Montana Wesleyan university will be continued in Helena for the present. A great effort was made yesterday evening to meet the bonds of the university now due, amounting to more than \$6,000. During the day \$5,310 was subscribed, which, with contributions, was more than sufficient for the purpose.

At the afternoon session Dr. Henry of Butte resigned from the board of trustees of the university and H. D. Klock, also of Butte, was elected in his place. The meeting place for next year was not decided upon.

DISTRICT COURT AT GLASGOW

Edward Shufelt is to be tried first for alleged shooting of Thompson.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Glasgow, August 12.—Judge Tattan opened the August term of the district court at this place yesterday. A panel of 60 was drawn to be served and report Monday, August 18. The first case for trial is that of the state against Edward Shufelt. Shufelt was tried at the last term of the court for the shooting of Henry Thompson, sometimes called "Long Henry," at Saeco. At the trial last February the jury failed to agree. Considerable difficulty was encountered in securing a

jury for the first trial, and it is feared that there will be more difficulty this time. The next case, set for August 25, is that of the state against John Bartle Hayfield, a 16-year-old boy. He is charged with the killing of William Palmer last June.

Big Deal in Horses.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Miles City, August 11.—Ben T. Smith has bought 158 head of cattle from Horace Broadus, giving in exchange the building occupied by James Kenny as a saloon. Peder Pederson of the North Side bought the remainder of the Broadus cattle, 150 head, and the horses and outfit Broadus sold to John Gans of North Dakota. This is the last of 480 head Broadus brought in this summer and disposed of to Custer county parties. He will return next year with another herd for the same purpose.

More Free Scholarships.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] New York August 12.—Stocks opened very irregularly. The volume of business was small and the price changes were not important. Prices hardened under active buying of Baltimore and Ohio and Louisville, which gained two points early. St. Louis, Southwestern, Manhattan, Baltimore and Ohio and North American rose 2 points. Prices sagged until there remained but little of the previous increase and in some cases the increase was wiped out. Colorado Fuel lost 1 and St. Louis and San Francisco 1 1/2. Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis gained 2 1/2, but reacted sharply. Fort Worth and Denver city stamped gained 5 points.

Bonds were easier. New York, August 12.—Leading stocks were held firmly despite the limited demand, but the market was without feature except a two-point rise in Rock Island. American Ice and Westinghouse Electric advanced 1/2 points. Western Union was bought at a rise of 2 1/2. Chicago, Indianapolis and Louisville preferred gained 2 1/2, United States Reduction 1/2 and Westinghouse Electric 6. Elsewhere there was little selling at recessions for some of the principal stocks of 1 to 2. International Silver dropped abruptly 3/4, and except in stocks which showed early strength, this brought prices below last night's level. The closing was quiet and irregular.

WILL MAKE AN AMICABLE ADJUSTMENT IF HE MAY

Paul Boyden is Going to Horr to Try to Arrange Settlement Between Miners and Owners.
