ENGINEER KILLED ON WASHOE LINE

JOHN TOUHEY IS RUN OVER BY HIS DUMMY LOCOMOTIVE AND LIFE CRUSHED OUT INSTANTLY.

Anaconda, Sept. 4.—John Touhey, 16 years of age, engineer on the dummy air line at the Washoe smelter, was run over by his engine and killed at 11:45 this forenoon.

He was approaching a switch and ran ahead of his slow moving engine to throw the level, letting the train onto the main line. His foot caught in the frog and the engine rolled down upon his crushing his head, mangled one leg and grinding out his life on the roadbed.

The coroner was notified and the remains moved to C. A. Tuttle's undertaking rooms, where the inquest will be held.
