

WALL STREET STOCKS

Today's Quotations:

New York, Sept. 24.—There was a rush to sell stocks at the opening this morning, yesterday's weakness on account of the money situation being aggravated by the unexpected news that President Roosevelt was under surgical treatment. There were violent outbreaks of 1 to 3 points in the leading stocks. In many cases there were running sales on a downward grade, which showed a spread of as much as a point on simultaneous sales of 1,000 to 5,000 shares. The severest sufferers were amongst the Pacifics, Southwesters and Coalers. The threatening character of the opening break induced some vigorous supporting orders by large financial and banking interests, and the whole market set out upon a recovery. The eagerness to sell diminished as the steady upward trend of prices was perceived. Reports issued from the president's train relieved anxiety over his condition. By the end of the first hour there were pretty general recoveries of the opening losses and Missouri Pacific and Manhattan, Texas & Pacific, Illinois Central, Sugar and Amalgamated Copper were a fraction above last night's level. An opening call loan rate of 18 per cent brought the rise to a pause. The liquidation was renewed with violence, when the banks resumed the calling of loans and the money rate soared above 20 per cent. Within a few minutes prices had receded to below the opening level. Before noon losses were as much as 1 to 2 points; Missouri Pacific fell 4 1/2; Illinois Central, 1 3/4; Louisville, 4; Lackawanna, 5; United States Express, 4 1/2; Northwestern 6, and so on. It was evident that the large speculative pools were liquidating very freely. Before noon there were rallies running to a point in Missouri Pacific, New York Central and Reading. Bonds were weak.
