Hundred Thousand Dollar Fire. Sausalito, Cal., Sept. 26.—A block of buildings on the water front was destroyed by fire early this morning. The loss may reach \$100,000. About a dozen families were rendered homeless.

To the Lenox Library. New York, Sept. 26.—Isaac Myer, lawyer, author and Egyptologist, who died here last August, is announced to have left his library devoted to oriental subjects and a vast quantity of scientific manuscripts, to the Lenox library.

Chicago Man May Come West. Chicago, Sept. 26.—Superintendent Edward G. Conroy of the public schools has been offered the presidency of the University of the state of Washington. He will go to Seattle to confer with the board of trustees of the university.

New Line of Freight Steamers. San Francisco, Sept. 26.—According to information received here a new line of freight steamers will be put on the route connecting this port with New York by the Luckenbachs of New York, well-known in shipping circles on the Atlantic coast.

Roosevelt as a British Colonel. London, Sept. 26.—The Daily Chronicle this morning gives currency to a rumor that a move is on foot to make President Roosevelt a colonel in a British line regiment. The paper believes that the matter of precedent for such action is being inquired into.

Central Alaska Mail Service. Washington, Sept. 26.—The postoffice department has notified the postmasters that during the winter months it will be impossible to transmit mail matter in the form of parcels to the following named postoffices in Alaska: Nome, St. Michael, Circle, Eagle, Fort Yukon, Rampart, Tanana, Teller and Unalakleet.

Noted Englishman Injured. London, Sept. 26.—John Kensis, the noted head of the anti-ritualistic faction of the church, was seriously injured today and his eyesight endangered by being struck with a chisel, which was thrown at him after he had addressed a meeting at Birkenhead. He is now in a hospital at London.

For Caribbean Maneuvers. Washington, Sept. 26.—A squadron of the North Atlantic fleet is to rendezvous in the Caribbean sea a good while before the appointed time for the assembly of the vessels of the North and South Atlantic and European stations. It is said at the navy department that the big cruiser Olympia, the flagship of Rear Admiral Coghlan, will be ready and at the depot October 10.
