VETERAN OF BOER WAR IS IN BUTTE

CAPT. W. M. INGLISS OF BRITISH SERVICE TELLS OF STRUGGLE FOR TRANSVAAL.

MET MANY MONTANA MEN IN MINES AND IN FIGHT

Were Number of Americans Engaged on Both Sides—Land Is Rich and Can Be Had for a Song Now as Many of the Boers Will Move Out, No Matter What Terms Are Made—Good Place.

Capt. W. M. Ingliss of his majesty, King Edward's imperial infantry is in Butte to attend the races. Captain Ingliss has a few horses with him, but he modestly refrained from mentioning this morning when he took a few minutes to speak of the opportunities which the Transvaal affords to those who care to take a chance in mining or even in farming in one of the most beautiful countries in the world.

Country Is Very Beautiful. "Not only around Johannesburg and the cultivated district of South Africa," said he, "but along any of the valleys and river bottoms the country is incomparably beautiful. It's no wonder those Boers would put up the desperate fight they did, for it's well worth fighting for. With a little water, the soil will produce almost every variety of fruit and vegetables.

Met Many Montana Men. While in South Africa the captain met a number of Montana mining men. "In general," said he, "they did not take much interest in the outcome of the war. They all deplored the fact that there should have been any bloodshed, not only for the suffering it entailed, but because it entirely crippled the business and mining interests of the country.

MISSOURI DEMOCRATS HAVE THEIR TROUBLES

Crowd of Insurgents or "Anti-State-house" Men Try to Control State Convention.

St. Joseph, Mo., July 22.—The democratic state convention for the nomination of two railroad commissioners and a superintendent of public instruction was called to order at noon today. This is one of the most important conventions ever held in the state, made so by a wrangle which sprung up between the state administration and a band of "insurgents" known locally as the "anti-state house" crowd.

The paramount issue is the reorganization of the state central committee. Governor Dockery is here in person and is working hard to eliminate the Walsh crowd.

HANGED AT GRENVILLE, MISS.

Coke and Lauderdale Shot a Man on Passenger Train Without Cause.

Grenville, Miss., July 22.—Coke and Lauderdale were hanged at 11:41. The crime of Ashley Coke and Tom Lauderdale was committed on a Yazoo and Mississippi valley passenger train in December, 1901, near Abeth. Coke, Lauderdale, Will Black and G. M. Phipps, all more or less under the influence of liquor, boarded the train for the purpose of returning to their homes at Shelby. Phipps fell against G. M. Wray, an engineer, who was asleep on a seat. Wray asked Phipps what he meant, and the reply came from Coke that it meant that he (Wray) must leave the coach. As Wray started to walk out, Blackburn said to Coke: "What shall we do with that fellow?"

Orders also were sent to the gunboat Marietta, directing her to proceed to Colon to take the place of the Machias as soon as she has finished her present work on the Venezuelan coast.

Jealous Husband's Deed.

Harrisburg, Pa., July 22.—William Filer, a steelworker, shot and killed his wife and Harry Bennett, a machinist, today at Steelton. It is alleged Filer was jealous of Bennett's attentions to his wife. The murderer escaped.

Tailors All on Strike.

New York, July 22.—The press committee of the striking garment makers said today that all the men employed in their branches of trade are now on strike. It was stated that about 18 employers had acceded to the demand of the strikers.

EAST AND WEST MEET AT GLENVIEW COURSE

Big Golf Tournament for Professionals Opens, Following Amateur Games Just Closed—Men on Hand.

Chicago, July 22.—East and West meet today in a contest between the leading golfers of both sections of the country. The affair comes as an aftermath of the amateur golf championship just finished at Glenview. Six representatives from each division will compete. The prizes will be six silver cups, one of which will be given to each of the members of the winning team. The players from the East will be Percy R. Payne, Princeton; A. G. Lockwood, Allston, Boston; R. H. Conklin, Princeton; F. Oden Herstan, Chevy Chase; Raymond Russell, Detroit; Charles H. Zimmerman, New Haven, Conn. The representatives of the West will be Abraham Poole, Jr., Onwentsia; Chandler Egan, Exmoore; Walter E. Egan, Lake Geneva; Walter R. Smith, Onwentsia; Harry C. Smith, Onwentsia; John Helabird, Glenview.

The match is to be played in 36 holes—18 in the morning and 18 in the afternoon. The Western players scored heavily against the Eastern men in the morning games, being 17 holes up after 18 holes play.

BUCKEYE BOY IS BEING HELD BY NICARAGUANS

Was Taken With Party of Filibusters and Life Is Forfeited—Senator Hanna to Save Him.

Washington, July 22.—The state department has taken active steps to save the life of Dr. Russell Wilson, a young Ohio physician, who is held under arrest at Bluefields by the Nicaraguan military authorities. Wilson was a member of a filibustering party that made a landing near Monkey point, four miles from Bluefields. Most of the party were captured, owing to the inability of the commander of the expedition to land reinforcements, on account of heavy weather.

The Nicaraguan general was about to execute him summarily, but was induced by the pleas of some of the English-speaking people of Bluefields to allow the law to follow its course. This meant a trial by a court martial and it is the understanding that the death sentence was almost inevitable.

Colorado Pioneer Dead.

Colorado Springs, Colo., July 22.—Judge J. L. Pendry, a pioneer of the state and one of the best known lawyers and mining men of the west, is dead at his home here, after a long illness. He came to Colorado thirty years ago and figured prominently in the early history of Leadville, Cripple Creek and Colorado Springs. He was born in Hamilton, Ohio, in 1827.

Building New Battleship.

New York, July 22.—Orders have been received at the New York navy yard to proceed with the preparations for the building of the new battleship Connecticut. Work on the launching ways has been started and bids for the piles and iron will be opened in a few days.

Winner of the Medal.

London, July 22.—The first stage of the shooting for the king's prize at Bisley was completed today. Lance Corporal Cole of the Dorset regiment was the winner of the national rifle association's bronze medal, with a score of 103.

Well Known Actress Dead.

New York, July 22.—Miss Elsie Wilton, for many years a well-known actress and for eight years a member of the California Theater Stock company of San Francisco, is dead at her home in Cryders Point, L. I., from heart trouble. Miss Wilton was, in private life, Mrs. Thomas Dorenius.

Boer Generals Going to England.

Pretoria, July 22.—Generals Botha and Delany, with their secretaries, left here yesterday for Capetown, en route for Europe. General DeWet will accompany them on their journey to the coast. The date of their departure from Europe has not been fixed.

Agent Burned to Death.

Fresno, Cal., July 22.—Fire, the origin of which has not yet been ascertained, destroyed the Southern Pacific depot at Lillis this morning. Charles Schill, aged 27, recently from San Francisco and acting station agent, was burned to death.

Dikes Give Way.

Peoria, Ill., July 22.—The Illinois river here had reached 21 feet above low water last night and at 10 o'clock this morning the dikes on which the tracks of the Peoria and Pekin terminal railway gave way. Over 1,000 feet of track is gone and the water is pouring through the crevasse, flooding hundreds of acres of grain.

Ordered Out of Camp.

Ouray, Colo., July 22.—Ten masked men went to the O. & N. tunnel, about three miles north of Ouray, and, after destroying the private telephone that connected the mine with this city, took from the bankhouse two employees of the mine, marched them down the hill at the muzzle of guns and ordered them to leave the camp. The motive for the outrage is a mystery.

TO STOP KISSING.

Pennsylvania Railroad Said to Have Issued an Order to That Effect.

It has been reported that the Pennsylvania Railroad company has ordered its employes at the Jersey City station to stop all persons from exchanging kisses upon the arrival and departure of trains in this station. If this report is true, the situation is serious, and we may expect it to grow more so. There is no franchise which women prize more highly than the right to kiss and be kissed.

Some women will swim a creek in the coldest weather to kiss a friend. Some like to kiss other women; some like to kiss men; all like to kiss babies.

It must be admitted in extenuation of the alleged order of the Pennsylvania Railroad company that the kissing privilege in railroad stations has been grossly abused. The favorite place for women to kiss each other is when they arrive at the gate, where a man stands to punch holes in your ticket before he will permit you to get on the train. It is not unusual for two women to sit in the station an hour waiting for the train, and never think of kissing each other until the train is announced and the one that is going on the train gets in the gate. If there is a line of a hundred people behind them; if the engine bell is ringing, and the conductor is shouting "All aboard!" then it seems that the kissing will never end. The first one seems like the first sweet drop of a long shower, and then it keeps on raining. Such kissing as that by two women is simply absurd and meaningless, and it promotes profanity. It is like Naomi kissing her daughters-in-law. "Then she kissed them," the Bible tells us, "and they lifted up their voices and wept." This kissing continues so long that sometimes all the passengers feel like lifting up their voices and weeping. So did Jacob weep when he and Rachel exchanged kisses, but that was not the kind exchanged at the stations.

He shed tears of joy, and wanted to kiss again. With that kind of kissing people have a lively sympathy. "A soft lip," like Rachel's "would tempt you to an eternity of kissing." And some young people at the railroad station find parting such a sweet sorrow that they want to prolong it indefinitely.

But that kind of kissing does not as a rule take place in the ticket puncher's gate. It is what Byron calls the "long, long kiss; a kiss of youth and love." Even this may be abused. It is related of a young couple who were "keeping steady company together," that they were in the habit of going to the railroad station and as each train was announced "he took her about the neck and kissed her lips with such a clamorous smack that at the parting all the place did echo." After awhile this conduct attracted attention and excited remark.

It will be noted that the order of the railroad company only prohibits an "exchange of kisses." That is the kind that consumes time. But if the kiss is simply pressed upon the brow or the cheek it is soon over. That kind of the company does not object to. There is not a bit of fun in it and it was not that variety that the poet cried for when he wanted to start a kissing bee:

Give me a kiss and to that kiss a score; Then to that twenty add a hundred more; A thousand to that hundred; so kiss on, To make that thousand up a million. Treble that million, and when that is done Let's kiss afresh, as when we first begun.
