

SAY DEAD ROBBER LIVED IN BUTTE

MAN KILLED IN ATTEMPT TO HOLD UP BURLINGTON TRAIN WAS HANGER-ON AT POOLROOMS.

PHOTOGRAPH IS HERE FOR IDENTIFICATION

Omaha Police Have Arrested Suspected Accomplice Who Admits He Saw Original of Picture in Butte Which Prisoner Also Declares Is His Home-Railroad Company Offers Reward.

This is a picture of a dead man—dead from a charge of buckshot fired at him from behind. If you look closely, perhaps you can see the marks of some of the nine grains of buckshot that came through him and his blouse.

If you look still more closely perhaps you can recognize the man, and if you do and communicate with the claim department of the Burlington railroad, it may mean money for you.

This unknown for he is an unknown—was killed by the express messenger of the Chicago, Burlington & Ohio railroad while attempting to hold up the train about 15 miles from Council Bluffs, Iowa, October 20, 1900.

In company with another, he had succeeded in holding up the train and was

standing holding a gun on the engineer, while his partner was trying to blow open the safe in the express car.

Shot Him in Back.

Meanwhile, the express messenger came up behind him and emptied the contents of a sawed-off shotgun in his back, killing him instantly. The other robber, knowing that his partner had not fired, jumped from the car and made his escape.

The train crew put the dead hand in the baggage coach and took him to Council Bluffs, where he was tied in a chair while the accompanying picture was taken. A man behind the chair whose foot appears underneath, helped to hold the dead man in place, while the photographer took the picture.

No trace was found of the other robber until recently, when the authorities at Omaha arrested a man suspected of the complicity, who claims Butte as his home. While he denies having had anything to do with the affair, when shown this picture, he admitted having met the original at Butte, Montana.

Now the authorities are anxious to identify the dead man and for that purpose H. N. Butterfield of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad brought the picture to Butte.

Butte Was His Home.

Many who have seen the picture believe the man has lived in Butte and one man went so far as to say he had seen him in the poolrooms several times. If any one, by identifying him, can throw any light on the man now under arrest for complicity in the affair, he will be rewarded by the company.

When the accompanying picture was taken it was with a view to identifying the man and thus getting a clew to his confederates. It is a remarkable picture and at first glance the man would seem to be alive and sitting to have his picture taken in the regular manner, but a closer observation will show that the collar drawn up conceals a rope which had

been fastened around the neck to keep the body in place. The expression of the eyes, too, shows the fixed, glassy stare of death.

THOUGHT IT WAS CARRIE

SALE OF VICKERY GROUP

Boston Is Negotiating for the Purchase of Wisconsin Creek Claims.

Negotiations are pending between John Vickery of Sheridan and H. Brizard of Boston for Mr. Vickery's group of claims near the Lake Shore mine on Wisconsin creek, 12 miles from Sheridan. This sale, if effected, will mean much for this country, as \$20,000 is involved. Half of the amount is to be deposited in the store of Henry Elling & Co. before the Fourth of July or the agreement is null and void. The papers are ready for signatures and it will be but a few days until Mr. Vickery knows whether he can live on easy street or not. He discovered the claims five years ago and has been working them since. He has made several shipments of ore to the Butte smelters which averaged \$70 to the ton.

CORONER TO INVESTIGATE

Death of Thomas Brown, Colored Cook at Race Track, the Subject.

Coroner Johnson will hold an inquest at the Montana undertaking establishment this evening to get at the cause of the death of Thomas Brown, a colored cook, who was found dead in the mess room at the race track.
