STOLEN BANK NOTE IS RECOVERED AT HELENA

Greenback Taken From Great Northern Express in July, 1901, Has Been Received by the Bank.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Helena, August 14.—The American National bank has received one of the \$10 bills stolen by the men who robbed the Great Northern express train in Northern Montana, July 3, 1901. It was the first one of the stolen notes that has been recovered by the bank. The note was found at Glendive and sent to the Helena bank from that place. It had evidently been in circulation for some time.

All national bank notes are signed by the president and cashier of the bank issuing them. The note just received was signed with the names "M. C. Kane," president, and "John P. Morris," cashier. Cashier N. J. Gould believes the names were written by the same person.

TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES TO BE GIVEN OUT AUG. 29

Eighth Grade Examinations Will Be Held at Helena the Same Time—Census of the State Schools.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Helena, August 14.—August 29 and 30 are the dates set for the examination of candidates for teachers' certificates. Questions for the eighth grade examinations are also being sent out from the office. This examination will be conducted simultaneously in all of the counties on August 29 and 30.

The annual school census is also one of the important matters now engaging the attention of the state superintendent. Blanks for this are being mailed to all of the school boards and early returns are expected from all points of the state.

Butte Labor News.

MANY NEW MEMBERS ARE JOINING THE FEDERATION

Active Campaign of Organization Proves to Be an Unqualified Success—New Rules.

As a result of the active campaign of organization by the Western Federation of Miners nearly 10,000 new members have been brought into that body. New unions have sprung up and old ones have received new members. The increase is distributed throughout the West, from Kansas to California. In Jerome, Ariz., a union was recently organized with 300 members. The Silver City, Idaho, union has almost doubled itself within the past three months.

In order to organize miners throughout the West the presidents and secretaries of the various unions have, in accordance with instructions of the executive board of the federation, posted notices at all the mines calling upon those not in the union to join before September 1.

In many instances the mine operators themselves have encouraged this movement. Some instances, however, have come to light where the operators have not taken favorably to it. These have not made any outward opposition, though. Miners who are not members of the union after September 1 will not be allowed to work with union men. For that reason they are all joining the body. It is the purpose of the federation to organize every mine in the West before it stops.

PRESSMEN FAVOR HOME PRINT

Take Action Against Out-of-Town Job Work in Strong Resolutions.

At their last meeting the Pressmen's union took action similar to the action taken by the Typographical union with reference to printing done outside the city. Pressmen are a unit in their opposition to allowing outside jobwork to be brought into Butte, and will lend their aid to the efforts now being made to protect local job offices from the ruinous competition which they have been obliged to face. Strong resolutions were passed by the pressmen.

MECHANICAL MUSIC IS TO BE HEARD NO MORE

Billings Council Orders Machines Shut Off—Discussion of New Sewer for West Side Addition.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Billings, August 14.—At its meeting a month ago the council of this city passed an ordinance prohibiting all sorts of mechanical music devices in saloons. There was some misunderstanding as to the date the ordinance would take effect, and Tuesday night Alderman Benninghoff called attention to the fact that the music was still going merrily on. A police officer was sent out, and before the meeting adjourned every music box in town was dumb.

In the matter of the creating of a new sewer district to take in the west side addition a remonstrance was presented, signed by the owners of 55 lots of the 176 in the district. By striking out block 50, nearly all of the protestants were relieved and a resolution to that effect was adopted and the ordinance was referred to the proper committee for reframing with block 50 eliminated from the proposed district.

Gallatin Telephone Service

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Bozeman, August 14.—The West Gallatin Telephone company is now in operation. The company has its wires connected with the central office of the Rocky Mountain Bell company, and its patrons can talk with any town in the state. The West Gallatin company is the second rural telephone company established in this county during the past year.

To Forward Irrigation.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Bozeman, August 14.—Prof. Elwood Mead of the United States department of agriculture and a well known irrigationist, is expected in Bozeman next week for the purpose of consulting with Director Porter of the experiment station in regard to investigations which have been carried on in different parts of the state with reference to irrigation.

Now on a Cash Basis.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Helena, August 14.—State Treasurer Barrett forwarded yesterday a draft for \$25,000 to the treasurer of the agricultural college at Bozeman. This represents the annual federation appropriation which has been received from the interior department. The agricultural college is now on a cash basis.

Severe Frosts Destroy Gardens.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Bozeman, August 14.—The Gallatin valley has been visited by severe frost the past two or three nights, which has destroyed a number of gardens, though so far no reports have been received that grain has been damaged to any great extent.

WALL STREET STOCKS

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] New York, August 14.—Stocks showed quite uniform gains of a moderate fraction on large opening dealings. Exceptions to the advancing tendency were shown by Amalgamated Copper, St. Louis Southwestern and a few minor stocks. Amalgamated Copper's loss of 1 1/4 caused a sympathetic break of 3/8 in Anaconda. Elsewhere the movement was unevenly upward, Rock Island rising 3/8, Toledo, St. Louis and Western preferred and United States Express 2, and Toledo, St. Louis & Western, Canadian Pacific, Louisville, Norfolk & Western, Colorado Fuel and Evansville & Terre Haute 1 to 1 1/2. The market became dull and weaker before 11 o'clock. Room traders took profits in Norfolk & Western, and its gain was wiped out, with some effect on other coalers. Some few other active stocks were easier, but the general market was sustained by the strength of St. Paul, Southern Pacific, Chicago & Alton, the Wheeling & Lake Erie stock and Wisconsin Central preferred, which were lifted a point or more. Amalgamated rallied to above 66. United States Express yielded 2. Wells-Fargo sold at 240, a gain over night of 12 points. Bonds were steady. There were no movements in excess of a fraction in prominent stocks during the noon hour. Western Union stiffened nearly a point towards tie end of the hour.
