PIPEFITTER KILLED AT GREAT NORTHERN SHOPS

Frank Shepard Caught in Revolving Shaft and Dashed to Instant Death, His Body Being Badly Cut Up.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.]

Havre, August, 15.—Frank Shepard, a pipefitter in the Great Northern shops, was instantly killed yesterday at 8:30 o'clock by being caught upon the shafting in the blacksmith shop. The coroner's jury brought in a verdict of accidental death. Testimony showed he was working in a dangerous position without scaffolding, though the superintendent of the shop had given permission to have the scaffolding erected wherever necessary. Other witnesses declared his position was apparently perfectly safe.

The jury's verdict does not fix the blame, simply describing the killing as an accident. His body was horribly mangled. Probably the first revolution upon the shaft caused death. Shepard received a terrific blow upon the head and both legs were broken and mangled.

FINAL ASSESSMENT WILL SHOW DIFFERENT FIGURES

Changes Have Been Made in Many Counties Since Reports Were Made to State Board of Equalization.

Helena, August 15.—Indications now are that the final assessment of property in the state will be far different from the original returns made by the assessors of the counties to J. J. Ryan, clerk of the state board of equalization. Reports received by Mr. Ryan from the county clerks, who make returns on the actions of the county boards of equalization, show that a great many changes have been made.

Seven counties were heard from yesterday. The reports of the county clerks, showing the changes made by the county boards, in each instance show that the equalizers found grounds for making considerable reduction and increase. All of these reports will stand as the official assessment of the property in the counties. To it will be added the railroad apportionment made by the state board.

SWIRLING WATERS SWEEP FEET FROM UNDER WOMAN

Miss Emma Johns of Dillon Attempts to Wade the Big Hole River and is Swept Down and Drowned.

Dillon, August 15.—Miss Emma Johns was drowned yesterday in the Big Hole river, a few miles below Willis. With her sister, Mrs. Charles Perry, and a few other residents of Argenta, she left Dillon to enjoy a few days' fishing. The men took the women and children across the river to a place which afforded better fishing and cautioned them to stay until they came after them. Miss Johns became tired of the fishing and started for the camp. She attempted to wade the river and when within a few feet of the shore she lost her footing and went under. The dead girl had been a resident of Dillon for 20 years and had been employed the greater part of that time in Mrs. Hart's millinery store. She was 23 years old and a native of El Paso, Ill., where her parents reside.

CHILD TAKES BURNING ACID

Little Hazel Zembower of Lothrop is in Serious Condition.

White, at the corner of West avenue and North Sixth street, swallowed almost two ounces of carbolic acid yesterday and her condition today is uncertain. Mr. and Mrs. Zembower and their children live at Lothrop. The little girl went to the commode, where there were several other bottles containing nothing that would harm and took the one containing the acid.

New York, August 15.—The stock market opened active and firm with Southern and Union Pacific the conspicuous figures. There were simultaneous opening sales of 1,000 shares of the former at 72 1/4 to 72 3/4, compared with 71 3/4 last night, and the latter was carried up 1/2 by successive purchases of blocks of 1,000 to 1,500 shares. Small fractional gains were the rule throughout the list.

The market was quieter at 11 o'clock, with the grain carrying stocks showing heaviness. Southwestern stocks were sold heavily. A rapid rise of 1 1/2 in Pennsylvania was ineffectual in checking the selling.

Bonds were irregular. Prices were carried below last night generally, and gains were wiped out in Pennsylvania, Southern Pacific, Louisville, Canadian Pacific and Rock Island and Hocking Valley. Net losses reached a point or more in Missouri Pacific, Texas Pacific, Norfolk and Western, St. Paul, Atchison and Illinois Central. Great Northern rose nearly a point.

The market rallied slightly and became very dull.
