ST. ONGE STACKED THEM UP ON HIM

GUAY SAYS HAY WAS NOT THE ONLY THING THAT WAS STACKED IN THIS DEAL.

LITIGATION OVER SUNDRY BALES OF GOOD FLAT HAY

No Scales Being at Hand, Guay and St. Onge Measured the Stack and Now the Former Says the Latter Used a Short Tape Measure on Him and He is Suing for the Difference in Dollars.

Amusing, though not very entertaining to the court, is the trial of the case of Arthur Guay against F. L. St. Onge in Judge McClernan's court today.

The suit is for the return of \$38.50, which the plaintiff declares is due as a rebate on the purchase price of a stack of hay. Nearly all of the witnesses in the case are French and the services of an interpreter are necessary to make the jury understand the contentions.

According to the case as outlined, Guay bought a stack of hay from St. Onge. The hay was stacked near the Nine-Mile road, about eight miles outside of the city. Because there were no scales handy the purchaser and seller tried to guess at the weight of the hay, but could come to no agreement.

It was finally decided to measure the stack and then employ experts to figure out how many tons of hay there were. Both men measured the stack, the testimony being that each had an end of the tape measure.


Says St. Onge Skinned Him.

The measurements were then submitted to experts, who figured out that there should be 15 tons of hay in the stack. Guay declares that St. Onge wanted money to pay some debts and that he advanced him \$10 a ton or \$150 in all, with the understanding that if there were not 15 tons in the stack, the difference should be refunded.

The defendant in his answer denied the existence of any such agreement. Guay testified that there were only 11 tons and 300 pounds in the stack and went further to state that he had learned afterwards that St. Onge had cut off 100 feet from his tape measure before the measurements were taken.

The suit was first brought in a justice court from which an appeal was taken. There are some 15 or 20 witnesses in the trial, which will last all afternoon.

the Delaware & Hudson, and Fowler of the New York, Ontario & Western, and John Markle of the firm of G. B. Markle & Son, independent operators.

Before Mr. Markle went into the meeting he was asked as to the truth of the report from Philadelphia that John Mitchell, president of the Union Mine Workers of America, had been in conference at the Hotel Walton in that city with a representative of the operators and J. P. Morgan.

"That is not true," said Mr. Markle, "for if a representative of the operators and Mr. Morgan had been there I would be in a position to know it, and I have heard nothing of the kind."

Situation is Serious.

The coal situation in New York today is more serious than at any time since the strike of the miners began. Instead of 150,000 tons usually in stock at this time of the year, there are but 2,000 tons of hard coal.

In the tenement districts the price is 75 cents a bushel, which is at the rate of \$25 a ton. Dealers in other parts of the city who yesterday were selling half tons, today cut the advance to customers to quarter tons. Coal and coal dust by the pair of 20 pounds is selling at 25 cents.

CORONER JOHNSON IS TO BE PUT UP

LABOR PARTY WILL SEE THAT A POPULAR OFFICIAL HAS CHANCE TO SUCCEED HIMSELF.

All kinds of candidates are out in the labor ranks, and the labor convention, which meets Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, gives promise of being besieged by office-seekers.

There is a good deal of interest being manifested in the race for coroner, and several candidates have announced themselves. Among these is Coroner Johnson. At present it looks like Silver Bow's popular and efficient coroner will be renominated and, in the event of his nomination, he will prove a formidable opponent for the democratic and republican nominees.

Said a prominent labor man this afternoon: "Johnson will undoubtedly be renominated for coroner by our convention. He is not only one of the most popular county officials we have ever had but one of the most competent. He has made a splendid record as coroner, and we will see that he gets the nomination for the place again."

CAMPBELL WANTS FEE FOR SERVICES

MRS. KELLY'S FORMER ATTORNEY IS BRINGING SUIT AGAINST HER FOR A LARGE SUM.

Seldom has a case in the federal court attracted so much attention among the legal fraternity of Butte as the present action of Thompson Campbell against Mrs. Kelly. Campbell was attorney for Mrs. Kelly and wound up the affairs of her late husband. As compensation for his services Mr. Campbell asks \$2,500, which the defendant in the present action does not think should be forthcoming.

The trial began yesterday and will continue over tomorrow.

Mr. Campbell was on the witness stand this morning, and he told the jury explicitly of the infinite amount of detail and time that he was compelled to devote to the affair. Mr. Campbell is being represented by Attorney Harwood.

Mrs. Kelly and her little girl are present at the proceedings, and it is expected that she will make a strong witness in her own behalf. Mrs. Kelly's attorney is Lawyer McBride.

PAVLEIN SECURES NECESSARY FACTS

AUSTRIAN ABLE TO SHOW M'CLERNAN THAT HE IS ENTITLED TO VOTE WITH US.

Frank Pavlein, who applied for naturalization papers in Judge McClernan's court this morning and was turned down for want of witnesses as to his age and character as demanded under the law, showed up in court again this afternoon with another witness, who was able to swear that the wouldbe voter reached these shores under 17 years of age and the citizenship papers were ordered issued.

Thomas H. Martin, a former subject of the English king, butted into the same judicial wall this afternoon when he applied for the privilege of voting for the one or more candidates for judge. Martin had one witness who "had known him since he was a little boy," but the witness couldn't swear as to what Martin's age was when he first landed in America. Martin was sent out after some one else who could state his age correctly.

PORTE REGARDS LITTLE WAR FAR TOO SERIOUSLY

Macedonian Outbreak Not Thought to Be Big Enough to Warrant Calling of 40,000 Soldiers.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Constantinople, Sept. 30.—Diplomatic circles here do not regard the situation in Macedonia as being so serious as would appear from the Turkish government's military preparations, in calling out 40,000 of the militia reserves.

The porte's alarm is partially attributed to the maneuvers and other incidents of the Shijia pass fetes, the political importance of which, however, is considered to have been greatly exaggerated in view of the approach of winter, when the movements will necessarily be stopped. It is not thought that the threats of the Macedonian committee will foment a general revolution or develop into anything very serious.

BURNING BOTHNIA WAS SIGHTED JUST IN TIME

Crew of Wrecked Vessel Were About to Take to the Boats When Yankee Steamer Rescued Them.

[BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Hamburg, Sept. 30.—The Hamburg-American line steamer Pennsylvania, from New York, which landed the crew of the Norwegian bark Bothnia at Plymouth last Friday, arrived here today. The captain reported that the crew of the Bothnia was rescued September 24 in an exhausted condition, after having worked at the pumps for 17 days and nights.

The bark was on the verge of sinking when the Pennsylvania sighted her, and Captain Hansen, her commander, decided to set fire to the vessel before leaving her, to avoid the possibility of her interfering with navigation.

It Was Rather Mixed-up.

William O'Connor moved that a committee of three on resolutions and platform be appointed, but before he could finish his motion, S. R. Herron butted in with some sort of a rambling motion about three committees. The chair came to the rescue and put the motion to suit himself, and although Mr. Trerise again attempted to distinguish himself by a display of knowledge, he did not make it apparent to the convention.

The result of all of the conflicting motions was the selection of three committees as follows:

Credentials—A. J. Poser, A. Bertrand, H. Young, J. J. Wall, H. A. Smith, Paul Ozane and Paul Hudloff.

Permanent organization and order of business—J. H. Trerise, Thomas Shields and Sam Holmes.

Platform and resolutions—J. M. Denny, E. R. Hopkins and T. Bailey Lee.

Upon motion of Trerise the convention took a recess till 12:30.

Six Score Men Answer Names.

It was 1 o'clock when Chairman Denny of the Heinzeites called the county convention to order and the committee on credentials reported. The report contained the information that only a few of the precincts in the county were represented. The secretary called the roll and 138 men answered to their names. The report of the committee was adopted.

The committee on permanent organization and order of business reported, recommending that the temporary organization be made permanent and wound up with the following resolution:

"Whereas, it has come to the attention of this committee that the labor party, the democratic party and the populist party, duly organized and recognized political parties, are desirous of holding a conference with this, the anti-trust democratic party, with a view to harmonizing, in so far as possible, any differences which might otherwise arise during the campaign, and if possible, agreeing upon such candidates as will best care for the interest of the people in the various positions of trust to which such candidates may be called.

Now, therefore, we, your committee, recommend that prior to proceeding to nominate county officers, the chairman be and is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a committee of five, of which he himself is to be a member, to be known as a conference committee, to meet and confer with similar committees of said political parties and to report at a subsequent meeting of this convention.

The report was adopted and the chairman immediately appointed the following named persons:

J. M. Denny, A. P. Heinze, E. C. Perrott, Sam Hall and Fred W. Chase.

A recess was then taken to permit Mr. Heinze time to fix up the resolutions.

The resolutions were then read and the convention adjourned to meet again at the call of the chairman.

VENIRE FOR A NEW JURY IN MOUND CITY SCANDAL

Trial of Robert M. Snyder, Indicted in Connection With Lighting Steal, Is Resumed in St. Louis.

St. Louis, Sept. 30.—The trial of Robert M. Snyder, the banker and promoter, indicted on the charge of bribery in connection with the passage of the Central Traction bill, was resumed in the trial this morning.

Today an entire new venire for a new jury in the case was ordered and subpoenas were placed in the hands of Sheriff Diekmann for men other than those who were summoned for the original special jury and summoned again yesterday afternoon, when the original order for the jury was quashed by the court.
