ALLEGED RAPIST LANDED IN JAIL

ROY GEARY, WANTED AT HAMILTON ON SERIOUS CHARGE, CAUGHT BY SHERIFF AT GARDINER.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Livingston, July 31.—Roy Geary, who is wanted at Hamilton for rape, was caught at Gardiner by Sheriff Watts of Ravalli county last night and brought here and landed in jail. The crime was committed several days ago on a young girl and excitement is running high at Hamilton.

BURGLAR GETS THREE YEARS

Hermann Keyes Booked for Deer Lodge —The County Appeals a Case.

Parole, found guilty of assault, was sentenced to five days in the county jail. Following this the two prisoners were arraigned on the charge of jail-breaking, and pleaded guilty, and were sentenced to one year in the penitentiary.

IS CHARGED WITH FORGERY

Ed McFarland, Lately of Lake Basin, in Jail for Serious Offense.

Tolliver, near Huntley, at 10 o'clock Tuesday night of general debility. The body was brought to Smith's undertaking rooms here and embalmed, and accompanied by relatives was sent to Lexington, Mo., for burial.

BUTTMANN ASKS HABEAS CORPUS

LIVINGSTON HOTEL PROPRIETOR, CONVICTED OF BREAKING GAME LAW, WILL CARRY CASE UP.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Livingston, July 31.—Henry Buttmann, proprietor of the Park hotel, who was arrested Tuesday on a warrant sworn out by Game Warden Scott, was convicted of breaking the game law in Justice Bender's court this morning and fined \$25 and costs. Buttmann refused to pay the amount and was lodged in jail.

His attorney, John Schmidt, has applied for a writ of habeas corpus and will be heard in Judge Henry's court tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock. Buttmann will appeal the case. He had game out of season on the menu at his hotel, but claims the food was not in the house at the time. Game Warden Scott, acting, as he claims, under the law, took upon himself the authority of the sheriff to summon the jury. This point will also be contested by Buttmann's attorney.

ASSAULTS A CHILD AND IS SOUGHT BY A POSSE

Five-Year-Old Girl Made Victim of Fiendish Crime and Assailant Escapes.
