M'KINLEY PLACER AMENDED LOCATION FILED TODAY.

CAUSED MUCH CONTROVERSY

It Is Situated Above Warm Springs Creek and Not Far From Girard Gulch Where There Is Some Mining Excitement.

Anaconda, March 20.—An amended location to the McKinley placer mine was filed with the clerk and recorder. Location named were Clarence N. Davidson, Charles A. Atwater, Julia Atwater, Ira Gosse and Annie Davidson.

This claim has a history. It is located near the new works, and was the cause of a great deal of controversy as regards class and ownership. The matter was carried to the land office in Washington, and a decision finally obtained from the secretary of the interior.

The transferring parties were John Rahn, Albert Lieger, William Reicksick, B. Kuyhal, E. E. F. Schaw, J. G. Link, Nick Kirveh, Paul Kuhout and Clem Barzen, all of Butte.

The exact location of the property is a short distance northeast of Warm Springs, being no great way from the new discoveries in Girard gulch, that caused so much excitement in the valley last fall.

The Butte No. 2 placer has been worked, however, for a number of years, and its yield in gold and precious stores has been considerable.

Under the ownership of the North-western Gold and Sapphire Mining company, it is thought that the development work will be carried to a much greater extent.

KILRAIN'S TRIAL TODAY.

Husky Negro Charged With Assault in Third Degree.

Anaconda, March 20.—Dave Kilrain, the colored man charged with assault in the third degree on the person of ex-policeman Peter Kineen while both were confined in the county jail, was brought up for trial before a jury at 2 o'clock today before Justice of the Peace Quane. Kineen and Con. O'Connor, the latter being a witness to the affair, were brought from the penitentiary in Deer Lodge to testify.

The assault on Kineen was made in a moment of rage by Kilrain. He was not even acquainted with the ex-policeman, but upon hearing that he had been a member of the police force, he thought to avenge his many arrests.

He has appeared in the Anaconda courts many times. It was reported that Con. O'Connor was also whipped by the negro but that is not true. Had O'Connor been mixed up in the fray it would no doubt have ended differently.

MET LAST NIGHT

JEFFERSON CLUB HAVE MEETING IN ANACONDA.

PLANNING CITY CAMPAIGN

Dennis O'Leary Makes a Speech and Travels Through Snow Drifts to Do It—Committees Are Appointed.

Anaconda, March 20.—The democrats who comprise the membership of the Jefferson club held a meeting last night in their club rooms in the Montana Meat company's building.

There was a fair attendance of the faithful, but enthusiasm was a missing quality to a very marked degree.

A number of speeches were made, most notable being that of Dennis O'Leary, superintendent of the county poor farm, who braved all the dangers of a blinding snow storm over a road seven miles in length in order to show his fealty to the cause which he has championed ever since he first set foot in Anaconda.

During the course of his remarks he made a great many suggestions as to how the campaign should be carried on.

He said that he was glad to see so many active democrats present at this meeting and implored everyone within his hearing to be up and doing for fear of another republican victory.

Mr. O'Leary referred to the "disgraceful scenes" in the city council chamber and said he hoped that there would be no repetition of such acts.

It is supposed that the former Sixth ward alderman cast reproach upon himself when he referred to the city council, for the most "disgraceful" scene witnessed there was when he made an attack with his fists upon a colleague from the Second ward and succeeded in breaking up the meeting entirely.

County Attorney Duffy also spoke for a few minutes. He advised that some one be appointed from each ward to see that all democrats are registered.

The suggestion was put in the form of a motion and was carried. The following were appointed: First ward, C. J. Healy; Second ward, Hugh Daly; Third ward, Mike Mulroy; Fourth ward, Dan Lyons; Fifth ward, Pat McGee; Sixth ward, Ed Devine.

William Kellher of the executive committee stated that the committee had attended to a number of affairs relative to the welfare of the club and had also looked upon available aldermanic timber.

It was inferred from his remarks that the ticket had been made up and would receive the sanction of the convention when it meets next Monday.

Mr. Kellher reported that all arrangements had been completed for the holding of caucuses and primaries this week and that the furniture for the club room had cost \$150.

An adjournment was taken until next Tuesday evening.

BIG REGISTRATION IN ANACONDA

The Office Has Been Open But Two Days—Nearly 500 Names Taken.

SINGERS ARE READY

THE PINAFORE TO BE PRESENTED AT THEATER APRIL 4.

BY A HOME TALENT TROUPE

Cast and Chorus Will Consist of Forty People—Many of Anaconda's Best Vocalists Will Appear—To Go to Butte.

Anaconda, March 20.—Friday night, April 4, has been fixed as a definite date for the rendition of the "Pinafore" opera by a company of home talent singers, which has been practicing for the event under the direction of Prof. George E. Merrill for some time past.

"The costumes have been ordered," said Prof. Merrill today, "from San Francisco and are likely to arrive here almost any day. They are being furnished by the same house which supplied 'The Gondoliers,' played by home talent in Butte last year.

"The costumes will be quite gorgeous affairs and I am sure our company will appear quite imposing in them on the stage.

Forty People Engaged.

"The 'Pinafore' will be presented by 40 people. The cast will consist of 10 and the chorus of 30 persons. Among them are some of the best singers in the city and Montana.

"The Margaret theater orchestra will be augmented for the occasion and in addition to local players will be several singers of note.

"It was the intention at one time to give the opera about the first of the year, but on account of a number of annoying delays, including sickness among members of the organization, a postponement was made necessary until this late day.

"The public, however, will profit by it for the reason that the troupe has undergone a most careful training and have succeeded in wearing off some of the rough edges."

Proud of His Troupe.

Prof. Merrill is much delighted with the progress the singers have made and insists that there will be some surprises in store for Anaconda people when the play is put on the boards.

He ventures the assertion that no traveling troupe which has visited the Smelter City this season has appeared with a chorus anywhere equal to the one which will participate in the rendition of "The Pinafore."

The piece has been in preparation since last fall.

After performance in this city it is planned that the company will appear here, night at Sutton's Broadway theater in Butte.

In all probability the company will practice on the "Chimes of Normandy" after the close of the "Pinafore" season.

HERR MOST'S CASE

SAYS CONSTITUTION GUARANTEES FREE SPEECH.

HE DISTURBED PUBLIC PEACE

Contended That the Article by the Anarchist Was Calculated to Outrage Public Decency—Court Reserved Its Decision.

(By Associated Press.)

New York, March 20.—The appellate division of the supreme court has just heard arguments in the appeal taken by Herr Most, who was convicted in the court of special sessions for the publishing in the Freiheit on September 17, 1901, under the caption, "Murder vs. Murder," an article which it was contended was intended to irritate the public mind.

Herr Most contended that under section 8 of the state constitution, "Every citizen may freely speak, write or publish his sentiments on all subjects," and that the intention of the framers of the constitution would prevent any censorship of the press.

Counsel also contended that the article published was not libelous, and that it did not tend to commit a breach of the peace, and that it did not come within the inhibition of any express statute.

A representative of the district attorney's office contended that under the penal code Most had published an article which had disturbed the public peace and outraged public decency.

The justice reserved his decision.

COMING TO WASHINGTON.

General Wood Will Confer With the President.

New York, March 20.—Governor General Wood left Havana for Washington Wednesday night, at the request of President Roosevelt.

General Wood expressed his approval of the bill granting a tariff reduction of 20 per cent on Cuban products imported into the United States.

He takes the ground because a reduction so small will do no good to Cuba. He declares that the economic situation in the islands demands more tariff concessions, if they are to be of any avail, or that which all Cubans have hope for, complete commercial reciprocity.

CLEMENCY DENIED

LAST RAY OF HOPE FOR CLINTON DOTSON IS GONE.

WILL BE SENTENCED MONDAY

Governor Toole Advises the Condemned Man to Prepare for the Inevitable—Takes Away Last Shred of Hope.

(Special to Inter Mountain.)

Helena, March 20.—The last ray of hope that Clinton Dotson, convicted of a conspiracy to murder his father, may have entertained was extinguished yesterday afternoon by Governor Toole, who announced for the second time that he would not commute his sentence.

Governor Toole yesterday received the statement of Dotson, appealing for mercy. Just before leaving his office last evening Governor Toole addressed the following letter to Dotson, who is in the penitentiary at Deer Lodge:

"Dear Sir—I have received and carefully read your letter of the 14th instant, asking for executive clemency.

"You had a fair trial; you were found guilty of murder in the first degree; your counsel moved for a new trial, which was denied, and thereupon your case was appealed and the judgment of conviction and order overruling the motion for a new trial was, after patient investigation, affirmed by the supreme court of this state.

"In that opinion the court says: 'We are of the opinion that the evidence was sufficient to establish the fact that the defendant advised and encouraged McArthur to murder Oliver Dotson.'

"The deceased was your father, who, according to your own statement, had sent for you to come from a neighboring state that your material interests might be promoted.

"For such an unnatural crime as yours it is the judgment of the law that you shall die.

"You need all the time possible to prepare for this melancholy event. It is fitting, therefore, that I should act promptly.

"I accordingly advise you that I find nothing in your application to outweigh the solemn verdict of the jury who tried your case or the unanimous opinion of the supreme court that you advised and encouraged the murder of your father.

"I can only commend you to the sympathy and advice of those holy men who have been interested in you since your incarceration.

"Yours truly,
"JOSEPH K. TOOLE,
"Governor."

Judge Clements, who presided at Dotson's trial, will go from Helena to Deer Lodge Sunday, and sentence the perpetrator on Monday.
