## PRETTY SOON OUR WINGS WILL GROW

SILVER BOW COUNTY HAS NEVER BEEN SO GOOD IN ALL ITS LONG CAREER.

THERE ARE FEWER THUGS HERE THAN EVER BEFORE

Their Honors Are Getting Ready for Business and the Second Judicial District of the State of Montana Will Have Law Meted Out to It After Next Week—McClellan's Calendar.

Pretty soon the mills of the law will begin to grind out justice to the people of the Second judicial district of the state of Montana.

Judge Clancy and Judge McClellan will resume operation in their respective courts next Tuesday. The former will probably adjourn after having issued the regular venire, which will be returnable September 10 or 12.

Judge McClellan will have probate and other matters to take his attention Tuesday and probably Wednesday, and as soon as his venire is returnable will take up the criminal calendar and justice court appeals. One of the most important criminal matters to come before him will be the motion for a new trial for Martin and Lennox, who were convicted of murder in the first degree.

We Are Short on Thugs.

James Cusick, who is in jail for the killing of Thomas Baggs, is the only other prisoner who will answer to the capital charge. Rarely has Silver Bow county had so short a criminal calendar. There are not more than a few prisoners in the county jail.

Judge Harney has adjourned his court until September 27, and while he may convene court for a day or two meanwhile, there will be nothing of importance in this branch of the judiciary until the regular session. The judge returned from a visit in Eastern Montana yesterday and left again this afternoon.

### MAY NOT REBUILD PLANT

Montana Ore Purchasing Company May Remove Their Big Smelter.

There is a possibility that the Montana Ore Purchasing company may not rebuild its concentrator on the site of the burned plant in Meaderville, but will seek a place where there is more water.

Last night the Butte members of the company discussed the matter at considerable length, but failed to reach a conclusion on the proposition.

If the plant is built elsewhere, it will throw about 40 men out of work, as it requires about that number to operate a concentrator three shifts.

The ground on which the old plant stood is in litigation, the water used is in litigation, and, in addition, there are other reasons for not putting up the new plant on the old site.

The plant, F. Augustus Heinze says, will be built again as soon as possible.

### NERVOUS PROSTRATION THREATENS THIS ORATOR

## PRESIDENT SPEAKS IN VERMONT TOWNS

SHORT ADDRESSES MADE IN SMALLER CITIES ON HIS ROUTE, BUT NO LONG STOP IS MADE.

YESTERDAY AFTERNOON HE WENT AND SHOT A BEAR

Tomorrow Will Be a Day of Rest, Spent at the Summer Home of Secretary Shaw on Lake Champlain—Windsor, White River Junction, Montpelier and Burlington Were Visited Today.

Windsor, Vt., August 29.—President Roosevelt today resumed his tour of New England, crossing from New Hampshire to Vermont.

In the latter state he will spend today, Sunday and Monday, speaking tonight at various points and going this evening to the summer home of Secretary of the Treasury Shaw on Lake Champlain. The president will be the guest of Secretary Shaw until Monday, and it is announced that Sunday will be spent as a day of rest. Windsor, White River Junction, Montpelier and Burlington are the places at which the president was scheduled to stop on the journey in Vermont today.

Newport, N. H., August 29.—President Roosevelt was today entertained in a manner to his liking. Instead of making numerous addresses, meeting committees and indulging in handshaking, he plunged into the forest of the Croyden mountain region and hunted big game and just before dark succeeded in shooting a bear.

In a few remarks preliminary to his leaving here he said aimed any intention to go hunting, but Senator Proctor, who, like the president, is a good shot, induced him to alter his determination.

### He Got a Bear.

The president arrived shortly after 10 o'clock this morning and after being driven through the principal streets he made a short address in the public square. The town had an air of expectancy since the president's reception was considered a notable occurrence.

The arrangements included a visit to the Corbin mansion, the widow of Austin Corbin receiving the president. After a short stay the long procession of carriages moved over to the home of George S. Edgill, who, with Mrs. Edgill, entertained the party at luncheon. The president was given an hour's start ahead of his party in order that he might visit the clubhouse and do a hunting costume.

Several times the party caught up with him and finally he and Senator Proctor entered the woods and became lost to view.

Darkness was coming on when the party returned here and soon after their arrival Secretary Cortelyou telephoned that the president had shot a bear. Upon their return from the woods, they will spend the night at the clubhouse and it is not improbable that the president will again try for large game early in the morning.

### LENNOX CASE EXCEPTIONS

Attorney Bruce Kremer Will File 46 of Them September 2.

Attorney Bruce Kremer today served notice on the county attorney of the filing, September 2, of the bill of exceptions to the verdict in the Lennox murder trial.

The bill will be filed next Tuesday, and contains 46 exceptions to the rulings of Judge McClellan.

### The Fraternal Brotherhood.

Mrs. Emma F. Neidig, supreme vice president of T. F. B., will be present at the institution of a lodge of this order at the Plymouth Castle, September 6. Mrs. Neidig's home is in Los Angeles, Cal.; also the head officers of the order.

The membership in Los Angeles is over 3,000 and in California over \$12,000, which indicates that the order is popular in its own home. The organizers here have secured over 60 applicants for membership up to the present time and will have over 100 by the date of organization and will have a class of 50 to 75 charter members present, from which to choose officers for the following term. There is but one lodge of this order now in Montana, and that was organized two months ago at Helena with 100 members. The Butte lodge expect a membership of 400 by January 1, 1903. Social affairs are made prominent and the plan of insurance is the best known up to the present time. With each \$1,000 insurance there is \$500 per week accident indemnity, with old age and total disability benefits.

## MONTANA SOLDIER NOW IN THE NAVY

ARTHUR O'LEARY, LIEUTENANT OF U. S. MARINES, WILL BE IN THIS CITY TODAY.

Mr. and Mrs. T. O'Leary, of Anaconda, came to Butte this morning to meet their son Arthur, who came in on the west-bound Northern Pacific at 1:05 p. m.

Arthur is an Anaconda boy, and is now a second lieutenant in the United States marine corps, the occasion of his visit to his parents and friends in Montana being a sudden order from the department to join the battleship Oregon, now at Seattle. Lieutenant O'Leary was in the Philippines with the Montana regiment and earned his shoulder straps in that service by hard work and bravery.

He comes from fighting stock, his father, Colonel O'Leary, the well-known Anaconda attorney, having served in the ten-year Cuban struggle, and also in the great civil war.

The first intimation that the parents of the young officer had that he was coming to see them was a message from Glendive, which read:

"Will reach Anaconda tonight via Butte. Round up the fat calf."

The old folks were overjoyed and immediately hurried to Butte to meet their boy, who will remain with them for only a few days.

### CLEVER SWINDLER WHO CAUGHT DOCTOR LANDED

Gentleman Who Played the Rush Act on Dr. Yellek, or Kelley, Is Held by Spokane Police.

M. W. Hadsel, better known in the busy world as "Doc" Hadsel, who is accused of having given Dr. W. P. Yellek or Kelley, of Butte the "rush" act for \$400 last June, is in jail in Spokane and Detective Jones of the Washington city, wants his record.

In a letter to the chief of police of this city, he says: "We have had Hadsel in jail here several days. There are three or four charges against -m. Kindly give us his Butte record, as we need it in our business."

Hadsel or Hartzell, or whatever his name, is said to have swindled Dr. Yellek or Kelley last June, his modus operandi being a bogus check bearing the alleged signature of W. J. Harwood, who, a former member of the supreme court of this state, Yellek or Kelley loaned him two or three small amounts on the check while he, Yellek or Kelley, held the check in his own safe subject to the call of the slick swindler. Hadsel returned each loan and thus boosted himself 24 feet in the estimation of Dr. Yellek or Kelley. When the play was ripe he gave Yellek or Kelley the "rush" act for the entire sum for which the check would have called had it been worth anything, and got away with the whole swag.
