FIRST GUN FIRED BY THE GOVERNOR

OFFICIAL PROCLAMATION ANNOUNCING FALL ELECTION ISSUED FROM HELENA HEADQUARTERS.

JOB TO BE FILLED AND COUNTIES THEY ARE IN

Rowdies Will Have to Retire to the Extreme Rear and Take the First Seat They Can Find During the Coming Campaign, as Anyone Who Starts Anything Will Be Promptly Jailed.

What may aptly be termed the first gun in the coming campaign was fired by Governor J. K. Toole this morning in the form of a proclamation from the state executive setting Tuesday, November 4 as the date of the general election in the state of Montana.

As it is only 60 days until the date of the election, the governor has made his official announcement and forwarded a copy to Chairman W. D. Clark of the board of county commissioners.

After leading off in the usual manner, the proclamation of the governor announces that the qualified electors of the state of Montana are hereby called upon to elect one representative in congress, one associate justice of the supreme court, state senators in 16 counties, members of the house of representatives from all the counties and judges of the district courts, one in the second judicial district, Silver Bow county, and one in the twelfth district which includes the counties of Chouteau and Valley.

Officers to Be Elected.
The following county officers will be elected in each of the 26 counties of the state: Sheriff, treasurer, assessor, clerk and recorder, county attorney, superintendent of schools, public administrator, county surveyor. Commissioners will be elected in the following counties: Cascade, Lewis and Clarke, Silver Bow and Missoula.

An auditor will be elected in each of the counties of Cascade, Lewis and Clarke, Silver Bow and Missoula and a clerk of the district court in Powell and Rosebud.

State senators will be elected in Broadwater, Cascade, Chouteau, Fergus, Flathead, Powell, Jefferson, Madison, Missoula, Ravalli, Rosebud, Silver Bow, Teton, Valley and Yellowstone.

Members of the house of representatives will be elected from all the counties as follows: Beaverhead, 2; Broadwater, 2; Carbon, 1; Cascade, 3; Chouteau, 2; Custer, 2; Dawson, 1; Deer Lodge, 6; Fergus, 2; Flathead, 3; Gallatin, 3; Granite, 2; Jefferson, 3; Lewis and Clarke, 7; Madison, 3; Meagher, 2; Missoula, 4; Park, 2; Powell, 1; Ravalli, 2; Rosebud, 1; Silver Bow, 12; Sweet Grass, 1; Teton, 1; Valley, 1; Yellowstone, 1.

Let the Rowdies Go Way Back.
In concluding the proclamation states that in order that "said election may be conducted in a quiet and orderly manner, the governor offers a reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of any person violating any of the provisions of the law governing the conduct of elections."

It is signed by Governor J. K. Toole and Secretary of State George M. Hays and has the great seal of the state of Montana properly affixed.

TRIES TO BAFFLE OFFICERS OF LAW

MRS. COLLIS P. HUNTINGTON UNDERTAKES TO KEEP POLICE OFF HER BIG GROUNDS.

FOR SOME REASON, SHE WOULD CONCEAL CRIME

Serving Maid Is Fatally Shot by Another Servitor and When Police and Coroner Arrive, Wife of California Millionaire Endeavors to Shut the Front Door in Their Faces.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.]

New York, Sept. 5.—Mystery surrounds a shooting affray on the Huntington estate near Thoroggs Neck, in which a kitchen maid was probably fatally injured by a gardener's assistant. Mr. Collis P. Huntington made every effort to baffle the police and coroner until threatened with arrest. The maid was Elizabeth Connell, 24 years old, and the man under arrest charged with the shooting is Daniel Hawkins, 40 years old, who lives on the estate with his wife and seven children.

Miss Connell now lies at the point of death, suffering from three wounds. Hawkins is said to have walked into the kitchen and without a word fired a bullet into the girl's back. It pierced the lung. He shot her twice more, both bullets striking the arm. Then he ran down to the dock and jumped into the sound. Mrs. Huntington's brother-in-law, Mr. Hollingsworth, who was bathing at this point, rescued the man with the aid of the coachman.

A physician was called in and although he said the girl had little chance to live, he ordered that no one be allowed inside the grounds. Accordingly guards were posted and when Police Captain Walsh of the Westchester station and Coroner O'Gorman arrived, they were informed that they could not come within the gates.

He Took Him Down Promptly.
Coroner O'Gorman placed Mr. Hollingsworth under arrest. Finally the coroner was misled by the presence of Mrs. Huntington and he repeated his demand to be allowed to see the wound girl.

"You cannot see her," said Mrs. Huntington. "You might just as well go away, for I refuse to allow anyone to see her." "Madam," said the coroner, "you are aiding in the work of covering a crime. If you do not allow me to see this young woman, I will be compelled to order your arrest."

Mrs. Huntington then gave the required permission.
The cause of the shooting was not learned. The dying girl could give no reason for it, and Hawkins refused to make a statement.
