The independent candidates were E. A. Ford of Centerville and Dan Tewey.

The meeting was presided over by A. F. Bray, who was chosen to take the chair, after the meeting had been called to order by J. E. Evans. Mr. Bray spoke of the importance of selecting good men for trustees and dilated upon the excellent school system enjoyed by the city at present.

**Was Some Oratory.**

**GET BIG DAMAGES**

VERDICT OF \$28,400 AWARDED TO PLYMOUTH LOBE OWNERS.

SILVER KING PEOPLE LOSE

Notable Trial for Damages, Injunction and Title Reaches an End—Jury Renders a Verdict Last Night.

The big mining suit which has been on trial in Judge Glancy's court for about three weeks, and in which the owners of the Plymouth lode claim sued the owners of the Silver King claim for \$30,000 damages, a permanent injunction and title to ledges of ore in the claims, came to an end last night.

The jury in the case rendered a verdict for the Plymouth lode people for \$28,400 damages and the other things asked for.

The owners of the Plymouth lode claim are C. P. Drennen, Mullins, James H. Maloney, A. E. Driggs and George A. Cobban. The owners of the Silver King are Silas P. King, James A. Murray and the Daly estate. James A. Talbot and Wakeman Sutton, who operated the mine under a lease for a time, are also defendants.

Jury Instructed Yesterday.

Yesterday morning the court was occupied in setting the instructions for the jury. In the afternoon the litigant parties were each allowed an hour for argument, Judge Glancy taking the position that two hours' talking would be sufficient. The case was submitted to the jury about 5 o'clock.

Judge J. J. McElhatton talked for the Plymouth lode side of the contention, and Attorney Peter Breen and P. T. McBride responded for the Silver King.

The two claims involved in the suit are out on the West Side on Quartz street near Jackson, one lying along side the other. The ledges in the ground were claimed by both sets of owners on the apex theory.

The jury evidently concluded that the plaintiff has the apex, and that the latter was damaged by the defendant, who took ore from the veins.

The case will be appealed to the supreme court. It took the jury only an hour to reach its conclusion in the matter.

**CHANGE OF POLICY**

OLIVE BRANCH TO BE EXTENDED BY NEW HEALTH OFFICER.

**DR. SULLIVAN IS INSTALLED**

Misunderstanding Over Doctor Leggat's Successor Settled by the Mayor and Harmonious Arrangement Made.

Mayor Davey took a hand in the health department tangle yesterday evening, and the result was the announcement of the appointment of Dr. T. J. Sullivan as successor to Dr. Leggat, former health officer.

The action of the mayor straightened out the tangle left by Dr. Leggat and which caused a misunderstanding.

Some months ago, when it was first decided that Dr. Leggat would leave, arrangements were made with the mayor to appoint Dr. Sullivan to the office. This was the understanding, and the appointment was to have been made about May 1, when it was understood that Dr. Leggat would resign and leave the city.

Place Has Been Promised.

The former health officer decided to leave sooner, and offered the position to Dr. Gunn. The latter accepted in good faith, and it was not until yesterday that he found that Dr. Sullivan had been promised the position by the mayor.

A conference was had with the mayor after Dr. Gunn had called on Dr. Sullivan and offered him the keys and the office. This offer was refused by Dr. Sullivan, who had refrained from making public his rights to the office until the mayor had confirmed Dr. Gunn.

The matter was arranged satisfactorily to all concerned, and it was given out that Dr. Gunn had been misinformed by the outgoing health officer.

Is a Well-Known Physician.

Dr. Sullivan is a well-known practitioner in the city. He was for some time the smallpox physician, and is well equipped for the administration of the affairs of the health department. He is vice president of the Silver Bow Medical association and has a wide experience in contagious diseases and sanitary matters.

The policy of the city health department will be changed considerably by the new commissioner as soon as his appointment by the mayor is confirmed by the city council.

The first move will be the extending of the olive branch to the county health department and the county commissioners, who were antagonized by the former commissioner to the extent that no cases of contagious disease would be handled by the county.

Would Be Handled By the County.

Though not officially announced, it is likely that the quarantine on Dr. O'Leary, the present county smallpox physician, will be removed, and that arrangements will be renewed with the county to care for any case that might develop in Butte.

Under the stringent rulings of Dr. Leggat any smallpox case developed was likely to be isolated without medical attention or any care whatever, as the physician who attended the case might be quarantined and the county would have nothing to do with a city case.
