

PLAIN TALK FROM THE IRATE YANCEY

ASSISTANT COUNTY ATTORNEY TELLS COMMISSIONERS CON-STABLE SHEA IS GRAFTER.

MOREOVER, SHEA, SO HE SAYS, BOASTS ABOUT IT

"You Will Not Do Anything, When He Comes Before You!" Cries Mr. Yancey, Who is Hot Under the Collar, "and Then He Will Walk Down Street and Tell How He Did It."

Timothy Shea, the constable of Judge Neenan's court, was today cited by the county commissioners to appear at a future date before that body and show cause why he should not be removed from office on several charges preferred against him.

Mr. Yancey filed charges yesterday and appeared before the county commissioners again this morning in relation to Shea, and the citation was the result of a demand for a definite answer as to what the commissioners would do in the premises with his charge against Shea preferred yesterday.

Mr. Yancey talked very plainly about Constable Shea to the commissioners. He asked what would be done as to his charge that Shea had been convicted in a justice court of exhibiting a deadly weapon, and the commissioners replied that they would have Shea come in to answer the various charges of grafting made at different times in the past two or three months.

Very Plain Talk.

Mr. Yancey replied: "Well, he'll come down here and deny that he grafted and you will not do anything. Then he will walk down town and before he gets four blocks, will tell five men how he pulled the wool over your eyes."

The commissioners stated that they would give Shea his day in court, any way, and Mr. Yancey said that his charge would be confined to the conviction in Arnold's court against Shea for drawing and exhibiting a deadly weapon.

A communication citing Shea to appear before the commissioners on August 19 at 2 o'clock to show cause why he should not be removed, not only on the ground of his conviction for a misdemeanor in the justice court, but upon all the other charges of grafting, more or less indefinite, was then drawn up by the commissioners, and next Tuesday Shea will be on the "coppit" telling why he did the things complained about or whether he did them at all.

GOES TO JAIL ON INSANITY CHARGE

MRS. WILLIAM GALLAGHER IS HALED TO THE BASTILE AT INSTANCE OF HUSBAND'S FRIEND.

VEHEMENTLY DENIES SHE IS MENTALLY UNBALANCED

Neighbors Say Mrs. G. Swears at Them and Heaps Opprobrious Epithets Upon Their Devoted Heads, but She Maintains They Are Sore Because She Will Not Move in the Same Social Set.

William Gallagher, a conductor on the Northern Pacific road, received a surprise when he learned last night that his wife was in the county jail on a charge of insanity. Gallagher runs between Butte and Billings and a wire apprised him of the news while he was out on his run.

He will be in town tomorrow to attend the trial. The question is whether or not he will be pleased with the situation of his wife. It is said that he was willing that she should be charged with insanity and tried on the charge, and that he did not spend much of his time at his home in Butte but was on the road most of the time.

Mrs. Gallagher will be tried in Judge McClellan's court tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The time has been set already and the witnesses summoned.

Says She Is Not Insane.

Mrs. Gallagher denies that she is insane and is very indignant about her imprisonment. She could hardly be induced last night to submit peacefully to arrest, and she demurred about coming to the court house. The arrest was made by Deputy Sheriff Pelletier.

The man who complained against Mrs. Gallagher and charged her with insanity is L. C. Thompson. He claimed to be a friend of hers and her husband when he was securing the complaint.

But Mrs. Gallagher declares that her arrest was prompted by malice borne against her by her neighbors. She says that she did not move in the same social circles as her neighbors, hence she could not afford to maintain an acquaintance with them. She did not bear them any ill will, but her station was different; that was all.

They foolishly resented her attitude, she said, and tried to be unpleasant, but she ignored them with that regard for her own self-respect that was proper to a lady in the circumstances.

Say She Swears at Them.

The neighbors declared that she swore at them and heaped opprobrious epithets upon their heads, and that living in the vicinity of her house became a tax upon their endurance. At the trial the truth of the conflicting statements may be brought out.

When Mrs. Gallagher reached the court house last night after her arrest, she protested very vigorously against being confined in the jail. The under sheriff and all the deputy sheriffs exhausted all their eloquence trying to persuade her that it was necessary and unavoidable and also not such a bad experience, after all, but some force had to be used finally to get her in the jail. She talked in a manner that was apparently rational.

MRS. M'HENRY WAS ABOUT TO DECAMP

BUT THE AGILE GOOTCH, ENCAMPED UPON HER TRAIL, SEIZES THE WOMAN AT THE DEPOT.

MRS. M'H., SO HE AVERS, WAS OUT TO BEAT HIM

Sold Him Mortgaged Cattle and Also Did Attempt to Swindle Certain Other Parties, Who Appear as Complainants in the Office of the County Attorney Before That Gentleman is Awake.

B. Bank, the money lender; Mrs. Campana, a liquor store proprietress, and John Gootch, a dairyman, were all in an excited frame of mind this morning at the county attorney's office, and it was all about the doings of a lady named Mrs. Sarah McHenry, who tried to take the train for Salt Lake at 2 o'clock this morning and leave them in a very tangled condition, as to certain money and property rights.

Mrs. McHenry was cooling her ardor for travel in the jail down stairs while the trio mentioned discussed their surprise and disappointment at finding her quite different from what they thought she was before she undertook to leave the country without bidding them good-bye.

Mrs. McHenry was in jail on a charge of having sold mortgaged property, having been arrested by Policeman Sullivan at Gootch's request, at the Oregon Short Line Railroad depot in the wee, sm' hours, just as a hackman with a big coat that shielded her bird cage from view was assisting her to mount a Pullman platform.

Gootch on the Scent.

Gootch trailed her like an Indian to the train, and he volubly congratulated himself on his prowess, while he and Bank and Mrs. Campana talked about Mrs. McHenry's alleged delinquencies. Judge Wines, representing Mrs. Campana, who claimed to be out \$45 as a purchaser of part of the mortgaged property in the meantime, was trying to find the statute authorizing Mrs. McHenry's arrest, while Deputy County Attorney Lynch expressed the opinion that such a law did not exist.

According to the story related about Mrs. McHenry, the lady, some time in the past, mortgaged a horse, buggy, harness, cow and calf to Bank for \$100. Within a few days past she sold the horse, buggy and harness to Mrs. Campana for \$45 and the cow and calf to Gootch for \$30. Yesterday Gootch learned about the mortgage and also that Mrs. McHenry planned to leave for Salt Lake on the early morning train today.

Gootch stayed up all night and hunted for Mrs. McHenry, and he found her at the railroad station at 2 o'clock, about to board the train and leave him and Mrs. Campana and the money lender to adjust their troubles as best they might.

Gootch said that the hackman spread his great coat so as to hide Mrs. McHenry's bird cage from sight, and that the lady left the hack in which she rode to the station, in a hurry and tried to board the train without being observed. Gootch's lynx-like eyes detected her, however, and he was so indignant at the act of the hackman that he gave him a swat on the jaw and knocked him down.

Then the policeman accommodatingly arrested Mrs. McHenry at Gootch's order and brought her to the county jail. After that Gootch hurried to the deputy county attorney's room at an unearthly hour in the morning and aroused him in order to relate the trouble.

After the injured people had talked the matter over, Judge Wines visited Mrs. McHenry in the jail and effected a compromise with her and she was released.
