

### PULLS HIM OUT OF COUCH TO BASTILE

M'GILLIC MAKES FIRST MOVE IN A PROPOSED CAMPAIGN AGAINST CERTAIN CLASS OF MEN.

### WEAR DIAMONDS AND YET APPEAR TO DO NO WORK

Frank Butler is the First of These to Be Landed Behind the Bars—Was Arrested Before, but Was Not Convicted—How R. J. Harvey Visited Butler and Concluded to Stay All Night.

Some of the men who have been laying around Butte with no visible means of support and at the same time wearing diamonds and jingling coin in their clothing are being rounded up by the police department and locked up on charges of vagrancy.

About noon yesterday Detective McGillic invaded room No. 35 of the Grand block, in South Main street, took Frank Butler out of bed and locked him up at the city jail. This morning Butler was arraigned in the police court to plead to a charge of vagrancy, but was granted 24 hours in which to make up his mind as to whether he is guilty or not.

Up to Sunday night Butler and a woman occupied a room in the old Pullman block at the corner of Dakota and Galena streets, but shortly after burglar James Martin was killed the pair shifted to the Grandon. Butler had been seen in the company of Martin and it was strongly suspected that he was engaged in the same business.

#### Has Been in the Toils.

About a year and a half ago he was arrested by Detective Murphy on suspicion of holding up a man and relieving him of his valuables, but failure on the part of the victim to identify him resulted in his release.

About an hour after Butler was sent below this morning, a young man named R. J. Harvey, who came from Denver about a month ago, called at the city jail to see Butler and in less than five minutes afterwards he was seeing him harder than he desired, as he was behind the bars with him.

Harvey has no visible means of support, yet he had on one of his fingers a diamond-set ring valued at \$300 and was wearing a valuable gold watch, to the chain of which was hanging a 20-franc gold piece. In addition to those things he had nearly \$14 in cash and receipts showing he had sent a woman in Denver \$20 since his arrival here. A bill in his possession gave the value of the diamond ring.

### FUREY TOOK NO CHANCES WITH LOAD OF CONVICTS

Sheriff of Chouteau County, Passing on His Way to Deer Lodge, Throws His Convoy Into Chains.

Sheriff Furey had four convicts from Chouteau county in his jail today. They were brought there by Sheriff Crawford of the county named, who was taking them to state prison. Crawford brought them in last night wearing leg irons and handcuffs, and they were put in one of the corridors with the other prisoners.

The men were John Shea, who must do two years for robbery; Martin King, alias Mike Kearney, convicted of the same crime and facing the same punishment; Thomas Jones, convicted of burglary and sentenced to one year, and James Snyder, who got three years for breaking jail. Snyder was arrested for burglary and lodged in the county jail at Fort Benton, and he sawed his way out.

Sheriff Crawford took his men away to prison at 4 o'clock this afternoon. He took no chances with them, but had them manacled foot and hand. Snyder, the jail-breaker, being regarded as a desperate character.

### MARQUIS DE MORES LIVED IN MONTANA

ECCENTRIC FRENCH NOBLEMAN, LATELY MURDERED IN SOUDAN, RAISED CATTLE IN MONTANA.

### FRENCH GOVERNMENT IS GLAD DE MORES IS DEAD

Was Regarded as Dangerous Agitator, as His Political Ideas Were Antagonistic to the Present Form of Government—Assassins Brought to the Scaffold by His Widow, an American.

It is not known to everybody that the Marquis de Mores, who was assassinated in the Soudan by Arabs six years ago, was at one time a cattleman in Montana, but such is the fact. He was a picturesque and Quixotic French nobleman, and he had a cattle ranch in Southern Montana out of which he once thought he would get very rich. He was fascinated by the broad brimmed cowboy hat while in the cattle business and he made it the style among the romantic French political enthusiasts of Paris to try to turn the government down about every six months.

De Mores was slain by treacherous Arabs while heading an expedition into the interior of the Soudan with the chimerical idea of founding a French-Islamic empire on the shores of Lake Tchad, which was to block Cecil Rhodes' scheme to build what was to be known as the Cape-to-Cairo railroad. His widow, the Marchioness de Mores, is now engaged in hunting down and securing the punishment of the Touregs and Chambas who slew her visionary husband.

#### Married an American.

De Mores was born in Paris and there married an American woman, Miss von Hoffman, who survives him as the Marchioness de Mores. He came to America after his marriage and went into the cattle scheme in Montana on an immense scale. He had a ranch of 20,000 acres and thousands of cattle, but the market fell and broke him.

He returned to Paris then and engaged in politics, and in 1896 went on the expedition into Egypt that resulted in his death. It has been said that his massacre was instigated by the French government to get rid of him. He was a firebrand in politics.

De Mores took no Europeans with him on the expedition, but went into the Soudan with a small number of Arabs, intending to form an alliance with the Mahdi of Omdurman and conquer all of the Bahr-el-Gazel country and join forces with Commandant Marchand, who was to come in by way of Fashoda. He believed that the Upper Nile could be dammed and Egypt turned into a desert while the Sahara would be made to blossom like the rose.

#### Guide Betrayed Him.

His guide changed the camel drivers he took with him for Touregs and Chambas at the Oasis of Gazabe, and when he got inland the latter killed him and his two Arab servants. The bodies were brought back to Tunis. The leaders of the assassins were Bechaoui and Sheikben-ah-el-Kadir.

The Marchioness de Mores has run down three of the assassins, and one of them has died and the rest have been condemned at Tunis. The cowboys of Southern Montana wish her every kind of luck, though they never banked much on de Mores' good sense. He had plenty of courage but his ideas were too fancy to go through the bluing water and keep color.

#### The Murderers Condemned.

An Associated Press dispatch received today from Tunis, is to the effect that the trial of the assassins of the Marquis de Mores resulted in the condemning to death of El Kheir and sentencing of Hamma Chiekh to 20 years' imprisonment.

Seventeen others accused of the assassination were sentenced in default, six to be put to death and 11 to hard labor.



### CONDITION OF THE RUSSIAN PEASANT

MANY SCHEMES ARE INTRODUCED FOR BETTERMENT OF EXISTING SOCIAL SYSTEMS.

### MINISTER WITTE TALKS ON PROBABLE METHODS

Czar Is Deeply Interested in the Problem and Every Effort Will Be Made to Better the Condition of the Common People—Question of Communal Ownership of Land Is to Be Considered.

St. Petersburg, July 30.—The commission of the state of agriculture and the peasantry is attracting more and more attention. Many opinions as to the cause of the existing agricultural depression and many schemes for its improvement have been published. Irrigation and canalizing, re-forestation and increase of cattle for manuring, abolition of communal ownership, more railroads, inter-rural development, bimetalism, etc., etc., have all been warmly advocated, but it remains to be seen whether any practical result will be attained. On being interviewed regarding abolition of communal ownership, Mr. Witte expressed himself as follows:

#### Commune Is Not Threatened.

"I believe that for the present this institution is not threatened. The statesmen of the country are likely to realize the question of suppressing the village commune. It seems to me that without immediately raising this question, the government will strive merely to remove the more undesirable features of communal ownership. For example, we have already been endeavoring to check further subdivision and re-portionment of the fields and have considered abolishing mutual liability for taxes."

One expert has proposed to take from the peasants the right to hold members of the communes fixed to soil or require them to return from the factories periodically to renew their passports, which is the source of endless abuses. He would also allow every peasant to renounce his

part of the communal ownership, with or without compensation, as circumstances, the value or worthlessness of the lands in each case might dictate.

#### Czar Is Deeply Interested.

M. Witte also says that the czar is deeply interested in the work of an agricultural commission and wants the fullest freedom of expression given to everybody concerned. In addition to the questions on the program of the provincial committees, the latter will be allowed to discuss such matters as occur to them. It is probable this may create a number of political questions which have hitherto been tabooed, even when aired in the province-self-government assemblies.

Continuing, Witte defended his financial policy against attacks of bimetalists and characterized the legal organization of credit as one of the most pressing governmental tasks in Russia. He laid particular emphasis on the necessity of cheap rural, in fact, village, credit.

One of the crying evils at present is the practice of extortionate usury upon the peasantry, advances on crops being often made at from 20 to 60 per cent in the interests per annum.
