CLEVER CAPTURE OF REDDY COHEN

GENTLEMAN BADLY WANTED IN MINNEAPOLIS LANDED UPON HIS ARRIVAL IN THIS CITY.

IS REGISTERED AT BUTTE UNDER NAME OF HOFFMAN

Hardly Has Time to Sniff the Free Air of the Mountains Before Detective Murphy Pounces Down and Hales Him Off to Jail—Will Be Held Upon Order of the Minneapolis Officials.

Under Sheriff McGuigan and City Detective Jerry Murphy made a clever capture today. Through the vigilance of these officers, Joseph Cohen, or "Reddy" Cohen, as he is known, a red headed Hebrew who has been very much wanted in Minneapolis for his share in the municipal "grafting cases," is in the county jail awaiting the arrival of a Minneapolis officer with extradition papers from Governor Van Sant of Minnesota.

Cohen was on his way home from Seattle where his brother is city assistant city physician and stopped off (so he says) to rest in Butte, as he did not have a berth in the train.

He had just registered at the Butte hotel, under the name of Hoffman and was in the act of crossing the street when he was apprehended. Detective Murphy recognized him from his picture, a copy of which has been sent to each sheriff's office in the Northwest.

He Got the Boodle.

Reddy's connection with the notorious cases of municipal corruption is well known by this time, and although he avers that he is wanted chiefly as a witness, he will be called on to answer to the charge of complicity. It was Reddy who received the boodle from the gamblers and fallen women and turned it over to Chief of Police Fred W. Ames. For the latter's share in the proceedings, he is charged with bribery and has lost his position, as has his brother, Mayor A. Ames of Minneapolis.

In the letter received at the sheriff's office, it is stated that Cohen has relatives in Butte and Anaconda and that he has a brother, a sergeant of police, in Butte. These statements he denied in the jail this afternoon and says that the only relative he has in the Northwest is the brother in Seattle.

Couldn't Afford to Stay Away.

"I have a jewelry store in Minneapolis and own \$75,000 worth of property in that city, so I couldn't stay away from there," said he. "I am not connected with the corruption, although I know I am charged with being a go-between. I was on my way back to Minneapolis when I was arrested."

When asked why he registered under the name of Hoffman, he said he did not want to be taken back; he wished to go voluntarily. Yet it is not certain this afternoon that "Reddy" will not fight the extradition papers.

The sheriff's office here has communicated with Sheriff J. W. Dreger of Minneapolis who wires to hold the prisoner until he arrives.

COULD IT BE OUR BONNER IS OUT AND DOWN THERE?

Here is a Woman With Her Throat Cut in a Lodging House and Nobody Knows Who She Is.

Sacramento, Sept. 4.—Charles Bowditch cut the throat of Maggie Russell with a razor at the Brown lodging house at an early hour this morning and then severed his own jugular vein. The woman died instantly and Bowditch died before he could be removed to a hospital.

The woman's body was found lying on a bed, clad only in her night clothes. It was evident she was asleep when killed. She was about 30 years old and Bowditch 35. They were strangers in this city. No clue for the crime is known.

THIS TREE IS SAID TO BE THE LARGEST EVER

It Has Got Sherman and Grant Beat a Block—Just 109 Feet in Circumference at Base.

San Francisco, Sept. 4.—A few weeks ago there was discovered to the east of Fresno, in the Sierras, the biggest tree in the world. At the time it was said that it measured 150 feet in circumference. John Muir, the great naturalist, has just visited the tree and says that it measures at the base only 109 feet and at four feet above the ground it was only 97 feet in circumference.

It is, however, larger than General Sherman and General Grant, which heretofore were the recognized monarchs of the forest.

MARRIOTT NEEDED JUST WHAT HE GOT

MEN WHO SHOT SAN FRANCISCO PUBLISHER SAY THEY WERE JUSTIFIED IN ASSAULT.

SLANDERED YOUNG WOMAN WHO THEY KNOW IS PURE

Insulting Article Was Printed Out of Malice—Girl Had No Husband, Sweetheart or Father to Defend Her Fair Name and So They, as Old Friends of the Family, Stepped Forward.

San Francisco, Sept. 4.—Frederick Marriott, publisher of the News Letter, who was shot last night by Troxton Beale and T. H. Williams, will probably recover from the effects of his wounds. His physicians stated today that unless blood poisoning sets in, there was no reason why he should not get well. No affair in recent years has caused such a sensation as his last night's shooting. Both Beale and Williams have been prominent financially and socially for years and they are probably as well known in other parts of the country as in California.

Beale is the son of the late General Beale who came to California many years ago and accumulated a vast estate. He was at one time United States minister to Persia and later to Greece, and is at present a member of the wool dealing firm of Shoobert, Beale and Company.

T. H. Williams is known all over the country as a racing man. He is president of the California Jockey club, which controls racing in California and in recent years has bred and raced running horses. He inherited a large fortune from his father and is rated as a millionaire.

Mariotti Is Prominent.
Frederick Marriott, the wounded publisher, is also a prominent man. He inherited the News Letter, a weekly publication, from his father, who established the paper many years ago. Marriott is also publisher of the Overland Monthly.

While the slanderous story published by the News Letter, and which caused the shooting, did not mention the young lady's name, it was well known whom was referred to. The young woman was heartbroken over the publication and appealed to Beale, an old friend of her family, for assistance. Beale asked the advice of Williams and together they went to Marriott's house. The shooting followed.

In speaking of the affair, Williams said: "We undoubtedly committed an assault on Marriott, but we feel we were entirely justified in doing so, as he had attacked in his paper the character of an estimable young lady without any reason or cause. We are both satisfied that the attack in his paper was made with malice. We felt that the only remedy for such a procedure was physical punishment and we administered it."

They Do Not Regret.

Beale said: "The attack was made on a particularly warm friend of mine who lives with her mother in San Rafael. She is very well known in society and not the least word of scandal has ever attached to her name. Recently her sister became insane and is now in a sanitarium. The article appeared in last Saturday's News Letter, of which Marriott is publisher; it did not mention her name, but indicated clearly at whom it was aimed. It told of her playing tag in a night gown at Mount Talpais with a party of friends. We felt perfectly justified in taking the measure we did and have nothing to regret."

Neither man would say which did the shooting and each seems perfectly willing to shoulder the blame.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY MAY SOON BE IN USE

Italy, England and the United States Are to Be Connected by This New Italian Line.

London, Sept. 4.—Special dispatches from Rome say the Italian minister of posts and telegraphs, Signor Gallinberti, is negotiating for the use of the wireless telegraph, when this system becomes practical, between Italy, England and the United States.

The new station established by William Marconi, on Mount Gargano, is to be used in the proposed service.

The mountain is 6,000 feet high and situated on the east side of Italy.

ACCEPT ROGERS CHALLENGE

Kid Harris and Harry Lavigne Will Meet Him in Pocatello September 15.

Harry Lavigne and Kid Harris have accepted the challenge of Kid Rogers, the Pocatello boxer, who agrees to stop them in 20 rounds, both in the same night. The date of the bout has been set for September 15, and will be for a purse of \$250 which will be put up by the Pocatello opera house where the fight will take place.

Lavigne left this morning for Havre where he will train Phil Green for his coming battle with McFarlane, and will also train himself at the same time. Kid Harris will leave for Havre on Monday and will train there with the rest of the boys. The contest at Pocatello on the 15th promises to be interesting and both the local boxers are confident of their ability to stand up against Rogers and give him a warm go.

IDAHO DEMOCRATS OPEN CONVENTION

ASSEMBLE IN POCATELLO TO PICK VICTIMS FOR THE COMING CAMPAIGN.

DISSENSION SPRINGS UP IN THE VERY BEGINNING

Remarks of Chairman Perkey Regarding Conduct of Certain Members of the Party in 1900 Are Received With Displeasure, Some of the Delegates Finding That the Shoe Pinches.

Pocatello, Idaho, Sept. 4.—At 11:05 this morning state chairman K. I. Perkey mounted the stage in the auditorium and called the great democratic convention to order. The interior of the auditorium had been handsomely decorated for the occasion, under the direction of Manager G. A. Hanna, and every possible convenience had been provided for the delegates, and for the press.

In the opening address, Judge Perkey was neither happy nor consistent in his remarks when he stated that "in 1900 there were men in Idaho who had sold their tongues and pens for gold and to the detriment of good government." The remark was not well received. It seemed to carry a personal allusion distasteful to the delegates.

They Forget the Negro.

Perkey also claimed that Cuba Libre was the direct result of democratic state-manship and stated that the democracy were dedicated to absolute personal and political freedom for all races and peoples of all conditions, forgetting the record of his party in the southern states.

After the call for the convention had been read nominations for a temporary chairman were called for. Governor Hunt's selection for the office was A. A. Fraser, while Martin desired W. H. Watt of Hailey. The first ballot elected Watt with a majority of 22.

The result had a dampening effect on the ardor of the Hunt forces, for Hunt desired the temporary chairman in order to be able to name the order of business.

He desires nominations for governor first, as he has promised support in every quarter, and consequently cannot deliver it. Such a showing in convention would wreck his chances, so that the selection of Watt as temporary chairman is regarded as a Martin victory.

Dark Horse May Win.

At 3:30 o'clock it is apparent that neither Hunt nor Martin will go into the convention with enough votes to secure the nomination. The balance of power is held by Boise, Kootenai and Washington counties, two of which have candidates. Neither Hunt nor Martin will go to the support of the other and the most reasonable speculation is that a dark horse will win.

The senatorial aspirants are refraining from any participation in the governorship fight.

jecting the resolution came up in the Mining congress today, it was quite evident that between the setting of the sun last night and its appearance above the eastern horizon this morning there had been something doing in regard to it.

They Went After It Right.

As if confronted by the greatest bugbear of the age, to delegates were on their feet in an instant, each one pointing his finger at the president of the congress. Every finger was loaded and had they all exploded simultaneously the portly possession of Mr. Shafner would have been punctured in 10 distinct spots. The president's gavel hit the desk with a thud and six of the pointers sat down to await their turn at presenting their views on the subject. One by one they spoke, and with the exception of Mr. Dignowity, all expressed views in opposition to the adoption of the resolution. So sure were some that the resolution would be defeated, that they asked the president to put it to a vote without further talk. But a few had prepared for battle, one being Thomas McGuire of Utah who suggested that the decks be cleared for action and the battle was soon on full blast.

When the Smoke Lifted.

When the smoke had cleared away and the victory for the opposition announced there was general rejoicing in the camp of the opposing forces. Mr. Dignowity, who occupied a seat in one of the boxes, took the defeat of the measure with that coolness characteristic of defeated or victorious natives of his state—Texas, while the two Missouri delegates who voted in favor of the adoption of the resolution chimed in with a sweet cadenza entitled, "You must show us."

This ended the fight over the proposition to endorse the mining bill of Senator Kearns and urge upon the congress of the United States the importance of making a law that would give the prospector a mining claim 1,500 feet wide and 1,500 feet long, confine his operations to the limits of his ground, and conflict with the present law relating to the following of a vein throughout its depth.
