ANOTHER PARTY IS DOOMED TO DEFEAT

FAUGUSTHEINZE IS GOING TO MAKE ONE OF HIS OWN OUT OF THE LEAVINGS.

It looked like election time last evening when the two contending factions from Bozeman, with bands and banners, came whooping back to town, each endeavoring to show the people that it was "it" with a capital "I."

About 4 o'clock a number of boys with placards appeared to announce that Napoleon Heinze was returning from the Moscow of Gallatin valley and when, with his marshals, he arrived a little later, it was easy to see he was returning in defeat. Marshals Lynch, Kennedy, McGinnis, Tewey and others tried to put some spirit in the drooping hearts, and the aggregation pretending to be a band made discordant music, but there were outward and visible signs of gloom.

About half-past six Heinze mounted the courthouse steps and told the crowd, gathered more from curiosity than interest, how it all happened. Incidentally he told how he was the Moses that had come to deliver the people of Silver Bow county from their imaginary Egypt, and how he would some day get Pharaoh Clark on the hip.

At the conclusion of his harangue he announced that steps would be taken for the formation of a new party tonight. Without the slightest show of embarrassment he had bolted the party. He protested that he was neither dead physically nor politically, and the band played on.

When Mr. Heinze's breath became exhausted and he sat down, Jim Lynch moved that a committee of nine be selected to formulate the preliminary plans necessary for the formation of a new party.
