

DEBIT AND CREDIT ON GIARD'S BOOKS

EAST PARK STREET MERCHANT COULD PAY HIS DEBTS IF HE WAS PAID.

HOW MUCH HE OWES AND HOW MUCH IS OWED HIM

Liabilities and Assets Would Nearly Balance if Some of You Would Step Forward and Settle—But the Small Bills Are the Only Ones Paid and Mr. G. Is Unable to Meet Creditors.

F. N. Giard, the East Park street merchant who recently made an assignment for the benefit of creditors, has filed with the county clerk an inventory and schedule of his estate.

There is an object of more than ordinary value for the young business man in the statement. It shows that if Mr. Giard could collect the amounts due him he would be at least within the ragged edge of solvency.

In compliance with the purchaser's cheery suggestion to "charge it," Mr. Giard has on his accounts the comfortable, or rather uncomfortable, sum of \$21,405.65. Of course this is not all loss, but there is another lesson in the manner in which the credits are distributed in the good, bad and indifferent column.

They show that the amount of \$3,762 is due by men of honor who will pay and whose accounts are labeled "good"; that \$3,124.29 is doubtful—probably the debtors belong to the class who will pay "next month"—and no less than \$14,328.62 is hopelessly bad. These debtors have left the country, or they have properties in their wives' names, or they have employed one of the million subterfuges by which the perpetually delinquent dodges the processes of the law.

There is a Lot of It.

There are no less than 10 typewritten pages filled with the lists of debtors. In all they number close upon 500 and their obligations range all the way from 25 cents to \$256. Unfortunately, most of the obligations of the 25-cent variety are in the column marked "good," while most of the names of those whose accounts run into three figures with a dollar mark at the beginning are numbered with the goats. In the list of assets is found the following, including personal property not exempt from execution: All the stock of goods located at No. 135 East Park street, and estimated at a market value to be worth \$3,935.50; store furniture and fixtures amounting to \$374.50; two horses, a wagon and harness, valued at \$90, and cash on hand to the amount of \$5.50. There are no incumbrances, no vouchers and no real estate.

He'd Pay If They Would.

On the schedule of creditors and liabilities it appears that there is due the 44 creditors the amount of \$25,698.23, in amounts varying from \$1 to \$4,000. Butte's banks are creditors to an amount in excess of \$18,000, most of the balance being due on accounts with wholesale houses.

With the personal property exempt from execution and amounting in all to \$4,405.50, there are total assets, including the debts marked "bad," to the amount of \$25,811.15, against the liabilities amounting in all to \$25,698.23, which goes to show that if Mr. Giard were paid his debts he could pay his debts.

With the instrument was filed the bond of Joseph Chauvin, assignee for the estate, amounting to \$12,000, signed by Chauvin, with D. Dorais and A. F. Bray as sureties.

COUNTY INSTITUTE BEGINS BUSINESS

SCHOOL TEACHERS EASY TO CONTROL AND SOFT END OF A PENCIL SERVES AS GAVEL.

PROFESSOR TRAPHAGEN DELIVERS A LECTURE

One of the Best Known and Prominent Eastern Educators Will Deliver a Talk at Tomorrow's Meeting and on Friday Miss Mullins Will Address the Institute on Important Subject.

There is a vast difference between the deliberations of a mining congress and those of a teachers' county institute. This fact has been clearly demonstrated since the Silver Bow county institute began business in the auditorium of the new high school building yesterday morning. Up to the present time there have been no rising to points of order, no substitute motions and no call for reference to a committee and by-laws that have not yet found a place in the archives of the body. In the deliberations of the mining congress the president found it necessary many times to hit the desk in front of him some hard cracks with a heavy wooden mallet in order to remind the few obstructing delegates that they were not the whole thing; but in the conduct of the institute proceedings all the presiding officer has to do is to put a quietus on any noise that may arise in to tap the desk with the rubber end of a lead pencil. At no time since the institute opened for business has the humdrum been so boisterous that each tap of the pencil could not be heard distinctly in all parts of the large room.

Traphagen's Address.

The first hour of the institute today was taken up with an address by Prof. F. W. Traphagen of Bozeman, one of the most distinguished instructors in the state. Professor Traphagen's remarks were confined to educational matters and received proper recognition from the teachers. The title of the address was "Education for Future Work."

From 9:30 o'clock until noon and from 1:30 until 4 the work of the body was confined to the various grades in separate apartments. Tomorrow morning the teachers will meet in the assembly room and listen to an address by Prof. W. F. Rocheleau of Chicago, a well-known educator of the East. Mr. Rocheleau is a pleasing talker and his remarks will doubtless be well received.

Thursday morning W. W. Welch, state superintendent of schools, will address the teachers.

Friday the members of the institute will listen to remarks from Miss Mary Mullins, county superintendent, on the "Preparation of Teachers."

Accident at Wardner.

CRIMINALS BEING ARRAIGNED TODAY

CHARLES LENNOX'S ATTORNEY ASKS AND SECURES A STAY OF SENTENCE ONE WEEK.

PARTNER IN THE CRIME WANTS LENNOX HANGED

Said That Martin Has Offered Sheriff Furey Twenty-five Dollars to Let Him Cut the Rope That Holds the Weight on His Partner's Scaffold—Jess Lester Has Plenty of Money for Attorney.

There were many criminals arraigned in Judge McClerman's court this morning—men and women—who will be famous or notorious, as the case may be.

The first pleading was in the case of Charles Lennox, who was convicted along with his partner, James Martin, of murder in the first degree. Both men were found guilty of killing John Williams and Saturday Judge McClerman sentenced Martin to be hanged.

This morning Attorney Bruce Kremer, appearing for Lennox, asked for a continuance for one week in order to prepare an argument on the bill of exceptions filed. The order was made.

Lennox was in court and showed the same impassive countenance he has shown ever since the day his partner, Martin, asked that Lennox be hanged first.

Lennox made a confession in which he stated that Martin had killed Williams. Martin went on the stand later and swore that Lennox was the man who fired the fatal shot.

Martin offered to pay Sheriff Furey \$25 if he would allow Lennox to be hanged first and permit Martin to cut the rope.

Martin is now under the death watch at the county jail to be hanged next month. Lennox's attorney is fighting for a new trial under the bill of exceptions filed. The case of Lennox was continued until next Saturday.

Jess Lester in Court.

Jess Lester was up this morning for stealing \$60 from one of the visitors on the dead line. The woman was arrested by the police and later released by the chief after she had restored the money. The county officials took up the matter and had her re-arrested and arraigned on a charge of robbery.

In court this morning the woman was asked to state whether she could employ an attorney.

"I've got plenty of money, judge, and I'm able to hire my own lawyer," was the answer.

The woman was given until Saturday to enter her plea.

Josephine Kelly told the court she had no attorney and W. N. Naughton was appointed in that capacity. She was given until Saturday to plead.

"Who is Corbett?" asked the court.

The burglar accused of many crimes stepped forward and asked for an attorney.

"The court will appoint Attorney Frank Haskins to defend you," said Judge McClerman. Corbett is given until Saturday to make his plea.

Interest in Hayti Trouble.
