

INDIGNANT WALSH MAKES STATEMENT

ATTORNEY WHO WAS TO HAVE REPRESENTED O'BRIEN AT TRIAL IS SORE AT THOSE LETTERS.

SAYS EPISTLES ARE FULL OF LIES AND ARE "FAKES"

Did Not Know Date for Hearing Had Been Set, as He Was in Helena at the Time and Was Not Notified—Thinks It is a Shame to Publicly Attack Character of a Professional Man.

Attorney C. J. Walsh, of Anaconda, who is in the city today, is quite indignant at reference to his conduct in the O'Brien case, contained in a morning paper. Mr. Walsh defended O'Brien, and he claims that he did all that could be done.

While discussing the subject today, Mr. Walsh said:

"In regard to the two so-called letters from Tom O'Brien, the escaped convict, from the Deer Lodge pen, and the connection of my name with his trial, I desire to make this statement, so that no mistake may be made as to the truth of the matter.

"In the first place, at the time of the setting of his case for trial, and the trial of the case, I was in Helena, before the legislature, as the attorney for the republican candidates for the legislature, who were contesting the seats of the democratic candidates, who received the certificates of election and were the sitting members representing Deer Lodge county. I had no notice or knowledge of the setting or trial of O'Brien's case, until after the jury had returned its verdict, when my attention was called to it by Colonel T. O'Leary, at the Helena hotel.

As to That Fee.

"Regarding the statement in a paper of this morning, that after I received the fee for the trial of the case, that I did not consult with him (O'Brien) again. This statement is absolutely false. The money was paid to me before the preliminary examination. I attended the examination before Justice of the Peace Frank Kennedy, and consulted with O'Brien at the county jail.

"Now, it seems to me that it is pressing this matter a little bit too far to have the statements of a man like this man O'Brien published to the world, reflecting upon the professional or personal character of any reputable citizen and receiving the apparent sanction of one of the leading papers of this city.

"There are a number of misstatements made throughout O'Brien's first (so-called) communication, but it is not worth while to refer to them as the whole thing appears to me to be a fake."

"We're going to Feeley station," said the spokesman, who was driving, "and we'll take you right along." As the three men occupied the seat the passengers climbed into the wagon box and lay down. They paid no attention to where the wagon was going until the driver, who was evidently engineering the scheme, shouted that they would drive into the timber and camp for dinner.

Into the dense brush and forest the wagon rocked and rumbled until the two men in the box sat up and held on to the sides.

"This is a good place," said Robber No. 1.

"Pile out, you fellows," said Robber No. 2.

"You start the fire," said No. 3 to Olson, "and you take the stuff from the wagon," turning to Gertz.

Olson stooped to get some dry kindling, but he never got it. He didn't wake up until he was blown from the wagon by the fire.

At the same time Gertz was felled, but as he didn't lose consciousness altogether he was able to watch the robbers. They went through his pockets and took his money, afterwards turning to Olson and rifling his pockets.

Then they jumped into the wagon and drove away, leaving both men dead or unconscious; they didn't know nor did they seem to care which.

For two hours Gertz worked on his companion and at length brought him back to consciousness, when they started for Feeley and wired to the sheriff's office.

Olson claims to know Ferguson, and says that he is well known in Butte and Anaconda. The officers are expected in with their prisoners this afternoon. It is believed that they will get the third robber before long. The men will be charged with highway robbery as soon as the county attorney learns definitely that the offense was committed in Silver Bow county. The point where the robbery occurred is not far from the line of Beaverhead county, and if it is found that it was within Beaverhead the officers will turn their prisoners over to the authorities at Dillon.

Ferguson and Vaughan were arrested at Neff's ranch, where they had been working last month, and Forrest at a ranch six miles up the river.

NOW WE KNOW WHY HE DID NOT SEE FIT TO STOP IT

British Politics Are Assuming Lively Phase—Liberals May Reunite Under Rosebery—The Spectator Says That if We Mean to Maintain the Monroe Doctrine, We Must Fight.

London, August 30.—One of the most interesting features of the slack season in London, is the revival of the rumor about Delagoa bay.

It is asserted that the purchase of the Portuguese possessions in East Africa will be announced when parliament meets and that it will be followed by German acquisition of a portion of them, in accordance with a secret convention with Great Britain. There is no direct confirmation of this story from an authentic source, but there is circumstantial evidence that leads close observers to observe the rumor. Lord Milner's recent visit to Lorenzo Marques has never been satisfactorily explained, nor have the proposed annexations of Transvaal territory to Natal any significance unless the intervening district adjacent to Portuguese frontier can be added.

Men versed in African affairs are predicting the speedy purchase of Portuguese territory and the extension of Natal northward and material compensation to Germany for the neutrality maintained during the Boer campaign.

Reunion of Liberal Party.

R. W. Perks, who is a most energetic supporter of Lord Rosebery, has issued a manifesto to conformist voters urging them to take an active stand against the education bill and make preparations for contesting every tory seat at the general election.

Mr. Perks also advocates the abandonment of the Irish home rule question outright and the reunion of the liberal party under Lord Rosebery.

The weekly reviews have a good deal to say about the Monroe Doctrine. The Spectator expresses pleasure at President Roosevelt's full and clear enunciation of the doctrine, but points out that it can not rest on air. Unless it is based on power, it is certain to be pushed aside and ignored.

JONES WAS EAGER TO GET HOME TO HIS BEEFSTEAK

His Appetite Was Fired, and So Was His House—And Eager, Like Jones, is Now Without a Home.

Charles M. Jones and James Eager were burned out of house and home yesterday and with the houses and furniture went \$160 in greenbacks, \$100 of which belonged to Eager and the remainder to Jones.

The scene of the fires was far beyond the city limits. No one was at the Eager house when the fire started, but when Eager left there was fire in the kitchen stove. When he returned several hours later nothing save ashes marked the spot where the house had stood. The property was valued at \$1,400. Eager is an employe of the Montana Ore Purchasing company.

Jones' house was located in the Silver Bow Park addition. Jones is an engineer at Silver Bow shaft No. 3 of the Butte & Boston property. The fire is supposed to have been caused by a defective flue, as it broke out about 6:30 o'clock last evening while Mrs. Jones was preparing supper. Jones was at work at the time the blaze started. He estimates his loss at \$1,500, of which \$700 is on the furniture. There was no insurance on either house.

Annie Haas, whose head was split open by Samuel Bonner in room No. 5 of the Silver Queen block, in East Galena street, last Monday, because she would not become his wife, is recovering from the wound.

In connection with the trouble the woman says her name has been confounded with that of another woman, and she had rather not have it that way, as she has never done anything of a criminal nature. She once worked in the McDermott hotel in this city, and also for the late Con Hayes at Gregson, and has lived in Montana eight years. She once had a husband, she says, but separated from him.

As to the allegation that she was suspected of killing her husband and served a term in Sing Sing prison, N. Y., she says she did not kill her husband and never served a term in prison; that in saddling her with the crime and its results a mistake in the Haas has been made, as she spells her name Haas and not Hess.

AWFUL INSINUATION MR. BROWN MAKES ON HICKEY

Bartender Arrested for Robbing Room-Mate Says a Female Really Took the Coin From His Pocket.

Frank Brown, bartender, was arrested last night by Detective Murphy and Captain Everts on a warrant charging him with stealing \$80 from Michael Hickey of No. 363 East Granite street. The offense is alleged to have been committed Thursday.

According to the story of the affair, Hickey and Brown have been rooming in the same house. When the former returned to his quarters, real tired, Thursday night, Brown asked permission to assist him in getting rid of his shirt, but Hickey refused to grant the request. It is then alleged that Brown told Hickey he resembled Mr. Brown, Sr., and it would be a pleasure for him to help Mr. Hickey remove the garment; that while they were swapping pleasantries, Brown took the money from Hickey's pocket.

Brown denies that he took the money and threatens to make it sultry for those responsible for his predicament. He intimates that a woman took the cash before Hickey returned home, and that he will prove it when the proper time comes.

DREAD ELEPHANTIASIS IS NOW TO BE FEARED NOT

American Physician Is Going to Treat the Samoan Natives and Hereafter They Will Be Immune.

Stanford University, August 30.—Dr. Vernon Lyman Kellogg, head of the department of entomology, who accompanied Dr. Jordan on his summer trip to Samoa, has returned to the university, bringing with him many specimens of sea and island life to be added to the national museum at Washington. His most important work in Samoa, from a practical point of view, was his investigation of the fallaria, a worm-like animal living on mosquitos and producing in human kind the dreaded skin disease elephantiasis.

Almost half the native population of Samoa are affected with this disease and at the suggestion of Captain Sebree, U. S. N., governor of the American lines, Dr. Kellogg has devised a plan looking to the removal of the scourge by preventing the use of infected water, etc., by the natives.
