REPUBLICAN PRIMARIES QUIET

Only Contest Occurs in the Fifth Precinct-- Harmony Noticeable Throughout the Day--No Truth in Fight Talk.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anacoda, Sept. 18.—The primaries are over and the full caucus ticket of the republican party was elected except in the fifth precinct, where W. E. Thomas, C. S. Smith and W. C. Tomlin tied for place as delegates and W. K. Thomas and J. B. Proulx as alternates.

The results of the primary will have to go, as they are, before the convention and there be settled. Never in the history of the city has there been quieter primaries than those of yesterday afternoon, and yet there has never been more interest manifested at any previous election.

This is not true. While there were two tickets in two different precincts, and the followers of each ticket worked to win, the result caused no enmity whatever and when the time comes for the republicans to get out and cast their ballots, it will be found that they have stood together in the midst of a harmony that cannot be surpassed.

Quick was in the box for Spokane, and up to the last inning the visitors had scored but a single run off his delivery. His support up to that time had been all that any twirler could have desired, and at times when the Senators looked dangerous they had been disposed of by clever double plays.

The Bunchgrassers started the run-getting in the fourth inning, and in the fifth and sixth succeeded in running up the total to four runs.

Helena's first run came in the fifth. Sullivan singled, Thery did the same. Peoples sacrificed and Sullivan scored on a fielder's choice.

With the score standing 4 to 1 against them, the Senators came to bat in the last inning and proceeded to do business with Pitcher Quick. San Diego Swimmer Ambitious to Stand at Head of the Short Distance Amateurs.

William McCoy, a swimmer of San Diego, Cal., is going after the short-distance record for amateurs.

McCoy gets his speed through a peculiar form of the double overhand stroke, so combined with the stiff arm stroke with one arm, and the "scissors" stroke of the legs that his progress through the water is wonderful.

One peculiarity of the stroke is that both arms come down to the left of the body instead of one on either side. His body is continuously turning from side to side in the water, and that seems to help him make time.

Two stop watches were held on McCoy the other day, and they agreed that he had made the 25-yard distance in 12 seconds, and the 50-yard distance in 25 seconds. The amateur records for open water are 14 4/5 for 25 yards and 31 4/5 for 50 yards.

Mr. Confarr gave the club the medal bearing his name and this will be shot for by members of the club only. The birds will be 20 singles and 10 doubles.



SHARKEY IS OUT OF IT FOR GOOD

EX-SAILOR ANNOUNCES HIS RETIREMENT FROM THE RING—LOOK AFTER CAFE.

It reports from New York are to be relied on, Tom Sharkey has decided to retire from the prize ring and will hereafter devote himself entirely to his cafe business in the metropolis. In an interview the ex-sailor is quoted as saying that he does not take the step because he thinks he has outlived his usefulness as a pugilist, but because he has had enough of the game.

"I have been fighting for a long time," said Sharkey, "and will now direct my attention to business of a more congenial nature. When I say I have quit, I intend to do so, and no persuasion in the world will make me recede now. I have discovered that a man cannot stick to his business and continue at another 'graft.' Then my parents have urged me to give up scrapping, and I will do so. That's all there is to it."

Sharkey is considered one of the wealthiest pugilists in the business. He is rated as being worth over \$20,000, which he made in the last eight years fighting and showing through the country.

HIGH PERCENTAGE OF G. O. P. BALLOTS

REPUBLICANS OUTNUMBERED DEMOCRATS IN MANY OF THE PRIMARIES YESTERDAY.

[SPECIAL TO INTER MOUNTAIN.] Anacoda, Sept. 18.—The vote cast at the republican primaries in this city yesterday afternoon is vastly encouraging to the members of the republican party of Anacoda. It seems to outnumber that of the democratic party by no small majority.

In the second precinct alone there were 67 more republican votes than there were democratic. In the fifth precinct the vote cast at the republican primaries was 73, while that of the democratic primary was not nearly so large. A similar proportion exists in most of the precincts of the city.

This being the case, it is self-evident that the republicans in Anacoda outnumber the democrats and the only thing necessary for the republican party to do in order to sweep Deer Lodge county this fall is to put up a good strong ticket.

The convention takes place next Wednesday, so that plenty of time is given in which to pick the strongest candidates possible. For the first time in years the republican party in Anacoda have more than an even break in the coming election.

THE TEMPEST AT THE MARGARET THIS NIGHT
