**TWO NEGRO WOMEN ACCUSED OF ROBBING AN AGED FRENCHMAN**

One of the most glaring cases of daylight robbery that was ever accomplished in Butte came to the surface yesterday when Frank Gadbaugh, an old and infirm Frenchman who lives at No. 313 Colorado alley, called at police headquarters.

Two colored women, Ida Dayton and Mary Green, are now in the city jail charged with having entered Gadbaugh's cabin shortly before dark Thursday evening and by force and strategy took \$15 from the old man.

In broken English Gadbaugh, who is 85 years old, told the authorities yesterday that it represented all the money he had in the world.

Ida Dayton was yesterday identified as one of the women who robbed the old man. Mary Green is suspected as being the other woman who took part in the robbery.

An effort will be made this afternoon to identify the Green woman.

**MURTY SULLIVAN IN COURT.**

**He Pleads His Own Case Effectively Before Judge Boyle.**

Murty Sullivan, a stubby little Irishman, a wit and a philosopher, pleaded his own case in the police court this morning in a manner that was not only convincing, but disarmed the court of whatever judicial penalty that might have been handed out in the event his honor was personally convinced that Mr. Sullivan was guilty as charged.

"Is it true that you were brandishing a revolver on the streets yesterday?" asked Police Judge Boyle.

Mr. Sullivan looked up from beneath a pair of heavy eyebrows. He looked up the second time without speaking. He then drew down his upper lip and looked Judge Boyle squarely in the face, and said:

"So it's for carrying concealed weapons that I am here, is it? Yes, I had a gun wid me yesterday, an' faith, I'm sorry it was not two guns I had. Shure, with the dirty blackguards they have in this town, yuse need not one gun, but half a dozen; and a bit of grape and cannister would be better. I have a lump on the side of me head as big as a hen's egg where the blackguards struck me. Me nick is sore for two months where the young divils het me wid a rock. I'm 52 years in America, and I needs no policeman to tell me what my rights are.

"Shure it's concealed weapons, is it—concealed weapons? Now, just drop the concealed weapons' business," continued Mr. Sullivan in a contemptuous tone of voice. "Just drop the weapon business!
