# HUGHES NOT TO PAY FOR SCARS ON A GIRL'S PRIDE

Justice Court Judgment Set Aside

Miss on Infant, Before Law

Judge McClernan today annulled the judgment for \$300 obtained by Lillian Donahue against Steve Hughes in Justice Shepherd's court in Meaderville, April 4.

The case was one in which Miss Donahue claimed that Hughes had uttered remarks reflecting on her character. She sued him for \$300 damages, filing the complaint in Justice Nelson's court, but Bush & Kramer, the defendant's attorneys, moved for a change of venue and the motion was granted, the case being sent to Justice Shepherd. April 4 the suit was tried, the testimony developing the fact that the plaintiff was only 17 years old.

Plaintiff an Infant.

After the plaintiff had closed her side the defense moved for a dismissal on the ground that the plaintiff, being only 17 years old, was an infant in the eyes of the law and had no right to maintain the action in her own name.

The justice then appointed her father guardian and told the defense to begin its testimony.

Hughes gave his version of the matter and the justice rendered a decision in favor of the girl, giving her judgment for the total sum demanded.

Writ of Review Asked.

Shortly afterwards the defendant's attorneys petitioned the district court for a writ of review, stating in their petition that in appointing a guardian for the girl after it had been shown she had no legal right to maintain the action in her own name, the justice had exceeded his jurisdiction.

The district body granted the petition and Justice Shepherd was ordered to present the records of the case before Judge McClernan today.

The hearing was brief, as it was plainly evident to the judge that the contention of Bush & Kramer was sound.

He therefore ordered the judgment annulled.

### SUIT BROUGHT ON THREE NOTES

H. I. Frank and E. J. Carter today brought suit in the district court against Charles Warren and Hector McTae to recover the sum of \$2,525.

The complaints say that the defendants gave their notes, three in number, to the plaintiffs for \$2,500, and that the notes have matured, but not paid.

They allege that the notes called for the payment of 6 per cent interest and \$25 for attorney's fee, and the prayer asks for those things also.

The notes were made September 10, 1898, and were made payable 30, 60 and 90 days after date.

### DEATH OF MRS. H. M. EDWARDS

Mrs. H. M. Edwards died this morning and will be buried from the home of the family, No. 1241 East Second street, at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Services will be held at the home.

### WIFE DESERTED ROBERT LOGAN

Robert C. Logan has sued his wife, Lettie Logan, for a divorce on the ground of desertion. The complaint was filed in the district court this morning.

Logan says that he and his wife were married at Salt Lake March 2, 1893, and that she forsook his bed and board a year ago. There were no children. The court made an order for the publication of the summons, Logan being in ignorance of where the woman now resides.
