


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
## M'CORMICK COLLECTION OF ORES WILL BE EXHIBITED AT CONGRESS

## FAR FROM THE SMELTER SMOKE THIS FLOWER GARDEN THRIVES



DIPLOMA AWARDED MR. M'CORMICK BY WORLD'S FAIR.

John McCormick of 114 East Granite street is the owner of the prettiest and most unique collection of gold quartz specimens ever exhibited. They were purchased by Mr. McCormick nearly 20 years ago, from Salton Cameron, who was then part owner and in charge of the Atlantic Cable mine, situated near the town of Cable, in Deer lodge county.

Beautiful Spot Where Flowers Bloom 'Mid the Barren Spaces Between Huge Waste Dumps.

Over in Walkerville, away from the smelter smoke of Butte and the dust of the city, is a little flower garden full of pansies, sweet peas and plants of refreshing greenness.

Walkerville has many quiet nooks and other places to attract the visitor, but none prettier than the front yard of the residence of Patrick Fitzgerald, one of the oldest citizens of Butte's flourishing suburb. The house stands back on a little side street a few hundred feet from the

terminus of the car line. The flower garden is kept in neat condition by the careful hands of Mrs. Fitzgerald and her two charming daughters. The sweet peas are particularly beautiful; indeed, they are pronounced by florists to be as handsome a variety as the soil of Montana produces.

Such scenes are indeed rare in Butte or vicinity. Many visitors go out to Walkerville to spend a quiet morning or afternoon and they never fail to visit the Fitzgerald garden, for it is like an oasis in the desert.  
"Yes, lots of folks admire our flowers,"

said Miss Annie Fitzgerald with becoming modesty. "You see, we are a good ways off from the smoke that seems to do so much harm to vegetation. All the flowers out here require is plenty of water and a little attention."

Patrick Fitzgerald, in whose yard the flowers are, came to Walkerville 35 years ago. He likes to tell of the growth of the little town from a lonely group of cabins. Mr. Fitzgerald built the first house in Walkerville. It was a modest little cabin and is still standing. It is shown in the accompanying cut.

It was from this famous mine from which these specimens which have excited the admiration and wonder of the people of Europe and America, were taken. Twice has this wonderful bunch of gold crossed the ocean for exhibition purposes and twice has it been declared the best collection present and a medal

awarded. At the World's Columbian exposition the collection was declared to be worth \$10,000 and a bronze medal presented to the owner.

Mr. McCormick has signified his willingness to permit the management of the International Mining congress to take

them to Columbia Gardens during the meeting of that body in this city next month. It has not yet been decided whether this liberal and kind offer will be accepted or not, on account of the great risk. But it is probable that the specimens will be on exhibition at least one day.
