

SARBEELY KAHN A ROBBER'S VICTIM

AFGHAN TAMALE PEDDLER HAS A STARTLING MIDNIGHT ADVENTURE IN DUBLIN GULCH.

STOCK IN TRADE AND HIS MONEY TAKEN FROM HIM

Tells County Attorney How the Lights Went Out and in the Darkness He Is Robbed—Patsy Kahn Acts in the Role of Interpreter for His Countryman in Trouble.

Sarbeely Kahn, an Afghan, a Dublin Gulch saloonkeeper and three saloon rounders, were the principals in a robbery in Dublin Gulch last night at midnight. The Afghan, who is a tamale peddler, was the victim of the hold-up, and he told the story of the affair to Deputy County Attorney Lynch at the county attorney's office this morning, when a complaint charging the saloonkeeper and three rounders with robbery was issued by the official.

Sarbeely Kahn was interpreted by another Afghan, Patsy Kahn, not being well provided with the English of the commonwealth. He said that he was plying his trade in the gulch.

Innocent Sarbeely Kahn. When he reached a part of the district near an old bridge one of the alleged robbers issued from the saloon, which was a little one, and beckoned him to enter. He did not know the name of the saloon, or the men, not being able to read English, and not being familiar with the place.

Little worrying what was in store for him, Sarbeely Kahn entered the saloon. The door was closed by one of the men, another caught him around the waist from behind, the lights were suddenly extinguished by the man behind the bar and then in blackest darkness his pockets and his hot tamale can were rifled. Twenty tamales were stolen, worth 15 cents a tamale, and \$5 in coin.

Suddenly the lights were relighted and he was kicked through the open door and the ravaged tamale bucket pitched out upon his head.

Dublin Gulch Pleasantly. The case illustrates what Dublin Gulch is after nightfall without a deputy sheriff on guard, in the estimation of the court house officers.

Sarbeely Kahn was helpless before three strong men to resent the robbery or recovery of the loot. Not even one tamale could he get back, and so he went home.

Patsy Kahn told the officer that he and Sarbeely Kahn and another Afghan whose name as nearly as could be made out was Awkward Khan were all in the tamale industry together. They came from Seattle last month.

Officers will take Sarbeely Kahn along for identification purposes and try to arrest the robbers. The case will go into Judge Taylor's court.

HOUSE RENT CAUSES WAR

Mr. White Threatens Mr. Johnson With Extermination and Is Arrested.

Because A. L. Johnson refused to pay the rent for his house in advance, Charles White grew angry to the point that he threatened to exterminate the whole tribe of Johnsons and as a result of the quarrel White was arraigned for trial before Judge Boyle this morning.

White, who rents a house to Johnson at No. 812 South Main street, told the judge that Johnson had refused to pay the house rent and that he, White, had only given him a gentle reminder.

Judge Boyle, however, thought the case would stand investigation and he set the hearing for tomorrow afternoon.

POCATELLO MECCA FOR HOMESEEEKERS

OPENING OF THE FORT HALL INDIAN RESERVATION IN JUNE ATTRACTS MANY PEOPLE.

EXODUS FROM BUTTE TO NEW LAND IS PREDICTED

Indications Are That Many From This City Will Go and Buy and Take Up Property—Interior Department Makes Clear Provisions in the Law of Taking Up Claims.

Many Butte people will go down to Pocatello and take up land. The Fort Hall Indian reservation will be thrown open on June 17, and there will be an exodus from Butte for the new lands about that date. Many a good citizen who has not done any plowing since he left the old farm will re-enter the business again on a section of the land to be thrown open.

J. H. Crook of Pocatello was seen at the Finlen hotel today and he made some interesting statements about the law governing the opening of the land. Mr. Crook said:

"Everybody who wants to take up land must leave for the reservation for that purpose from some place outside the reservation on a date after the opening. He must then locate the land and return to the land office.

Indians Suffer. "The decision of the land office that purchasers of land must pay the appraised value of all improvements will work a great hardship on the Indians who have farmed the lands.

"The notice that the purchase of Indian improvements within the 'five-mile limit' of Pocatello would carry with it no preference right of entry of the land on which it was situated has caused a good bit of speculation as to who would want the improvements on such terms at any price, and as such improvements are generally the cultivation of a certain acreage, fences or buildings on the land, it was freely predicted that they would not sell at all.

Explains Provisions.

"Agent Caldwell wrote the department along these lines and asked that the intention of the department regarding such improvements be made clear. In answer to that letter, supplemental instructions were sent to Register Thomas of the Blackfoot land office, which provide that in case improvements within the 'five-mile limit' are not sold prior to the sale of the lands, the purchaser of said lands will be required to take them at their appraised value.

"The improvements in question, together with improvements on lands in other parts of the reservation will be offered for sale at the land office at Blackfoot beginning at 10 a. m. today. The lands within the 'five-mile limit' will be offered for sale at the same place, beginning on Thursday, July 17. The other lands will be opened at noon on Tuesday, June 17."

WILLIAMS SOLE SUPPORT OF HIS FATHER AND SON

Man Murdered in Silver Bow Locked After His Aged Parent and His Little Boy.

There left on the Oregon Short Line train this morning, en route for Glenn's Ferry, Idaho, an old man bowed with grief and the weight of years, accompanied by a little boy. The venerable man is the father of John R. Williams, who was murdered at Silver Bow Junction last Monday night. The little boy who accompanied him was the dead man's son.

J. N. Williams, the father, is now 82 years of age; the boy is 8. Both were supported by the murdered son and father. A pathetic scene was enacted in the sheriff's office yesterday morning when the old man with the child called to get the few belongings which had been the property of his son. They consisted of some papers, a silver watch and \$20.55 in money.

"I don't know what I shall do now," said the gray-haired father and grandfather. "John was my only support and the only support of this little boy, his son. A month never passed that he did not send us all the money we needed for our simple way of living.

"I am now going back to my home in Idaho where I saw my son and grand-son reared, but from now on I shall count the days of my existence. My sun is almost set. Although an old man it was a pleasure for me to live before my son was so cruelly murdered, but now life has no more attractions for me."


The old man turned to leave and tears were in his eyes as he held tightly in his hand the trifles found on the murdered son.
