### WARM WELCOME

#### HENRY LANDS AT CUXHAVEN YESTERDAY EVENING.

#### HIS LAST WORD OF GREETING

Says That He Is Deeply Grateful for the Many Kindnesses He Received While in the United States.

(By Associated Press.)

Cuxhaven, March 19.—The Hamburg-American liner Deutschland arrived here at 6 o'clock this evening from Cherbourg, having on board Prince Henry of Prussia and his suite.

The Deutschland was met in the roadstead by the German battleship Kaiser Wilhelm II., on board of which was the emperor. His majesty greeted Prince Henry cordially. The prince boarded the battleship, which afterwards started for Kiel.

As the steamer drew near Cuxhaven Prince Henry received the correspondent of the Associated Press in his cabin. The prince said:

Talked With Reporters.

"I desire to send a last word through you to America, to say how deeply grateful I am for the measureless kindness I received while I was there. I tried to say this before I left, but I want again to state that I am grateful for the cordial and generous manner in which the people and president received me.

"I met and talked with as many individuals as I could, but, of course, I saw most of the people in crowds and sometimes only from the railroad car platform and only long enough to touch my cap or take off my hat to them.

"I wish to thank all those thousands for the trouble they took." The prince spoke with feeling.

"I had no opportunity," he said, "of studying the details of industry as I would like to have done."

As to the fatigue of the trip, the prince said: "It was often tired and had to be careful what I said, both publicly and privately. But since my long sleep on board the Deutschland I would be ready to return to America at once for just such another trip. This one has been so full of pleasure and instruction.

"It is a good thing to look upon people face to face and form your own impressions."

### SENT TO ASYLUM

#### MATT HALLERAN WAS ADJUDGED INSANE TODAY.

#### EXAMINED BY A COMMISSION

##### When He Claimed to Be an Anaconda Alderman All Doubt Was Removed and He Was Sent to the Asylum.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Anaconda, March 19.—Matt Halleran, arrested three or four times during the past six months on the charge of insanity but always dismissed, was examined this morning before a board, consisting of Chairman Kellher of the county commissioners, Drs. Evans and Owens, and ordered committed to the asylum at Warm Springs.

Halleran's hallucinations have taken almost every conceivable form. First he imagined himself a fireman and raised Cain with the hose wagon one morning. Another time he tried to arrest a fellow and beat him up with a club because he would not peaceably come to the police station.

Later he got funny and kicked in the door of a Commercial avenue house, laughing all the time.

In his last stunt he had been appointed special policeman to put a stop to much of the heavy drinking going on in the city. In this capacity he brought to the police station a drunken man named Rogers.

They were both locked up, and Rogers was afterwards dismissed. Halleran was taken to the county jail.

He also stated to the chief of police that he was an assistant of President McKinley's, and as such was in charge of the Anaconda postoffice.

When he finally proclaimed himself a member of the city council all doubts as to his mental condition were removed. He will be taken to Warm Springs immediately.

Halleran was formerly an oiler at the lower works and a hard-working and industrious man.

He has never been a hard drinker.

### FIXED THE APPOINTMENT

#### Ways and Means Committee of City Council Meets.

Anaconda, March 19.—The ways and means committee of the city council met last night at the city hall and made up the apportionment for the distribution of funds for the next fiscal year, beginning May 1.

Alderman Steurnagle, it is said, did not concur with his colleagues and will submit a minority report.

### DELEGATES CHOSEN

#### REPUBLICAN PRIMARIES PASSED OFF QUIETLY YESTERDAY.

#### FOUR SCRATCHED TICKETS

##### Little Interest Taken in Most of the Wards and the Caucus Tickets Went Through Almost Unanimously.

Anaconda, March 19.—The republican city primaries held yesterday passed off quietly and resulted in the election of the caucus candidates as delegates to the city convention, which convenes at the city hall on next Tuesday evening.

There were some rumors of a second ticket in the Fourth ward early in the day, but the report proved to be without foundation, and everything went along harmoniously.

In some of the wards the interest shown was slight, but on the whole, for a primary election, the vote cast was very good.

In the First ward 25 votes were cast; in the Second, 45; in the Third, 38; in the Fourth, 72; in the Fifth, 28; in the Sixth, 60. Only two wards registered scratched tickets.

Two scratched ballots were found in the Second and two in the Fourth; the rest were all straight caucus tickets.

### FOR SOLDIER BOYS

#### CAPT. HALLAHAN ENCOURAGED BY MONTANA'S SENATORS.

#### TRAVEL PAY FOR PRIVATES

##### The Astor Battery and Members of Sixteen Regiments Have This Amount of Money Due Them—Bills Now in Congress.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Anaconda, March 19.—Capt. John Hallahan, late of the First Montana infantry in the Philippine campaign, has been actively engaged for some time past in bringing to the notice of the legislators at Washington the fact that travel pay from Manila to San Francisco is due the soldiers that served in Astor's New York battery and to the soldiers of 16 different regiments from as many states. Among these is Montana.

The amount in question amounts to about \$300 each to privates, and a correspondingly larger amount to officers.

As a result of some of his energetic work, Captain Hallahan yesterday received the following letter from Senator W. A. Clark at Washington:

"I have your letter of the 1st inst. in relation to the bill for the payment of travel pay to the soldiers of the Astor battery and to the soldiers of 16 different regiments from as many states. I will present to the senate as a memorial and request its reference to the committee on military affairs, and support in any way I can to secure desired legislation.

"Yours respectfully," "W. A. CLARK."

Another letter, received by Joseph E. Jette from Senator Gibson, was as follows:

"From Senator Gibson. "I am in receipt of letter of the 1st inst., signed by yourself and the president of Thomas Seafon Post Spanish-American War Veterans, calling my attention to S. 2988 and the bills H. R. 9222, 9523 and 9859, for relief of volunteers who served in the Philippines.

"I am in sympathy with them, believing that they are just, and I will gladly do what I can to secure favorable action upon one of them.

"Yours respectfully," "PARIS GIBSON."

This will be a snug amount of money for the boys to receive, and from present appearances it will be distributed before a great while.

Those soldiers who were discharged in Manila have already received this money, but those who returned to the United States before mustering out have not.

#### CONLEY COMES HOME.

##### Brings Convicts O'Connor and Kinnear to Testify in Kilrain Case.

Anaconda, March 19.—Sheriff Jack Conley returned last night from Phillipsburg, where he has been attending court for several days as a witness in the Hunter murder trial.

On his return home Sheriff Conley stopped at Deer Lodge for Con O'Connor and Peter Kinnear, convicts in the penitentiary, and brought them to Anaconda to appear as witnesses in the hearing of Jake Kilrain, before Justice of the Peace James Quane tomorrow.

Kilrain is a negro, now serving time in the county jail. A few days before Kinnear was taken to the penitentiary to serve out his sentence of one year for shooting young Willie Clusman, he was attacked and beaten badly by the negro, who took this means of satisfying an ill feeling he had against the former police officer who once placed him under arrest, resulting in his serving out a sentence in jail.

Kilrain will be compelled to face the charge of assault in the third degree for disfiguring Kinnear's facial anatomy.

#### DEMOCRATS GET ACTIVE.

##### Chairman Collins Issues Call for City Convention.

Anaconda, March 19.—The democrats of the Smelter City will enter actively into the municipal campaign on Friday by holding caucuses in each ward in the evening.

On Saturday primary elections will be held in each ward from 4 to 8 o'clock p. m., and on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock the city convention will be called to order at the city hall, when the formalities of naming candidates for aldermen will be gone through with.

#### An Asylum on Fire.

(By Associated Press.)

Jackson, Miss., March 19.—The state institution for the deaf and dumb in this city, is on fire and it is feared will be totally destroyed. It is a large building and located in the heart of the residence section of Jackson. The 150 inmates were gotten out safely.

Concerning his speech at Philadelphia, the prince said: "It seemed proper I should make some such utterance, for there are always some undercurrents running that have to be taken into account. What I said in my Philadelphia speech was precisely the truth. It might have been thought that during my talk with President Roosevelt and my ride with him alone I might have said a word or two of a political character, but such was not the case. No political topic was referred to on either side.

Prince Henry referred to President Roosevelt's attentions and said he had not received the president's farewell telegram, as he was by that time at sea and that he only saw the text of the message upon his arrival at Plymouth. The interest Emperor William takes in Prince Henry's trip was then mentioned. In this connection Prince Henry said to the correspondent:

"I shall tell his majesty exactly what I have told you; namely, how I appreciate the kindness shown me by the people of America. I wish to add a special word of thanks for the sympathetic way in which the American papers treated me."
