Philadelphia, April 23.—President Ben-

Jamin F. Shibe, of the Philadelphia American league, after consultation with the club's attorneys relating to the supreme court's decision in the Lajoie case, said: "The opinion of the supreme court in the Lajoie case applies only to Lajoie and has no reference to any other player." "The court holds upon the testimony alone that Lajoie is an extraordinary ball player, whose services cannot be replaced, and it is because of the extraordinary character of his abilities that the decision of the common pleas has been reversed." In other words, this decision cannot cover the case of any other ball player in the country. Each case will stand upon its own particular facts, and it is absurd to suppose that the supreme court of Pennsylvania or any other state will restrain an ordinary ball player, even assuming it might restrain Lajoie. St. Louis Race Meeting. St. Louis, April 23.—The program for the first week of the spring meeting at the Fair association was announced yesterday. The purses will average \$400 and the association will distribute no less than \$2,400 daily. On stake days the amount will be increased. In addition to the \$1,500 to be added to the inaugural stake, the management will give away \$300 on May 3. The inaugural promises to be worth in the neighborhood of \$3,000. The Debutante stakes for 2-year-old fillies, to be run the second Saturday of the meeting, has \$1,000 added. The meeting opens Saturday, May 3.
