CROWN PRINCE OF SIAM TO LOOK OVER THE WORLD'S FAIR GROUND AND REPORT TO THE KING.

BRINGING PRESSURE ON ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

Chamber of Commerce of Italy Appoint a Permanent Committee on Foreign Expositions and This Is Supposed to Mean That the Business Men of Italy Want to Take Part in the World's Fair.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] St. Louis, June 10.—The World's Fair managers have received information from Washington of the approaching visit to St. Louis of two members of the royal families. The grand duke Boris of Russia cousin of the czar is now en route to this country and will land in San Francisco in a few weeks.

After visiting St. Louis and accepting the hospitalities of the city and investigating the World's fair, the grand duke will go to Chicago and thence eastward by way of Niagara Falls.

A little later will come the visit of the crown prince of Siam, who is now in Great Britain. After visiting Washington, he will come to St. Louis and be entertained. After leaving here he will go to Chicago and then visit the Yellowstone National park.

While in St. Louis the crown prince will inform himself thoroughly in regard to the Louisiana Purchase exposition.

Special interest attaches to the coming visit of the crown prince by the impression that he is to report to the king of Siam, and upon his report, the king will determine whether he will visit the World's fair in 1904.

The pressure to induce the Italian government to participate officially in the World's fair is growing constantly. The following cablegram has been received from Vittorio Seggio, World's fair commissioner to Italy, sent from Turin:

"National committee representing the chambers of commerce of Italy has appointed a permanent committee on foreign expositions. This means the national organization, composed of chambers of commerce in the different cities of Italy, desire the government to take part in the World's fair."

Performer Is Injured.

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AMNESTY ACT IS SIGNED BY PALMA

NEELY AND RATHBONE WILL BOTH BE FREE—ALL AMERICANS IN CUBA TURNED LOOSE.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Havana, June 10.—Perhaps a dozen people who will benefit by the amnesty act just signed by President Palma, including two or three Cubans who are naturalized Americans, C. F. W. Neely and Col. Estes G. Rathbone, who were convicted of appropriating postoffice funds amounting to many thousands of dollars, are best known of those who will secure pardon.

Neely has been in prison two years of his sentence of eight years. Rathbone is out on \$100,000 bail awaiting a decision of the supreme court on appeal.

His sentence was for eight years. The news that he is to be a free man in a day or two failed to arouse Neely from the indifferent demeanor he has maintained since he was arrested, he smiled, but showed no particular interest in the information.

"I have been here 25 months," he said, "and I will be real glad to get out. I must say, though, that I have been very well treated by the Cuban authorities. I am in excellent health, notwithstanding reports that I am suffering from consumption. I have no definite plans. I probably shall remain here a week or two and then go up to the states. Perhaps I shall take up some business scheme here in which I was interested at the time of my conviction."

JAPANESE EDITOR IN CHICAGO

Starts a Movement to Use the English Alphabet in Japan.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Chicago, June 10.—Hajime Hoshi, editor of the Japanese-American weekly, New York, accompanied by five young men of Japan, has arrived here from Tokio and will remain in Chicago several days. Hajime Hoshi says he has spent four months in Japan promoting a movement for changing the Chinese characters of the Japanese language to the English alphabet.

"I use the 26 roman letters," he said, "in printing my paper and find they are applicable to our language. I hope ultimately that the movement will result in the universal use of the English language throughout the Japanese empire. The emperor has appointed a committee of 12 men to take the matter up."
