

Louisville, Ky., August 12.—Unless Cuba is annexed to the United States within a year, it will never, said Mr. G. Castellanos of Havana, who was here last night.

The failure of congress to adopt the reciprocity resolution was a great blow to the island, but we think we shall find a market for our sugar in Europe.
