## NOT A CRIME TO KILL CHINAMAN IN KALISPELL

John Eakright Goes Free From Charge of Manslaughter After Trial Lasting Three Days.

"Twelve men have decided that it isn't a crime to kill a Chinaman," said a man from Kalispell today. "They are reputable citizens of Kalispell, too, and they formed a jury that discharged John A. Eakright. Eakright was not charged with murdering the Chinaman, but only with manslaughter. The jury returned a verdict that he was not guilty of the charge, and, therefore, determined that a man who kills a Chinaman does not commit a penitentiary offense.

"Notwithstanding this decision, the case has been bitterly fought. This was Eakright's second trial. His first trial was last fall, the trial lasting three days, while the jury was out 48 hours without reaching a verdict and it was then discharged. "This time the trial lasted three days, two days being taken up in securing the jury. The jury was out from 10 o'clock Wednesday night to late Saturday afternoon. The first vote was 7 to 5 for acquittal; then 9 to 3 and Saturday morning it was 10 to 2. Efforts were made to swing the two men who believed that a man who kills a Chinaman should be punished, into line and this proved successful late Saturday afternoon and the acquittal resulted.

"There is considerable feeling about the verdict in Kalispell, as many believed that to kill a Chinaman is a crime and should not go unpunished."

## NEVILLS TRANSFERS HIS STORE TO PROTECT DEBTS

Park Street Harness Dealer Gives Sheriff Charge Until Creditors Are Paid in Full.

For the benefit of his creditors J. N. Nevills, a harness dealer in Park street, has turned his business over to Sheriff Furey.

This action was taken by Mr. Nevills to better protect his creditors. The sheriff will conduct the business and as rapidly as possible will discharge the obligations against the harness man. It is believed that it will not be long until all creditors are satisfied.

When the sheriff has finished paying the particular creditors, Nevills will resume business, taking personal charge.

## FIREMEN DOING GOOD WORK

Chief Sanger Reports Loss for May as Only \$2,370.

Fire Chief Sanger has made his report for May, in which he states that the number of alarms responded to were 12; that the property involved was \$183,400 while the actual loss was only \$2,370. This is an exceptionally good report and shows that Butte has one of the safest fire departments in the West.

In Street Commissioner McLaughlin's report he sets forth that the amount expended on the payroll was \$4,257.50, and the total cost of running his department for the month was \$13,656.50.

# BREEN AGAINST "BAD LANDS" MEN

DECLARES THOSE NOW LIVING OFF EARNINGS OF DISREPUTABLE WOMEN MUST GO TO JAIL.

SAYS NO PROTECTION IS AFFORDED BY THE FINES

Declares Habitudes of the Proscribed District Are Amenable to the Law, and He Secures Their Names to Proceed Against Them—Says He Will Break Up Their nefarious Practice.

County Attorney Breen says he was much surprised when he learned that certain habitues of the proscribed district had been brought into police court and fined. He began this morning to get a list of the names of these men with a view to swearing out complaints against them. He said:

"This thing of these men who live off the earnings of disreputable women being arrested each month and made to pay a fine, which answers the purpose of a license, is the biggest piece of humbuggery that has been called to my attention in some time and I am going to see if I can't put a stop to it.

"These men believe that by going into the city court and paying fines they are entitled to continue their nefarious practice of extorting money from fallen women, but I will show them that they are amenable to the law.

"After giving each of these men a long jail sentence on a county charge I believe they will realize that they are breaking the law and that paying fines to the city authorities will not protect them. No further evidence is necessary to convict them than the receipts for the fines they have already paid."

## Men Concerned.

The men to whom County Attorney Breen referred were arrested for the first time several months ago. There were 10 most of them of French nationality. Seven paid fines of \$10 each, and the remaining three were allowed to continue living on Galena street until last Saturday night, when they were again arrested.

Tuesday several of the men were brought before Judge Boyle and Gaston Dosot, Victor Donds, Frank Pardee and John Lamin were fined \$50 each by the police magistrate. Pardee paid his fine but the other two men appealed their cases.

The 10 whom the county attorney has said he will prosecute are: Adolph Bijou, Gus Papot, Gus La Grand, Joseph Grond, Gaston Trochet, Morris Delamare, Charles Gordon, Ernest Fonere, Louis Mazahon, Jules DuPont, Charles Chapias, Felix Duplan, Joseph DuCreaux, Emil Banhoula, Victor Dondan, Victor Gordoleaux, John Dupois, Ernest Lamere, Henry Carere.

Heretofore the police have done all they could to put a stop to the practice of worthless characters making their homes with women of ill-repute. These men have openly acknowledged their guilt by paying fines into the police department, but County Attorney Breen is determined to inflict such severe punishment upon them that it will be an example for others. In this way the county attorney hopes to rid Butte of men who have no visible means of support.

## CARRIERS WANT MORE MONEY

Say They Should Have \$1,000 a Year for Work in Butte.

Butte letter carriers want \$1,000 a year and they want it badly. The carriers receive only \$850 per year or \$70 per month. This is as much as carrier in Eastern cities receive, while the cost of living there is much less than here.

The carriers hold that as the clerks were recently given \$100 per year more, that they should also receive a raise in salary. The carriers will probably petition the chief executive at Washington.

# BIRD MOTHERS RABBITS

William F. Cobban of No. 1021 South Wyoming street, has 14 distinct breeds of pigeons numbering about one hundred in all and several varieties of rabbits including the Belgian hare. He keeps them together in a large wire-covered space in his back yard; a splendid coop for them, and they are perfectly at home.

Among the birds is a large, handsome female fantail of the white variety, which is at present mothering a brood of 10 rabbits with as much care as if they were her little pigeons. It is a remarkable case of foster motherly devotion; one that has seldom, if ever, been met with in this country or any other country.

These rabbits were born May 14. A

bunnies are snugly ensconced in a nest in one of the stalls of the shed in which the birds roost at night. The rabbits are of two colors, black and grey.

Among the birds in Mr. Cobban's collection is a homing pigeon known as Naxon with a record fly of 800 miles. This bird came from Arkansas and it was there it made its long fly.

Mr. Cobban intends to send a pair of the homers to Edward Dewey of Nampa, Idaho, in a short time, and as soon as they nest here Mr. Dewey will ship one of them by express back to Butte. On its arrival here Mr. Cobban will turn it loose.

The 14 varieties of birds owned by Mr. Cobban include the inside and outside tumbler, turbit, pouter, carrier, nun, jackabin, black magpie, red magpie, homer,

few hours after their birth the pigeon took charge of them and has had them under her protecting wings ever since, leaving only long enough at one time to get her own food. The real mother rabbit hovers close by nearly all of the time, but never interferes with the self-constituted guardian of her little ones. At first the pigeon could spread her wings and cover the 10 bunnies nicely like a hen sheltering its chicks, but the bunnies have grown so large that the bird now has trouble in sheltering them all. Nevertheless she tries and the little rabbits, with almost human instinct or reason, seem to appreciate her efforts in their behalf.

Mr. Cobban has the birds nicely housed and cooped, each variety having its respective place. The fantail and the little


Chinese owl, ring neck dove, arch angel and trampeter.

Jackrabbits are very tame, but the magpies are rather wild, preferring to not have persons come too close to them. The tumblers are a queer bird. They fly straight up in the air several hundred feet and then for the amusement of themselves or those who watch them deliberately tumble back to earth again, catching themselves just before striking the ground.

Only the homers are permitted to leave the enclosure. They are allowed their liberty in the morning if they desire it, but not all of them leave. The ones that go out, however, always return in the evening and roost in the coop, where they are safe from prowling cats possessing an appetite for birds.
