

MANFIELD'S COOL RECEPTION

Butte's Society Turned Out to See the Great Actor, But Nan Byxbee Declares There Was Very Little Enthusiasm.

Handsome stage settings and the luster of a great name do much to disarm just criticism, but Mansfield's Beaucaire last night, despite the dramatic fame of the star and the literary pre-eminence of Booth Tarkington, did not give the satisfaction that was expected. The play was received rather coldly.

Trivial inconsequential lines were made the opportunity for elaborate declamation. The character of the audience for the climaxes and the denouement falls forceless and flat because of absence of lead or anticlimax. There are a great many strong situations and dramatic elements in the book Beaucaire which seem not to have been grasped by the dramatist. Mansfield probably made the very best of his lines. He indeed seemed at times to be aware of the deficiencies of the play and sought to compensate by superlative fervor consequently overacting.

Handsomely Garbed.

The members of the company were handsomely garbed and the ensemble was beautiful to look upon, but there seemed to be no excuse for the presence of half the players, and according to the demands of the

play, not a few of the idle figure-heads were superfluous. They probably would have constituted a good support had they had anything in the way of lines or situation to support with.

The heroine, Lady Mary Carlisle, by Ethel Morrison, was a nonentity, owing to the defective construction of the play. Miss Morrison was charming in appearance and manner and evinced talent for graceful and comprehensive acting, but her

role was so poorly handled by the dramatist that she had but little opportunity to draw the sympathy of the audience to the part. Lady Mary's affaire de coeur with the Whilom Beaucaire appeared of little import to the audience, when in reality, as the central action of the play, it should have been strongly developed.

A Violin Solo.

The violin solo in act three by Carl Krasada was entirely foreign to the plot but its introduction was gratefully received by the audience for the violinist's contribution was excellent.

Beucaire is not a play commensurate with Mansfield's abilities. The splendid reputation won in his previous histrionic efforts in dramas more worthy of his fire, stand him well in the poor opportunity afforded him by Beaucaire. It is to be hoped that Butte will see him again in a more worthy role.

The plot is based on the adventures of the eccentric and fun-loving Duke of Orleans, who disguises himself first as a barber to an English nobleman friend, and later takes the role of a successful but always fair gambler, pocketing nonchalantly the shakels of a large circle of English nobles.

He sees Lady Mary Carlisle and falls in love. Boldly effecting an entrance to a grand ball he attempts to meet her, but is ejected. Then assuming his real character he is introduced to Lady Mary as Duke de Chareaux, winning her love. A rival effects a denouement, exposing him as the barber and gambler Beaucaire.

He is carried away wounded, but fulfills his promise to return again at a certain hour a week later. He returns and wins Lady Mary's consent to elope with him, but at the last moment appears in his real character as the great Duke of Orleans, laughing at the discomfiture of his enemies and rivals and carrying off his lady.
