


THERE IS ONLY ONE BUTTE SAYS TOOLE IN HIS EULOGY

GOVERNOR JOSEPH K. TOOLE.



Montana's Chief Executive Who Delivered the Address of Welcome to the Members of the Mining Congress at its Opening Session Today. His Speech is Published in Full in This Issue.

Governor Toole's address today before the mining congress was as follows: "Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen—There are some things that go without saying, and in this splendid presence, where every visible sign is one of approval and satisfaction, it seems the part of supererogation to say that you are welcome visitors to this hospitable state. "We appreciate your coming and are intensely interested in the important purposes for which you are assembled. "To those familiar with the mineral resources of Montana, and especially of the county of Silver Bow, there appears to be a peculiar fitness in the selection of this state and city as the place for holding a mining congress. Butte's well-earned reputation as a mining center is world-wide, but let it not be inferred that there are not other districts in the state, developed and undeveloped, whose future is no less promising than the justly celebrated one that joins with me in proclaiming the state's welcome. There is Only One Butte. "An old German poet, singing the glories of his metropolis, exultingly declares

that there is only one imperial city, only one Vienna. Yielding much to that city and her proud renown, when it comes to geological explorations and mineral development, state pride, and undisputed facts, justify us in paraphrasing the German sentiment so as to read: "There is only one imperial city; "There is only one Butte." "By reason of her rapid strides, she has easily taken first place in the race for mineral supremacy, but in the long-run 'the race is not always to the swift,' and Butte, imperial as she is, may yet have to look to her laurels. "Nearly every county in the state has its section, through which veins of gold, silver, copper, iron, coal and other minerals run like so many arteries of the human system, many of which will be no less prolific and valuable than yonder wonderful hill, whose very smoke is laden with latent wealth. "We are glad to make profert of this vast mineral domain and submit it to the critical and analytical examination of mankind. Influence is Widespread. "Your organization has expanded from a small beginning until its potential influence is widespread and far-reaching. It is not only international in name, but international in fact. If we consider the metallic and non-metallic substances which are comprehended within the term 'minerals' in the United States alone, we will be astounded, no doubt, to know that we are dealing with industrial pursuits whose annual production is more than a billion dollars. "It is not surprising, therefore, that delegates from abroad and from the various states of the union especially, representing the great interests involved, should annually meet, discuss methods, interchange views and formulate recommendations to the end that our mineral production may continue to keep pace with the other quickened industrial interests.

"This great business interest, I hope, at no distant day, will press itself upon the attention of the congress of the United States and the public so insistently that its magnitude and value will be recognized by making mining—like agriculture—a separate department of our national government. That it will not exert its proper influence in the national councils or obtain its just reward until this is accomplished, in my opinion, is too obvious for argument. A Fitting Opening Day. "It is perhaps a mere coincidence that you meet on one of Montana's greatest holidays. This is Labor day. It will afford you an excellent opportunity to view and admire the sturdy, stalwart men whose sinewy arms wield the pick and drive the drill in a state where "Free labor's hardy children stand, "The equal sovereigns of a slaveless land." "But it was not my purpose to do more than assure you of a cordial welcome to Montana. "Make yourselves at home, and see as much of this state as your time will permit. "It will please us, and profit you. "When you shall have done this and discovered that what is generally regarded as purely a mineral state has next to the largest orchard in the world; land that will produce one hundred bushels of grain to an acre; flocks and herds rivaling in size and beauty those of the most favored states in the union; mechanical power furnished by natural streams of veritable 'actolian waters; forests, tall and straight as the cedars of Lebanon; an abundance of large game that is elsewhere practically extinct; thermal springs that put to flight veracious forms of insidious disease, and a climate, which for physical strength and some idea of the wonderful resources and mental vigor is unsurpassed, you will have welcome is sincerely extended."

"DON'T 'OO T'INK PAPA WILL DET BETTER SOON?" This is What Tiny Inez Cary Asked Sheriff Furey, and Broke That Kind-Hearted Official All Up. Inez Cary, the 6-year-old daughter of David Carey, who committed suicide on a Northern Pacific train as it entered Billings early Saturday morning, arrived in Butte yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the care of Sheriff Furey and was at once taken to her anxious mother, who lives west of the old Colorado concentrator. The sheriff met the child at Billings on his way to Butte from Miles City, where he had gone to take a boy to the reform school. The little girl had not been told of her father's death and believed him to be sick. Sheriff Furey has a kind heart and he was overcome with emotion when the innocent tot asked him if he didn't "tink papa would det well?" He couldn't find the heart to tell her he was dead and the little girl was not told the truth until she reached her mother's arms. The remains of Carey reached Butte from Billings last night in charge of Undertaker Duggan. They were prepared

for burial but the funeral will not take place until relatives of the suicide, living in Iowa, can be heard from. LITTLE CHAPEL IS PAID FOR Colored Folk Rejoice at Dedication That the Church is All Their Own. Rev. Jordan Allen, the colored preacher who built the African Methodist church, leaves today to be present at the conference in Leadville, Colorado. Bishop C. T. Shaffer, formerly dedicated the church yesterday and preached both in the morning and evening. The debt of \$400 was subscribed and the little chapel is now free of incumbrance. CROWDED STREET CARS IN FEARFUL COLLISION

Scores Are Injured in Accident in New York—Motormen Saw Danger, but Could Not Stop the Cars.

New York, September 1.—With a crash that was heard for several blocks, a Madison electric car rammed a 16th street cross town car, smashing its side, hurled it from the track and caused the injury of scores of persons. No one on either car received wounds that will prove mortal, but many will be confined to their homes for several days. The Madison avenue car, crowded with passengers, stopped at 16th street to allow some one to disembark. It immediately started again, although a west bound car was about to cross the avenue tracks under full headway. Both motormen seeing a collision was imminent, attempted to stop their cars but were unable to do so. The cross town car was thrown from the track, a hole was knocked in its side and all the windows were broken. The passengers became panic stricken and they fought to get off the cars. Many who had escaped being cut and bruised in the collision were thus injured.
