

"DAVE" ZEARFOSS, BUTTE'S CRACK BATSMAN.



Dave Zearfoss is a native of Philadelphia, 28 years old. He first came into prominence as a catcher in the New York team of the National League in 1896 and 1897, but as that club was at that time well supplied with three first-class catchers in Farrell, Wilson and Warner, Zearfoss was crowded out of the chance to show his best work. In 1898 he was with Newark, (N. J.), of the Atlantic association, and in 1899 with Minneapolis in the Western league. In 1899 he was catcher of the Great Falls team of the Montana league, and last year was with Tacoma in the Pacific Northwest league. His batting and fielding averages show the following high standard of excellence: In 1896, batting 284, fielding 912; 1897, batting 276, fielding 940; 1898, batting 308, fielding 920; 1899, batting 276, fielding 914; 1900, batting 305, fielding 974; 1901, batting 276, fielding 926. Last year Zearfoss was crippled nearly all the season, and did not get a chance to show his true worth. He is a fine base-runner, a splendid thrower and a good batsman. Manager McClosky says that he is the greatest catcher that ever put on a glove in the West, barring none.
