HARRY WASSMAN TELLS OF HIS RECENT TRIP

Says the Most Disagreeable Feature Encountered by the Traveler is the Water Which is Impregnated With Mineral Substances—Vancouver is a Beautiful City—Some Splendid Smelting Ores.

Anacoda, June 28.—Harry Wassman of this city has just returned from a month's trip through the mining regions of British Columbia and a visit to the coast cities of that province.

Mr. Wassman was deeply impressed with the apparent wealth and mining and smelting facilities of that country, but says it is hardly a satisfactory place to live, especially for a person who has resided in the mining regions of Montana for twenty years.

In speaking of his trip, Mr. Wassman said: "I would have enjoyed it thoroughly had it not been that I was taken sick and compelled to remain in bed for some days. There is at present a great deal of development work going on in that country.

One thing that particularly attracted my attention was the manner in which the Grantley smelter people handle their ore. Instead of having to use a flux with it, they shove it right into the furnace, just as it comes out of the ground.

"I spent several days in the different mining camps before going on to Vancouver. My visit to that city I enjoyed immensely. It is one of the prettiest places I have ever seen. On my return trip I did not stop at very many places, but came almost directly home. The most disagreeable feature of that country is the water.

"It contains such enormous quantities of mineral substances that it is almost impossible for a newcomer to get used to it."

Mr. Wassman was formerly weighmaster at Carroll. He now holds a similar position at the Washoe smelters.

NEW ELECTRIC LINE TO BE BUILT TO WASHOE

Branch of the Road to Be Run to the Top of the Hill for the Benefit of Employees.

Anacoda, June 28.—Work will be begun within a few days on a new branch of the Anaconda Electric Railway company's lines, which will go to the top of the Washoe hill and of great benefit to the smelter employees there. At present the line known as the Washoe branch stops at the foot of the hill. The addition to it will go to the time-keeper's office on the hill.

It is expected that the construction of the branch will take about 10 weeks. The grading will commence at once, and Manager McNulta of the street railway company is authority for the statement that the road will be in working order in three months.

It is announced that the new line will take a different course from the old. It will diverge from the present course at the spot where the Third street line crosses the B. A. & P. railroad, east of the city, and will turn south and follow the road to Walker's gulch.

It will go eastward from that point and north to the top of the Washoe hill.

JOSEPH SHAFER TO MARRY HIS BERTIE

MAN WHO HOLDS THE RECORD LONG TERM IN THE BUTTE JAIL SEEKS OTHER TROUBLES.

UNITE IN PREFERENCE TO SERVING SENTENCE

It is the Only Way Out of Their Present Dilemma and Both Seem Willing to Avail Themselves of This Plan to Get Released From the Deer Lodge County Prison.

Anacoda, June 28.—Joseph Shafer, who enjoys the distinction of having spent a longer term in the Silver Bow county jail than any other man on earth, the term having been more than four years, is preparing to make more trouble for himself than he ever thought of when he rubbed John Hawkins, a black man, from the map of existence in a Butte saloon several years ago—he contemplates marriage.

In police circles here it is said that Shafer must either make Bertie Smith his wife or spend sixty days in the county jail. Bertie Shafer's real name is not generally known; she is called "Shafer" simply because she and Joe have been together considerably of late and were arrested a few days ago on a charge of maintaining illegal relations with each other. Yesterday both pleaded guilty to the charge, but Shafer told Judge Kennedy, who had charge of the case, that he contemplated marrying the woman. They were sentenced to sixty days in jail, but as soon as the contemplated marriage ceremony is performed the sentence will be suspended.

A few weeks ago Shafer and the woman had a fight in a lodging house and the woman carved Shafer with her trusty blade. She, too, received a few cuts, but they were not serious enough to interfere with her daily cake walk.

A charge of second degree assault was entered against the woman, but later in the game the county attorney had it dismissed.

SUNDAY IS ANGLER'S DAY

They Leave the City Saturday Afternoon and Get a Good Start.
