**WHILE A POLICEMAN STOOD BY HER SHE TOOK A RAZOR AND CUT HER OWN THROAT.**

New York, Sept. 24.—On an alarm from the Mazepa police an ambulance was sent early today from a Brooklyn hospital on a four-mile run to the home of Joseph Alstrefski. The ambulance surgeon found the man lying on the floor in a pool of blood.  
"My wife stabbed me," he gasped. "She had been drinking and was abusing our daughter when I came home. I protested and she stabbed me."  
The woman lay on a bed apparently asleep. The surgeon began to work on Alstrefski's wound, while a policeman ordered the woman to get up and go with him to the station. He turned his back and the woman jumped up, snatched her husband's razor and before the policeman could turn around to stop her, cut her throat from ear to ear. Then both man and wife were hurriedly carried to the hospital, but the physicians said neither could recover.

**DEPARTMENT SHY ON SHIPS**

**American Traders Want Warship on the Orinoco River.**

Washington, Sept. 24.—Large American shipping interests operating in the waters of the Orinoco river again have requested the state and navy departments to send a warship up that river for the purpose of protecting their steamers and keeping navigation unobstructed. The Marietta was sent up the Orinoco river recently obtaining good results immediately.  
But now that no American warship is in that locality, it appears that the disturbed conditions which existed there previously is again returning.  
The navy department desires to afford every possible and practicable aid for the protection of these trading interests, but it is not in a position to do so just at present on account of the lack of ships in Venezuelan waters.

**JUDGE BOYLE HAS BUNCH OF BAD 'UNS**

**LONG LIST OF PETTY OFFENDERS ARRAIGNED IN POLICE COURT THIS MORNING.**

**E. DUKE REFUSED BAIL ON UNGALLANT CHARGE**

Beat Goldie Golden at Glencoe Road House—William Brown Cuffed Hannah Day and Will Have to Pay—Coterie Who Were Making Night Hideous and Other Persons in Court.

Judge Boyle had all kinds of work before him when police court convened this morning. There were disorderlies, vags and drunks in abundance, and from the first to the last inning there were plenty of hits scored.

The first prisoner up was E. Duke, who was charged with having administered a cruel beating to Goldie Golden yesterday afternoon out at the Glencoe roadhouse. Duke was arrested on a warrant by Policeman Ingram—of Chinese kidnaping fame—and as the woman was in a serious condition, bail was refused him.

He took 24 hours in which to plead and his case will be heard tomorrow afternoon.

William Brown, a brown negro, was charged with having cuffed Hannah Day, a white woman with whom he was living. William was also given a day in which to procure witnesses, and his case went over.

**Ought to Know Better.**  
Edna Hughes is old enough to know better than to be found on the streets "at late and unusual hours of the night," but Policeman Bradshaw testified that the streets were Edna's hanging-out place. She was given a fine of \$10 and a lecture by the court.

From appearances, John Rice had gotten the worst of a fistic argument in which he had engaged with Jim Barclay. His face was swollen and the skin was torn and bleeding. John wanted to know why Jim hadn't been arrested also, but Policeman Cook explained things by saying Jim had proved too fleet of foot for him. Judge Boyle presented John with a fine of \$10.

"Reddy" Harris was another fighter, and if the scars on his face hadn't been ample evidence of this fact, his pugnaconic physiognomy would have been proof sufficient. "Reddy," so the arresting officer testified, had tried to whip everybody in the first block on East Park street last night and had ended in the jail. He was given his trimmings to the extent of "ten and costs."

**Made the Night Hideous.**  
John Tossen, John Ryan, G. Jacobs, Joe Brown, William Thomas, Dan Murphy, J. Doyle and Jim Smith were each fined \$10 after pleading guilty to making night hideous in the neighborhood of South Wyoming street.

The last prisoner to the bat was the poor old "Duke of Kakiak." Literally speaking, the "duke" walked, for Judge Boyle sentenced him to a term of 30 days in the county jail, and the "duke" used his pedal extremities to get there in company with the court bailiff.

**FIGHTING IN COLOMBIA**

**Terrible Suffering at Santa Marta as Insurgents Stop Supplies.**

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 24.—The Atlas line steamship Adirondack (which sailed from New York, September 6 for Cape Haytien, Gonaives, etc.), has arrived here direct from Santa Marta, a seaport town of Colombia, and reports continued fighting between the government forces and revolutionists in that neighborhood. The latter occupy a strong position in the rear of the town, having completely destroyed the railroad line, burned the bridges and sacked the banana districts. No trains are running and every means of communication with the place have been cut off.

The officers of the Adirondack say there is terrible suffering at Santa Marta, as the insurgents are intercepting the supplies. The town is still at their mercy.
