Augustus Heinze and the Johnstown Mining company are plaintiffs, and the Boston & Montana Mining company is the defendant, was again before Judge Clancy this afternoon. It was up on an order to show cause, directed against the defendant.
