Their act, which has not yet been announced, is from the pen of the versatile Harry Newton of Chicago, who as a writer of vaudeville sketches has made an enviable reputation in the United States.

Many of "Jack" Mulkey's Anaconda friends will be surprised to learn that he is the original "Jack" Beach, of Beach Brothers, as he is a man that says but little of himself. Should the brothers in the future tour this section of the country, that they will receive a hearty reception, is a foregone conclusion.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anaconda, June 14.—Who will succeed Peter Cox as a member of the school board? That is the question which is agitating the people of Anaconda who are interested in the schools just now.

County Superintendent Mary McLaughlin has the appointment, and on her choice much depends, as it is probable that the Walker kissing affair will be decided at the next meeting of the board. It is well known that Mr. Cox was one of the trustees who did not approve of the manner of the investigation of the conduct of the principal, and on several occasions during the meeting of the board he endeavored to have the investigation conducted so that the public could be admitted.

It can safely be said that no man ever left the school board with such universal regret as Mr. Cox does. He has stood for no favoritism and no policy but that of justice to the people who chose him to represent them.

Always fair, deliberate and conservative, he has been a man of whom the Anaconda public looked for the protection of its interests, and in his departure, particularly at this juncture, is the cause of much regret. Mr. Cox has a large boarding house at Carroll, which the shutting down of the old smelters compels him to close. He goes either to Butte or Seattle after a number of years continuous residence in Anaconda, where he has won the respect and confidence of all who knew him.

TODAY'S WALL STREET STOCKS

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] New York, June 14.—The iron markets here and the progress of the coal mine strike in the United States is being carefully noted in London. British ironmongers think that if the strike is not speedily settled it will not only stop the supply of coal but will, as a consequence, bring the iron and steel works to a standstill. Such a contingency is necessarily not overlooked in this country and orders on American account are momentarily expected. If they come they will further stimulate the British iron trade, which is already picking up as a result of orders from South Africa.

Prices of stocks have advanced this week largely on account of a resumption of operations by an influential speculative leader. The generally prosperous conditions of the country have kept the undertone firm, but immediate speculative activity is repressed by the anthracite strike, by the crop uncertainties and fears of a money stringency incident to the July 1 settlement. Time loans have been in demand during the week, many carrying the period of crop moving needs. This is regarded as evidence of an anxiety to insure against money flurries made possible by the existing exhausted condition of credits.

There was moderate activity in the opening dealings, but the price changes were very small on Wall street this morning. Steady buying of Missouri Pacific advanced it above 105 and there were fractional improvements in other standard stocks, especially St. Paul, New York Central and Reading. Norfolk & Western rose one point. Trading was very light. The market became a heavy one, pending the publication of the bank statement, and hardened afterwards. Missouri Pacific and St. Paul rose a point over last night. The closing was dull and very steady.

THAT NEBRASKA VOLCANO.

Source of Eruption is Scarcely One Hundred Feet Deep. [Washington Post.] Prof. W. J. McGee, in an interview with a Post reporter, made the following statement regarding the recent "eruption" of Mount Iona, near Pender, Nebraska:

"Mount Iona is a high hill situated at some distance from the town of Pender, Neb., and is a part of the cretaceous formation that covers a large part of that state. Under this hill there exists a stratum of carbonaceous shale, overlying another stratum of shale that is full of iron pyrites and sulphur. The sulphur and pyrites are constantly decomposing in large quantities, generating an intense heat and causing combustion in the carbonaceous elements of the overlying shale. The steam and smoke generated by this combustion escapes to the outer atmosphere through cracks and crevices in the stone and earth of which the hill is composed, producing very much the appearance of an active volcano."
