

BRINGS M'DONALD BACK TO BASTILE

ATTORNEY FOR HORSETHIEF GAINS VICTORY IN SUPREME COURT, WHICH ISSUES ORDER.

WILL REMAIN IN BUTTE PENDING A NEW TRIAL

Something of the Case on Which Juries Have Failed to Agree—Wine-Hued Bovine Was Missing and Suspicion Fastened Itself on McDonald—Was Then Accused of Horsetealing.

George A. McDonald, who was convicted and sentenced to state prison for a year for stealing horses, will be brought back from the penitentiary tonight by Sheriff Furey to take up his old quarters in the county jail. The return of McDonald is in obedience to an order of the supreme court.

Attorney B. F. Thresher, counsel for McDonald, made a fight for the return of McDonald to the county bastille, in the district court at Deer Lodge, but failed to secure the order for his removal from that court. He then applied to the supreme court, and yesterday the application was granted.

The Red Cow. McDonald is one of the men who were tried twice on the charge of having stolen and butchered Mrs. Ludger Michaud's red cow. The red cow disappeared one day, and witnesses testified that the last seen of her she was wending her way around the corral of Moffat and McDonald over on the flat east of Butte.

The other defendant was John Moffat. At both trials the jury failed to agree. The Michauds lived near the corral and slaughter house of the defendants. A red cowhide was found in possession of a junk dealer a few days afterward and the Michaud family testified that it once belonged to their wine-colored bovine. The junk dealer believed that it had been sold to him by the defendants, but the proof in the case was not sufficient to convince all the jurymen.

While the case was awaiting a third trial McDonald and Jerry McMahon were arrested and charged with grand larceny in the stealing of several head of horses and shipping them to McDonald's ranch near Chinoak, Montana. The horses were found at the ranch, and McDonald's conviction followed upon his trial.

A Year at Deer Lodge. Judge McClernan sentenced McDonald to a year in state prison and ordered him taken there, and refused bail pending an appeal of the case. Attorney Thresher took steps to bring McDonald back to the county jail, and success has just crowned his efforts.

His next move will be to bring an application before the supreme court for an order requiring the trial judge to accept bail in the case. If he succeeds in that McDonald will furnish bail and secure his liberty pending the appeal in the case.

McDonald has been very sick since he was taken to the state prison.

CONNORS RUNS AMUCK AND SCARES HIS WIFE

Mrs. C. Has Asked That Hubby Be Incarcerated Until He Can Recover From Lovely Case of Jerries.

Patrick Connors made trouble for his wife last night and today he was cooped up in the county jail for so doing. Mrs. Connors sent in a hurry call from her residence in the eastern part of the city and a deputy sheriff went out and got her spouse.

Connors had been on a protracted spree. He keeps a saloon on East Park street, beyond the city borders, and while he was in a condition bordering upon delirium tremens, he chased his wife around the house and threatened to kill her.

She was afraid he would carry out his threats and so she applied for his arrest. Last night after Connors had been taken to the jail, Mrs. Connors appeared at the sheriff's office and asked as a favor that the sheriff keep Connors for awhile.

She was afraid that he would be liberated, and she said she would come to the county attorney's office and prefer a complaint against him today.

Among the collection of suspects lined up in the police court today to answer the charge of vagrancy was a one-legged man calling himself Mat Wilson. He was arrested by Policeman Lawson in West Park street last night for begging money from pedestrians and insulting those who refused to honor his demands. Complaints were made to Chief Reynolds about him, and the chief paid him a visit and asked him to not insult people, but Wilson only laughed and insulted the chief. Then the chief walked over to the corner of Park and Main streets and instructed Patrolman Lawson to interview the cripple. Lawson told Wilson he was not pursuing the proper course, and Wilson invited the officer to go to Yuma or some other place just as hot. Then the policeman called the patrol wagon and took him to the city jail.

Out of a bunch of 16 charged with vagrancy Wilson was the only one that pleaded guilty, and the judge gave him 60 days in the county jail. Wilson wanted to compromise on a foner and the judge took the matter under advisement.

A Troublesome Beggar. Chief Reynolds says he has seen Wilson drunk several times; that when he went to see him in his cell he found a dozen persons in less than a second. He says he told Wilson he sympathized with him on account of his condition, but it was sympathy wasted. The chief now intends to put Wilson where he will not be able to ply his vocation or drive him from the city and keep him out.

Maybe Mabel Wasn't Mad. Mabel Ford was another of the collection. When the vagrancy charge was read to her she became very indignant and entered a plea of not guilty that certainly had the true ring.

"Me a vagrant!" she exclaimed, pointing the forefinger of her right hand at herself and essaying a cynical smile. "Why, sir, I am Mabel Ford, proprietress of a lodging house in South Main street, and did not come here to be insulted!" "Then you plead not guilty, Mabel?" asked the judge.

"Most assuredly!" was the disdainful reply. It was a motley gathering throughout. In it were four women, four cripples and four negroes, all of whom had been taken by the police from the Palace lodging house kept by the Ford woman.

"I was just lodging there," said Irene Jackson, with an air of pomposity. "My old man has left me and I had to have some place to sleep; so I went there, sir."

The bunch will be tried Thursday afternoon. Two or three of the gang were allowed to go their way, as it was shown that they worked once in a while.

INDEPENDENT POLITICAL ACTION TO BE TREATED

Matters to Come Before the Montana State Trades and Labor Council at the Semi-Annual Meeting.

Secretary W. M. Partelow of the Montana State Trades & Labor council, is making preparations for the semi-annual meeting of the council to be held in Livingston, August 25.

"There will be 100 delegates from all over the state," said he today, "and we expect to have an interesting session. No definite program will be arranged, as the work of the meeting consists of the questions brought before it by the delegates, but there will be a number of matters to be considered that will be of interest to the people of the state.

"Independent political action will be considered by the delegates and suggestions received on the best method of educating our people in the social and commercial questions of the day.

"We are just now negotiating with the railroads for rates, and if we make the arrangements we anticipate we will have a full representation from the various unions."

Plans will also be formulated at the coming meeting for securing legislation for the working people of the state.

"Take That, Ye Saucy Chit!" Says Mrs. H., and Bats Miss Taylor One in the Solar Plexus—Burly Husband Joins in the Melee and the Taylor Faction Retire With Bloody Proboscis.

Miss Maggie Taylor of Meaderville came into the county attorney's office this morning, accompanied by her mother and a face very much scratched, and preferred a complaint against Andrew Holter and Mrs. Agnes Holter, his wife, charging them with assault in the third degree.

There is a family feud in Meaderville, and the scratching and hair-pulling that Miss Maggie Taylor went through yesterday at the hands of Mrs. Holter, according to her tale of the trouble, resulted from it. Mrs. Holter belongs to the Barrows family and has been getting along with the neighbors lately in rather a dog and cat fashion. There was a case in the court of Judge Danzer at Meaderville yesterday involving Mrs. Holter, and Miss Taylor was a hostile witness to it.

Was Passing Holter Bastille. Miss Taylor related to Mr. Lynch that when she was returning home from the court yesterday she passed the home of the Holters, and Mrs. Holter came out with a red face and flashing eyes and threw a half a loaf of stale bread at her, on the principle, probably, that half a loaf is better than none, when one is in need of a missile, particularly if the bread is old and stale and hard enough.

Said Mrs. Holter to Miss Taylor, when she flung the bread: "Eat it, you dirty thing." So Miss Taylor declared. Miss Taylor declined to eat. But she gave Miss Holter a warning. Said she: "You better look out, or you'll be put in jail."

That exasperated Mrs. Holter, Miss Taylor said, and the latter came out of the yard and struck her in the face. She struck back with a broomstick which happened to be handy. At this juncture reinforcements came to Mrs. Holter in the form of her burly husband, Miss Taylor said, and her own mother joined in the melee as part of her reserves.

"Holter pushed my mother away, the old brute, and held me while his wife, the big cat, scratched me," said Miss Taylor, boiling with righteous indignation.
