JERRY M'MAHON FOUND IN CABIN

FAMOUS HORSE THIEF SURPRISED IN LOG HUT SOUTH OF CITY BY SILVER BOW POLICE.

CLFVER CAPTURE MADE BY M'GUGAN AND A DEPUTY

Just as Mary MacLane's Grey Dawn Is Observed to Steal over the Flat, Officers Enter Rustler's Lair and Shove a Gatling Gun in the Face of the Man They Have Been Hunting So Long.

Jerry McMahon, the notorious horse thief and cattle rustler, was arrested by Under Sheriff McGuigan and Deputy Sheriff Quinn in a deserted cabin near the McDonald slaughter house, about four miles south of the city, at 4 o'clock this morning.

When the red-headed horse-thief, who jumped his bond of \$1,000, arrived at the courthouse, it created something of a sensation. No one was more surprised at the arrest, however, than Jerry.

Just as Miss MacLane's gray dawn peculiar to the flat east of Butte, was making its appearance over the ragged eastern hills, Under Sheriff McGuigan lit a tallow candle and held it over the face of the sleeping McMahon as he lay curled up in a corner of the empty cabin.

Jack Quinn stood at the other side, and he also held something. It was only one of the new automatic six-shooters, but when Jerry awoke to the sheriff's call and looked at it it resembled a rapid-fire Gatling gun on the eve of operation.

No Time for Speechifying.

There was very little said by either the officers or the rustler. It was not an occasion for eloquence. Under Sheriff McGuigan produced a warrant which was the real cause of Jerry's latest departure. It was dated June 26, 1902, and charged Mr. McMahon with grand larceny. In the parlance of the cow camp, however, it charged Jerry with "cattle rustling."

McMahon's career in the stock business has been an exceedingly checked one. In company with George McDonald he was accused of stealing horses from one Van who lives south of the city. Previous to this little matter, Jerry was tried for stealing horses off the range near Melfrose. The horses were the property of Peterson and were taken to Jerry's ranch near Chinook, from which Under Sheriff McGuigan afterwards recovered them.

By one of those accidents of criminal prosecution, or owing to the unexplainable inconsistency of some verdicts, Mr. McMahon was exonerated from this charge; at least he was not proven guilty. He was, however, immediately arrested on the charge of stealing the Van horses and released on \$1,000 bonds put up by Joseph Silver and Joseph Cppenheimer.

McDonald Got a Year.

On this charge McDonald was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary, and is now in the county jail awaiting the result of an appeal. Jerry considered himself safe on it, however, but while he was still out on bonds for the horse stealing the sheriff's office filed a charge of stealing cattle against him. The cattle were the property of Burtie Brothers of Brown's Gulch.

Before the officers could get him on this charge McMahon got wind of it, and at once, disregarding the bonds in the other case.

So it is that Jerry's case looks pretty serious at this time, and not even in his most sanguine moments does he see any glimmering rays of hope through the bars in the county jail.

The officers are receiving many compliments this morning on their clever capture.

DETECTIVE MEETS THORNE ON STREETS

QUEER CHANCE BY WHICH CALIFORNIA SLEUTH LANDED HIS MAN AFTER LOSING THE SCENT.

MURDERER WORKED HERE UNDER AN ASSUMED NAME

Was Employed in Rarus Mine, Where He Was Known as Ed O'Neil—Left When Search Became Too Hot, but as His Luck Would Have It, Ran Right Into Pursuer on Thoroughfare.

Detective Howard Soule of San Jose, California, arrived in Butte this morning from St. Paul in charge of James Thorne, an escaped murderer from the San Jose prison. Before he took the outgoing train for the West, Detective Soule told the story of his chase for the desperate criminal, which extended almost across the continent.

"This man Thorne escaped from the city jail at San Jose on May 15 last," said Mr. Soule. "He secured a revolver in some way and compelled the jailer to open the doors for him. Then he held up two men and secured enough money to leave that part of the country."

"I was not detailed on the case until three days after the escape so that Thorne

had a good start. He went from San Jose to Seattle and from Seattle he came to Butte. Early in June he obtained work at the Rarus mine under the name of Ed O'Neil. I traced him to Butte and here lost the scent.

Fortune Was With Him.
"I continued on to Detroit and then to St. Paul. I got entirely out the track and to my disgust found I was after another man. But by a strange coincidence Thorne lost his job at the Rarus and he himself came to St. Paul. I walked onto him by accident one day on South Broad street, and although he was disguised, I recognized him."

"I got the drop on my man and here we are on our way back home."

"Thorne has been twice convicted of the murder of E. M. Boggs, a mining man of Southern California. There was some dispute as to a claim and one day Thorne caught Boggs in the bottom of a 100-foot shaft and dropped a huge rock on his enemy, killing him instantly."

"The crime was a cowardly one and public opinion is very much against the murderer."

Detective Soule will receive \$1,000, which was offered as a reward by the city of San Jose for the capture of Thorne.

IF YOU SEE THIS MAN LET OUT A LOUD YELL

He is a Lunatic, One of Two Who Have Escaped From Warm Springs, and He May Be Dangerous.

Charles Simpson and James Smalley, two lunatics, escaped yesterday afternoon from the asylum at Warm Springs and it is said they are coming across the country in the direction of Butte.

Smalley has a brother, Dick Smalley, who resides in Butte at No. 1331 Farrel street and it is not unlikely the crazy man will be found on the streets some time today.

He is a small man about 5 feet 6 inches tall and when he made his escape wore overalls and a blue shirt. At times Smalley is considered dangerous and the police have been instructed to keep a close lookout for him.
